Colombia: Birds & Nature in the Coffee Region | Species List January 22 - February 5, 2024 | with Naturalist Journeys

The main tour included the days of January 22 – February 1 and is summarized in this section. It featured a wide array of habitats, primarily in the Central Cordillera, and started and ended in Pereira, the capital of Risaralda Department. At the highest point, we reached well above treeline in the paramo habitats on the upper flanks of the Nevado del Ruiz at approximately 13,500 feet. Lowest elevations (at or just below 4,000 feet) were at our starting point, Pereira, Finca La Romelia, and Tinamú Birding Lodge.

BIRDS (262 species recorded, of which were 20 heard only, 4 were seen by guides only, and 6 were endemic to Colombia):

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BIRDS (262):

DUCKS, GEESE, WATERFOWL: ANATIDAE (3)

Torrent Duck, *Merganetta armata*—Seen twice on our visit to Otún-Quimbaya, first by very few in the group at the small bridge at El Cedral and then again by everyone later in the day in the bridge over the river at El Porvenir

Andean Teal, *Anas andium*—One spotted on in Laguna Negra in the very far back pond on one of our visits; only identifiable with the aid of the scope

Andean Duck, Oxyura ferruginea—Several birds seen in Laguna Negra on two days

GUANS, CHACHALACAS, CURASSOWS: CRACIDAE (4)

Colombian Chachalaca (E), Ortalis columbiana—Several seen at La Romelia

Andean Guan, Penelope montagnii—Found lurking in the trees around the Hotel Termales del Ruíz

Cauca Guan (E), *Penelope perspicax*—A few found at Otún-Quimbaya, the world's stronghold for this very rare species

Sickle-winged Guan, Chamaepetes goudotii—Seen scrambling in the trees at El Cedral in Otún-Quimbaya

PIGEONS AND DOVES: COLUMBIDAE (8)

Rock Pigeon, *Columba livia*—Seen pretty much every day we drove into or through a large town or city **Pale-vented Pigeon**, *Patagioenas cayennensis*—Recorded at Santa Clara and Romelia

Band-tailed Pigeon, *Patagioenas fasciata*—This high elevation, mountain pigeon was seen flying over head at Cortaderal and Rio Blanco

Ruddy Ground Dove, *Columbina talpacoti*—One of the more frequently encountered species of the tour, these were recorded on 9 days at many sites

White-tipped Dove, Leptotila verreauxi—(H) Heard calling at Romelia and one day at Tinamú

Gray-headed Dove, Leptotila plumbeiceps—Fly-by birds seen on 2 days at Tinamú

White-throated Quail-Dove, Zentrygon frenata—After a long wait, at least two of these large ground-dwelling doves showed at the second feeding station at Hacienda El Bosque

Eared Dove, *Zenaida auriculata*—Recorded on 10 days of the tour at many sites; most numerous at Tinamú where a large crowd gathered to eat cracked corn every morning

CUCKOOS, CUCULIDAE (2)

Smooth-billed Ani, *Crotophaga ani*—Seen while driving on the way down from Cortaderal and by a few in the group at Romelia

Squirrel Cuckoo, Piaya cayana—Seen by Linda and Larry at Hacienda Venecia

NIGHTJARS AND ALLIES: CAPRIMULGIDAE (1)

Common Pauraque, Nyctidromus albicollis—(H) Heard calling every day at Tinamú, either at dawn or dusk

POTOOS, NYCTIBIIDAE (1)

Common Potoo, Nyctibius griseus—(H) One was singing its haunting call one morning at Tinamú

SWIFTS: APODIDAE (2)

White-collared Swift, Streptoprocne zonaris—Best seen at the Termales de San Vicente entrance road stop, where they were flying by unusually low

Lesser Swallow-tailed Swift, *Panyptila cayennensis*—Several were flying around overhead during our visit to the UTP Botanical Garden

HUMMINGBIRDS: TROCHILIDAE (31)

White-necked Jacobin, *Florisuga mellivora*—This distinctive hummingbird was found at Hacienda Venecia, Tinamú, and Romelia

Green Hermit, Phaethornis guy—Found by the group on 2 days at Tinamú, where they were lekking

Stripe-throated Hermit, *Phaethornis striigularis*—One was seen occasionally visiting a flowering Verbena in front of the dining area at Tinamú

Green-fronted Lancebill, *Doryfera Iudovicae*—Seen at the visitor center and at the guard station at Rio Blanco **Sparkling Violetear**, *Colibri coruscans*—Encountered at UTP, Romelia, Rio Blanco, and El Bosque; often at feeders

Lesser Violetear, *Colibri cyanotus*—Picked out with care from the Sparkling Violetears at the Rio Blanco feeders **Black-throated Mango**, *Anthracothorax nigricollis*—Recorded on 4 days of the tour at the Sonesta, Hacienda Venecia, and UTP campus

Tourmaline Sunangel, *Heliangelus exortis*—Found at Cortaderal, Rio Blanco, and Hacienda El Bosque

Speckled Hummingbird, Adelomyia melanogenys—Seen at Otún-Quimbaya and Rio Blanco

Long-tailed Sylph, Aglaiocercus kingii—Found at one of the stops at Cortaderal and at Rio Blanco

Purple-backed Thornbill, *Ramphomicron microrhynchum*—Seen, though not really well, foraging in flowering trees at Cortaderal

Rainbow-bearded Thornbill, *Chalcostigma herrani*—Encountered several times around Termales, though not at the feeders

Buffy Helmetcrest (E), *Oxypogon stuebelii*—One bird seen extremely well at close range by the Brisas visitor center on Nevado del Ruíz

Tyrian Metaltail, Metallura tyrianthina—Recorded at Cortaderal and Hacienda El Bosque

Viridian Metaltail, *Metallura williami*—Seen twice in one day at the Termales feeder and again in birder's alley **Golden-breasted Puffleg**, *Eriocnemis mosquera*—Termales feeders

Shining Sunbeam, *Aglaeactis cupripennis*—A common and feisty hummingbird at the feeders at Termales and Hacienda El Bosque

Bronzy Inca, Coeligena coeligena—Visiting the feeders at Rio Blanco

Collared Inca, Coeligena torquata—Visiting the feeders at Rio Blanco

Buff-winged Starfrontlet, Coeligena lutetiae—Seen on walks around Termales and at Hacienda El Bosque

Mountain Velvetbreast, Lafresnaya lafresnayi—Encountered at Cortaderal and Hacienda El Bosque

Sword-billed Hummingbird, *Ensifera ensifera*—This amazing hummingbird was easily seen at the feeders at Hacienda El Bosque

Great Sapphirewing, Pterophanes cyanopterus—Regularly occurring in and around Termales

Buff-tailed Coronet, Boissonneaua flavescens—A common and aggressive feeder bird at Rio Blanco

Fawn-breasted Brilliant, Heliodoxa rubinoides—Seen visiting the Rio Blanco feeders

Long-billed Starthroat, *Heliomaster longirostris*—One seen perched high in a tree during our walk on the grounds of Tinamú and identified with the aid of a scope

White-bellied Woodstar, Chaetocercus mulsant— Seen visiting the Rio Blanco feeders

Western Emerald, Chlorostilbon melanorhynchus—(G) Seen by Manuel at Rio Blanco

White-vented Plumeleteer, Chalybura buffonii—Occasionally seen at both Tinamú and Romelia

Steely-vented Hummingbird, Saucerottia saucerottei—One of the more common and widespread hummingbirds of the coffee region, we recorded these on 5 days at several sites, including Hacienda Venecia and UTP

Rufous-tailed Hummingbird, *Amazilia tzacatl*—Another widespread hummingbird of lower elevations, we found these at the Sonesta, Hacienda Venecia, and Romelia

PLOVERS AND LAPWINGS: CHARADRIIDAE (2)

Southern Lapwing, *Vanellus chilensis*—A large, distinctive, and noisy shorebird found on 6 days at several low elevation sites and while driving

Andean Lapwing, *Vanellus resplendens*—A lucky flyover of 2 birds at Laguna Negra was our only encounter with this high-elevation species

SANDPIPERS AND ALLIES: SCOLOPACIDAE (1)

Noble Snipe, *Gallinago nobilis*—One flushed by Manuel as he walked toward the group in the tall grasses by the little restaurant across from Laguna Negra

CORMORANTS: PHALACROCORACIDAE (1)

Neotropic Cormorant, Nannopterum brasilianum—A few seen in the pond at the Sonesta

HERONS, EGRETS, BITTERNS: ARDEIDAE (2)

Cocoi Heron, Ardea cocoi—One flew over the group during the early birding at the Sonesta

Western Cattle Egret, *Bubulcus ibis*—Widespread and ubiquitous, these were seen on every day of the tour, including while driving, except for our one day on the high slopes of the Nevado del Ruíz

IBISES AND SPOONBILLS: THRESKIORNITHIDAE (2)

Bare-faced Ibis, *Phimosus infuscatus*—An increasingly widespread and common species in the coffee region, we found these on 8 days at lower elevations, often while driving.

Buff-necked Ibis, Theristicus caudatus—One seen briefly as it flew at the UTP Botanical Garden

NEW WORLD VULTURES: CATHARTIDAE (2)

Black Vulture, *Coragyps atratus*—One of the most common and widespread birds of the tour (if not, in fact, all of Latin America!), we recorded these on 10 days at many places

Turkey Vulture, *Cathartes aura*—Only noted on 3 days of the tour at Venecia, Termales de San Vicente entrance road, and Romelia

HAWKS, EAGLES, AND KITES: ACCIPITRIDAE (5)

Sharp-shinned Hawk, *Accipiter striatus*—An amazing siting of a bird, sitting in a conifer tree at Santa Clara, munching on a Saffron Finch! Enough of the bird could be seen to clearly say that it was of the resident subspecies known as Plain-breasted Hawk

Roadside Hawk, *Rupornis magnirostris*—Usually a common and easily found raptor in the neotropics, we only saw these on 2 days at Rio Blanco and Romelia

White-tailed Hawk, Geranoaetus albicaudatus—One seen soaring over the ridge at El Cortaderal

Black-chested Buzzard-Eagle, *Geranoaetus melanoleucus*—This mountain hawk was found at the Brisas visitor center and at birder's alley on the Nevado del Ruíz

Broad-winged Hawk, *Buteo platypterus*—A North American migrant raptor that winters in the Andes, we found these at Hacienda Venecia, on the Cortaderal trip, and at Rio Blanco

OWLS: STRIGIDAE (1)

Tropical Screech-Owl, Megascops choliba—(H) Heard one morning by some at Santa Clara

TROGONS: TROGONIDAE (1)

Masked Trogon, *Trogon personatus*—One bird found along the road at Rio Blanco was our only trogon of the tour (:)

MOTMOTS: MOMOTIDAE (1)

Andean Motmot, *Momotus aequatorialis*—Always a crowd-pleaser, these were recorded on 7 days of the tour at many places, including some visiting feeders

KINGFISHERS: ALCEDINIDAE (1)

Ringed Kingfisher, *Megaceryle torquata*—(H) One heard rattling near the small pond at Tinamú was the only one of the tour

PUFFBIRDS: BUCCONIDAE (1)

Moustached Puffbird, *Malacoptila mystacalis*—We had great looks at this adorable species at Otún-Quimbaya and during our walk on the trails at Tinamú

TOUCANS: RAMPHASTIDAE (3)

Southern Emerald-Toucanet, Aulacorhynchus albivitta—Seen on our Rio Blanco visit

Gray-breasted Mountain-Toucan, Andigena hypoglauca—Visiting the feeders at Hacienda El Bosque

Black-billed Mountain-Toucan, Andigena nigrirostris—Well seen in the tree tops when it responded to playback at El Cortaderal

WOODPECKERS: PICIDAE (8)

Grayish Piculet (E), *Picumnus granadensis*—Excellent views of this small, very restricted range woodpecker were had on the tour at the Sonesta and the El Porvenir bridge over the Otún River

- **Acorn Woodpecker**, *Melanerpes formicivorus*—Surprisingly common in the coffee region, we found these, sometimes at feeders, at UTP, Hacienda Santa Clara, and Romelia
- **Red-crowned Woodpecker**, *Melanerpes rubricapillus*—Probably the most common woodpecker of the coffee region, we saw these at many lower elevation sites during the tour, including at the Sonesta
- Smoky-brown Woodpecker, Dryobates fumigatus—Seen by some in the group at Hacienda Venecia
- **Bar-bellied Woodpecker**, *Dryobates nigriceps*—One of the highlights of the tour, a pair of these handsome woodpeckers were seen along the road at El Cortaderal
- **Lineated Woodpecker**, *Dryocopus lineatus*—Seen at Venecia and Romelia, but not particularly well either time, unfortunately
- **Crimson-mantled Woodpecker,** *Colaptes rivolii*—This spectacular and memorable woodpecker was found several times at Rio Bravo
- Spot-breasted Woodpecker, Colaptes punctigula—This elegant woodpecker was seen twice at Tinamú

FALCONS AND CARACARAS: FALCONIDAE (4)

- **Crested Caracara**, *Caracara plancus*—Only seen positively one day from the jeeps as we descended from El Cortaderal to the Termales de San Vicente entrance road
- **Yellow-headed Caracara**, *Milvago chimachima*—Probably the most regularly found true raptor of the tour, we recorded these on 9 days at many sites visited
- **Carunculated Caracara,** *Daptrius carunculatus*—Infrequently seen in central Colombia, we spotted a pair of these high in the trees along Birder's Alley; they were hard to see well due to the cloudiness
- **Merlin**, *Falco columbarius*—One flew in at Santa Clara late in the day after we returned from the El Cortaderal trip and perched in a tree; identified positively with the help of the scope

PARROTS: PSITTACIDAE (13)

Orange-chinned Parakeet, Brotogeris jugularis—Seen at the Sonesta

Indigo-winged Parakeet, *Hapalopsittaca fuertesi*—In one of the early highlights of this tour, 3 of these extremely rare parrots flew into the top of a tree near the road as we waited, just before leaving El Cortaderal

Speckle-faced Parrot, *Pionus sumultuosus*—Seen with the help of scopes in the trees at El Cortaderal **Blue-headed Parrot,** *Pionus menstruus*—A common parrot species in the coffee region, we recorded these on 6 days of the tour at many sites, though often flying rapidly overhead

Bronze-winged Parrot, Pionus chalcopterus—(H) Heard flying over at Tinamú

Yellow-crowned Parrot, Amazona ochrocephala—A juvenile was seen perching in a tree on the UTP campus Scaly-naped Parrot, Amazona mercenarius—Many small to medium flocks flying overhead at El Cortaderal Spectacled Parrotlet, Forpus conspicillatus—A pretty ubiquitous species, we had these on 6 days of the tour at many sites

- **Brown-throated Parakeet,** *Eupsittula pertinax*—A few seen feeding in a flowering tree during our walk on the grounds at Tinamú
- **Chestnut-fronted Macaw**, *Ara severus*—A pair flew into a tree while we were on the grounds of the UTP campus, allowing decent scope views
- **Scarlet Macaw,** *Ara macao*—One flew over us while birding the grounds of the Sonesta; it was part of the established population of escaped pet birds in Pereira
- **Golden-plumed Parakeet**, *Leptosittaca branickii*—Encountered several times at El Cortaderal, occasionally perching long enough for brief scope views
- Scarlet-fronted Parakeet, Psittacara wagleri—Seen at the Sonesta

TYPICAL ANTBIRDS: THAMNOPHILIDAE (7)

Great Antshrike, Taraba major—Seen at the Sonesta and Hacienda Venecia and heard at Tinamú

Bar-crested Antshrike, *Thamnophilus multistriatus*—The common antshrike of the coffee region, we found these at Sonesta, Hacienda Venecia, Tinamú, and La Romelia

Plain Antvireo, Dysithamnus mentalis—Excellent views of this bird on the walk in the UTP Botanical Garden

Streak-headed Antbird, Drymophila striaticeps—(G) Seen by Manuel and Dave at Rio Blanco

Parker's Antbird (E), Cercomacroides parkeri—A female seen by the group in the UTP Botanical Garden

Jet Antbird, *Cercomacra nigricans*—Seen roaming about in the tops of the tall guaduas (a species of bamboo) at La Romelia; also heard on one day at Tinamú

Blue-lored Antbird, *Hafferia immaculata*—(H) Heard at UTP and at Tinamú, but never could be lured close enough to actually see

ANTPITTAS: GRALLARIIDAE (8)

Chestnut-crowned Antpitta, *Grallaria ruficapilla*—Excellent views of Pancho, the friendly and confiding bird at one of the Rio Blanco feeding stations, were had by all

Chestnut-naped Antpitta, Grallaria nuchalis—(H) Heard at Cortaderal

Bicolored Antpitta, *Grallaria rufocinerea*—(H) Heard at Cortaderal; this is the one antpitta that did not show for us at its appointed time at Rio Blanco

Equatorial Antpitta, *Grallaria saturata*—(H) Heard during walks at Termales

Tawny Antpitta, Grallaria quitensis—Recorded on 3 days near Termales, often by voice

Brown-banded Antpitta (E), *Grallaria milleri*—Rapid, but good, looks were had of this antpitta at the last feeding station at Rio Blanco

Slate-crowned Antpitta, Grallaricula nana—The second to last of the antpittas seen at Rio Blanco

Crescent-faced Antpitta, *Grallaricula lineifrons*—A delightful pair of these amazing birds, incredibly hard to see elsewhere, visited the antpitta feeding station at Hacienda El Bosque

TAPACULOS: RHINOCRYPTIDAE (3)

Ocellated Tapaculo, *Acropternis orthonyx*—(H) Heard at very close range on a walk up the road from Termales, but would not come into view

Paramo Tapaculo, Scytalopus opacus—(H) Heard at two days at or near Termales

Blackish Tapaculo, Scytalopus latrans—(H) Heard at Rio Blanco and Hacienda El Bosque

OVENBIRDS AND WOODCREEPERS: FURNARIIDAE (11)

Cocoa Woodcreeper, *Xiphorhynchus susurrans*—Encountered on 3 days at UTP Botanical Garden and Tinamú Lodge

Streak-headed Woodcreeper, Lepidocolaptes souleyetii—Seen at Hacienda Venecia

Montane Woodcreeper, *Lepidocolaptes lacrymiger*—Seen at Otún-Quimbaya, Termales de San Vicente entrance road. and Rio Blanco

Streaked Xenops, Xenops rutilans—This chickadee-mimic was found at Otún-Quimbaya and Rio Blanco

Streaked Tuftedcheek, *Pseudocolaptes boissonneautii*—This distinctive Furnariid was found at El Cortaderal and Rio Blanco

Stout-billed Cinclodes, *Cinclodes excelsior*—Seen at Laguna Negra on our day trip to the high elevations of the Nevado del Ruíz

Montane Foliage-gleaner, Anabacerthia striaticollis—Encounterd at Otún-Quimbaya

Pearled Treerunner, Margarornis squamiger—Seen at Rio Blanco and Hacienda El Bosque

Andean Tit-Spinetail, *Leptasthenura andicola*—This high elevation spinetail was seen in a shrub at Laguna Negra on our trip to Termales

Red-faced Spinetail, Cranioleuca erythrops—Observed at Hacienda Venecia and the El Porvenir Bridge

Azara's Spinetail, *Synallaxis azarae*—Considerably easier to hear than see, we had decent views of one on the El Cortaderal trip

MANAKINS: PIPRIDAE (1)

Golden-collared Manakin, Manacus vitellinus—Several lekking males seen and heard at Tinamú

COTINGAS: COTINGIDAE (4)

Green-and-black Fruiteater, *Pipreola riefferii*—First found on the entrance road to Termales San Vicente, we saw this species several times at Rio Blanco, particularly our friend Raúl, who was quite tame

Barred Fruiteater, *Pipreola arcuata*—Great views of this species at Hacienda El Bosque, particularly when it came down to steal worms at the antpitta feeding station!

Red-crested Cotinga, *Ampelion rubrocristatus*—Encountered several times perching in trees on the El Cortaderal trip

Red-ruffed Fruitcrow, *Pyroderus scutatus*—Several of these large and distinctive cotingas were found at Otún-Quimbaya, probably the easiest place to see this species anywhere

TITYRAS AND ALLIES: TITYRIDAE (2)

Barred Becard, *Pachyramphus versicolor*—Found at El Cedral in Otún-Quimbaya and at Rio Blanco **Cinereous Becard**, *Pachyramphus rufus*—A pair seen in the trees at Romelia

TYRANT FLYCATCHERS: TYRANNIDAE (29)

Rufous-breasted Flycatcher, *Leptopogon rufipectus*—One found along the road during our early walk at Otún-Quimbaya

Rufous-crowned Tody-Flycatcher, *Poecilotriccus ruficeps*—A very handsome, albeit small, flycatcher that we found at Rio Blanco when birding along the road

Common Tody-Flycatcher, *Todirostrum cinereum*—We saw or heard this cute flycatcher on 5 days at many sites in the coffee region

Cinnamon Flycatcher, *Pyrrhomyias cinnamomeus*—Seen on our walk on the entrance road to the Termales San Vicente and again several times at Rio Blanco

White-banded Tyrannulet, *Mecocerculus stictopterus*—One individual seen in the trees while at the second feeding station at Hacienda El Bosque

White-throated Tyrannulet, *Mecocerculus leucophrys*—This distinctive high-elevation flycatcher was seen at El Cortaderal and around Termales

Yellow-crowned Tyrannulet, Tyrannulus elatus—Only found while walking the grounds of the Sonesta

Yellow-bellied Elaenia, Elaenia flavogaster—Seen at the Sonesta and on the UTP campus

Mountain Elaenia, Elaenia frantzii—Observed at Rio Blanco and Hacienda El Bosque

Torrent Tyrannulet, Serpophaga cinerea—Seen in the river at Otún-Quimbaya

Black-capped Tyrannulet, Phyllomyias nigrocapillus—Found at El Cortaderal and Rio Blanco

Golden-faced Tyrannulet, *Zimmerius chrysops*—Probably the most common small flycatcher of the coffee region, though more frequently heard than seen, we recorded these on 6 days at multiple sites

Olive-sided Flycatcher, *Contopus cooperi*—This **N**orth American migrant perched high in a dead snag during lunch at Hacienda Venecia

Eastern Wood-Pewee, Contopus virens—One bird identified as this species at Romelia

Acadian Flycatcher, *Empidonax virescens*—Apparently the common wintering *Empidonax* in the coffee region, though always more easily identified by call, we recorded these at Hacienda Venecia and Tinamú

Black Phoebe, *Sayornis nigricans*—Found on 5 days at sites generally near water including Venecia, Otún-Quimbaya, UTP, and Santa Clara; these birds were of the resident, white-winged subspecies

Vermilion Flycatcher, Pyrocephalus rubinus—Seen at the Sonesta and again during our final lunch in Chinchiná

Smoky Bush-Tyrant, Myiotheretes fumigatus—Several spotted perching in trees at El Cortaderal

Yellow-bellied Chat-Tyrant, *Ochthoeca diadema*—This very lovely chat-tyrant was found at Rio Blanco and again at Hacienda El Bosque; at the latter site, they came in to steal worms at the antpitta feeding station!

- **Chestnut-bellied Chat-Tyrant**, *Ochthoeca cinnamomeiventris*—Poorly seen at Rio Blanco along the small river above the impoundment
- **Rufous-breasted Chat-Tyrant**, *Ochthoeca rufipectoralis*—It took a while, but most of the group saw this bird at Hacienda El Bosque, albeit at different times during our visit
- **Brown-backed Chat-Tyrant**, *Ochthoeca fumicolor*—Seen on our high elevation birding trip on the Nevado del Ruíz
- **Pale-edged Flycatcher**, *Myiarchus cephalotes*—One found during our morning walk at Rio Blanco; this species is in the same genus as the North American Great Crested and Ash-throated Flycatchers
- **Cattle Tyrant**, *Machetornis rixosa*—Seen at the Sonesta, the town of Florida near Otún-Quimbaya, and at the Oxxo in Pereira where we had breakfast one morning
- **Great Kiskadee**, *Pitangus sulphuratus*—Found on 9 days of the tour at many, many places; as common here as elsewhere in Latin America
- **Rusty-margined Flycatcher**, *Myiozetetes cayanensis*—This kiskadee-lookalike was seen on 9 days at many of the lower elevation sites visited
- Streaked Flycatcher, Myiodynastes maculatus—Well seen a few times during our day at Romelia
- **Tropical Kingbird**, *Tyrannus melancholicus*—Recorded on 8 days of the tour, TK's were almost everywhere at lower elevations
- **Fork-tailed Flycatcher**, *Tyrannus savana*—One flew overhead while we were feeder-watching at Hacienda El Bosque

VIREOS: VIREONIDAE (3)

- **Black-billed Peppershrike**, *Cyclarhis nigrirostris*—(H) Heard at Otún-Quimbaya, but would not respond to playback
- **Rufous-naped Greenlet**, *Pachysylvia semibrunnea*—This very cute little vireo was seen at Romelia and Tinamú **Chivi Vireo**, *Vireo chivi*—Seen, heard, and identified with the assistance of Merlin at the Sonesta; very hard to separate from wintering Red-eyed Vireo

CROWS, JAYS, MAGPIES: CORVIDAE (2)

Black-chested Jay, Cyanocorax affinis—Seen or heard on most days at Tinamú

Green Jay, *Cyanocorax yncas*—(H) Heard at Hacienda Venecia and Otún-Quimbaya, but never actually laid eyes on it

SWALLOWS: HIRUNDINIDAE (3)

- **Blue-and-white Swallow**, *Pygochelidon cyanoleuca*—The common swallow of lower elevations in the coffee region, we recorded these on 5 days of the tour
- **Brown-bellied Swallow**, *Orochelidon murina*—The common swallow of high elevations of the Colombian Andes, we recorded these on 4 days when appropriately high; they roosted quite commonly at night on the Hotel Termales
- **Southern Rough-winged Swallow**, *Stelgidopteryx ruficollis*—Encountered on 5 days of the tour at lower elevation sites

GNATCATCHERS: POLIOPTILIDAE (1)

Tropical Gnatcatcher, *Polioptila plumbea*—Only seen on the first day of the tour on the afternoon walk around the grounds of the Sonesta in Pereira

WRENS: TROGLODYTIDAE (8)

Scaly-breasted Wren, *Microcerculus marginatus*—(H) A lovely songster that is very hard to see, we heard these at Romelia and Tinamú

- **House Wren**, *Troglodytes aedon*—A widespread species in much of Colombia at lower elevations, we recorded these on 8 days; these are of the resident Southern race
- **Mountain Wren**, *Troglodytes solstitialis*—Seen at Rio Blanco, Termales, and at the Hacienda El Bosque antpitta feeding station, where they were stealing worms!
- **Grass (Paramo) Wren**, *Cistothorus platensis*—We had, IMHO, amazingly good luck with this species on the tour, having close, knock-your-socks-off views of the species at El Cortaderal and along Birder's Alley on the Nevado del Ruíz. The birds we saw were of the subspecies *aequatorialis* which is a presumed future split that would be called Paramo Wren.
- **Rufous Wren**, *Cinnycerthia unirufa*—A family group of at least 4 birds moved through when we were at the second feeding station at Hacienda El Bosque
- Sharpe's Wren, Cinnycerthia olivascens—Found, though hard to see well, at Rio Blanco
- White-breasted Wood-Wren, Henicorhina leucosticta—(H) Found at Romelia and Tinamú, but never actually seen; a lower elevation replacement for Gray-breasted
- **Gray-breasted Wood-Wren**, *Henicorhina leucophrys*—(H) Far easier to hear than see, we encountered these at Otún-Quimbaya and Rio Blanco but could not get one to show itself

DIPPERS: CINCLIDAE (1)

White-capped Dipper, Cinclus leucocephalus—One seen fleetingly from the bridge at El Cedral in Otún-Quimbaya was the only one, though we looked hard at many points along the Otún River in the reserve

MOCKINGBIRDS AND THRASHERS: MIMIDAE (1)

Tropical Mockingbird, *Mimus gilvus*—Seen at two of our hotels: the Sonesta in Pereira and Santa Clara in Santa Rosa

THRUSHES AND ALLIES: TURDIDAE (6)

- **Andean Solitaire,** *Myadestes ralloides*—(H) This lovely songster was heard several times in Otún-Quimbaya, but never found
- **Swainson's Thrush**, *Catharus ustulatus*—A North American migrant who's winter range is primarily in the Andes, these were recorded on 3 days at the Sonesta and Tinamú
- **Clay-colored Thrush**, *Turdus grayi*—Occasionally came to feeders at the Sonesta, Tinamú, and Romelia; considerably less common than Black-billed in Colombia
- Pale-eyed Thrush, Turdus leucops—(H) Heard during the walks at Otún-Quimbaya
- **Black-billed Thrush**, *Turdus ignobilis*—The common "robin-like" thrush of lower elevations in the Coffee Region, we found these on 8 days at many sites visited
- **Great Thrush**, *Turdus fuscater*—The common thrush of high elevations in the Andes; seem pretty much anywhere we were at appropriate elevation

FINCHES, EUPHONIAS, ALLIES: FRINGILLIDAE (5)

- **Thick-billed Euphonia**, *Euphonia laniirostris*—The most regularly encountered euphonia of the tour, seen at feeders and in trees on 6 days at many sites
- **Orange-bellied Euphonia**, *Euphonia xanthogaster*—Recorded at Otún-Quimbaya and at the Santa Clara feeders **Lesser Goldfinch**, *Spinus psaltria*—(G) Seen by Dave at the Sonesta
- **Yellow-bellied Siskin**, *Spinus xanthogastrus*—Views of this one at Venecia and UTP; at the latter site, one came to bathe in the large stone bird bath during the dacnis vigil
- Hooded Siskin, Spinus magellanicus—Seen in the top of a tree at Cortaderal; definite scope bird!

NEW WORLD SPARROWS: PASSERELLIDAE (5)

Ashy-throated Chlorospingus, Chlorospingus canigularis—Seen at the start of the day at Otún-Quimbaya

- **Gray-browed Brushfinch**, *Arremon assimilis*—This ground-dweller was found at Rio Blanco, Termales, and Hacienda El Bosque
- **Rufous-collared Sparrow**, *Zonotrichia capensis*—A ubiquitous species of mid- to higher elevations everywhere in Colombia, we found (or heard) these on 9 days of the tour
- **Slaty Brushfinch**, *Atlapetes schistaceus*—This elegant brushfinch was found at Rio Blanco and Hacienda El Bosque
- Pale-naped Brushfinch, Atlapetes pallidinucha—Seen on the same day at Termales and along the birder's alley

ORIOLES, BLACKBIRDS, ALLIES: ICTERIDAE (4)

- **Yellow-billed Cacique, Amblycercus holosericeus**—Seen by a few in the group lurking in a bamboo thicket at Rio Bravo
- **Yellow-backed Oriole**, *Icterus chrysater*—The common oriole of much of the coffee growing region, we found these at Hacienda Venecia
- **Shiny Cowbird**, *Molothrus bonariensis*—A nest parasite much like the Brown-headed Cowbird, we found these on 5 days at most lower elevation sites
- **Carib Grackle**, *Quiscalus lugubris*—A species relatively recently invading the coffee region from the lowlands, we saw these outside our lunch stop in Chinchiná on the way back to Pereira

NEW WORLD WARBLERS: PARULIDAE (14)

Black-and-white Warbler, Mniotilta varia—One seen at the El Porvenir bridge and another at Tinamú

Tennessee Warbler, *Leiothlypis peregrina*—Seen by a few in the group at La Romelia during the morning walk down to the main house

Mourning Warbler, Geothlypis philadelphia—A lovely male spotted along the road during a walk at Tinamú Cerulean Warbler, Setophaga cerulea—Found twice during the tour with good views at Otún-Quimbaya and UTP (from the short bridge)

Tropical Parula, Setophaga pitiayumi—Seen at Otún-Quimbaya and heard at UTP

Blackburnian Warbler, *Setophaga fusca*—A very common presence at mid to higher elevations in the Andes, we recorded these on 8 days at many sites

Yellow Warbler, *Setophaga petechia*—Only seen a few times during the tour at the Sonesta, UTP, and Romelia **Golden-crowned Warbler**, *Basileuterus culicivorus*—Encountered at Venecia and Tinamú

Black-crested Warbler, *Myiothlypis nigrocristata*—A high elevation warbler species, we saw this one at Cortaderal and heard it at Termales

Buff-rumped Warbler, *Myiothlypis fulvicauda*—Seen by some in the group at Venecia, its loud and distinctive song several times at Tinamú

Russet-crowned Warbler, *Myiothlypis coronata*—Excellent views of this resident warbler species were had a Rio Blanco

Canada Warbler, *Cardellina canadensis*—The Central Andes is the heart of the wintering range for this migrant and we found it on 5 days at several sites

Slate-throated Redstart, Myioborus miniatus—Seen at Otún-Quimbaya and Rio Blanco

Golden-fronted Redstart, *Myioborus ornatus*—This lovely whitestart/redstart was encountered at most of the higher elevation sites visited including Cortaderal, Rio Blanco, and Termales

CARDINALS AND ALLIES: CARDINALIDAE (2)

Summer Tanager, *Piranga rubra*—This North American migrant was seen several times at the Sonesta, Santa Clara, Tinamú, and Rio Blanco, often coming to fruit feeders

Rose-breasted Grosbeak, *Pheucticus Iudovicianus*—A few males in full breeding species were found at La Romelia, where they perched cooperatively for viewing

TANAGERS AND ALLIES: THRAUPIDAE (42)

Black-capped Hemispingus, *Kleinothraupis atropileus*—This large hemispingus was found at Rio Blanco and Hacienda El Bosque

Black-eared Hemispingus, Sphenopsis melanotis—Several in a mixed species flock at Rio Blanco

Superciliaried Hemispingus, Thlypopsis superciliaris—Seen by the group at Hacienda el Bosque

Flame-rumped Tanager, *Ramphocelus flammigerus*—Very common at low elevation sites such as Hacienda Venecia and Tinamú

Crimson-backed Tanager, *Ramphocelus dimidiatus*—A lower elevation tanager found at Hacienda Venecia and La Romelia

Blue-capped Tanager, Sporathraupis cyanocephala—Found in the mixed species flocks at Rio Blanco

Grass-green Tanager, Chlorornis riefferii — Found in the mixed species flocks at Rio Blanco

Lacrimose Mountain Tanager, *Anisognathus lacrymosus*—Found at Cortaderal, Termales, and Hacienda El Bosque; sometimes at the feeders

Scarlet-bellied Mountain Tanager, *Anisognathus igniventris*—A spectacular and relatively easy to spot mountain-tanager, we saw these at Cortaderal, Termales, and Hacienda El Bosque

Blue-winged Mountain Tanager, Anisognathus somptuosus—Seen at Rio Blanco

Golden-crowned Tanager, *Iridosornis rufivertex*—One of the most memorable sightings of the tour, at least 3 of these were in a flock right in the parking lot of the Termales del Ruíz

Blue-gray Tanager, *Thraupis episcopus*—One of the most regularly seen species of the tour, we noted these on 8 days at many sites

Palm Tanager, Thraupis palmarum—A widespread species, we recorded these on 7 days of the tour

Black-capped Tanager, Stilpnia heinei—This elegant tanager came to the feeders at Santa Clara on 2 days

Scrub Tanager, *Stilpnia vitriolina*—This commonly encountered tanager was seen at Hacienda Venecia, Santa Clara several times, La Romelia, and Tinamú; it is a near-endemic to Colombia, only occurring elsewhere in a small part of adjacent Ecuador

Blue-necked Tanager, *Stilpnia cyanicollis*—This lovely tanager of the coffee region was recorded on 5 days at the Sonesta, Hacienda Venecia, UTP, and Tinamú

Blue-and-black Tanager, Tangara vassorii—Seen at Cortaderal, Rio Blanco, and Hacienda El Bosque

Beryl-spangled Tanager, Tangara nigroviridis—Only found at Rio Blanco while walking on the upper road

Bay-headed Tanager, Tangara gyrola—An elegant tanager found at El Porvenir, UTP, Santa Clara, and Tinamú

Saffron-crowned Tanager, Tangara xanthocephala—Seen at Otún-Quimbaya

Golden Tanager, *Tangara arthus*—First seen from the bridge at El Porvenir; a regular at the Santa Clara feeders **Turquoise Dacnis**, *Dacnis hartlaubi*—At least a pair of these very restricted range endemic bird were found, with much effort, in the big *Coussapoa villosa* tree on the UTP Campus

Green Honeycreeper, Chlorophanes spiza—Seen at the Tinamú feeders and on the roads/trails

Guira Tanager, *Hemithraupis guira*—(G) Seen briefly by Dave at the Sonesta, but he could not re-find it for the group

Blue-backed Conebill, Conirostrum sitticolor—This lovely tanager relative was spotted at Hacienda El Bosque

Glossy Flowerpiercer, Diglossa lafresnayii—Encountered several times in and around Termales

Black Flowerpiercer, Diglossa humeralis—Only regularly seen at the Hacienda El Bosque

White-sided Flowerpiercer, Diglossa albilatera—Seen by some at Rio Blanco and Hacienda El Bosque

Masked Flowerpiercer, *Diglossa cyanea*—Recorded on 4 days at Cortaderal, Termales de San Vicente entrance road, and Romelia

Plushcap, *Catamblyrhynchus diadema*—A unique and lovely species, several of these were found in or near bamboo thickets at Rio Blanco

Black-backed Bush-Tanager, *Urothraupis stolzmanni*—At least 2 of these interesting tanagers were found at Birder's Alley on the Nevado del Ruíz

Plumbeous Sierra Finch, Geospizopsis unicolor—Found on 2 visits to Laguna Negra

Gray-hooded Bush Tanager, *Cnemoscopus rubrirostris*—Seen as part of mixed species flocks at Rio Blanco **Saffron Finch**, *Sicalis flaveola*—Very common and widely encountered species throughout the tour at many sites **Large-billed Seed-Finch**, *Sporophila crassirostris*—Seen at La Romelia

Gray Seedeater, *Sporophila intermedia*—One perched on a power line tower at Hacienda Venecia during our morning walk

Plain-colored Seedeater, Catamenia inornata—Found on two visits to Laguna Negra

Paramo Seedeater, Catamenia homochroa—Nicely seen at Hacienda El Bosque

Bananaquit, *Coereba flaveola*—A frequently encountered species, often at feeders, at lower elevations throughout the tour

Yellow-faced Grassquit, *Tiaris olivaceus*—Seen by a few one day at Santa Clara and by Dave at La Romelia **Black-winged Saltator**, *Saltator atripennis*—Only seen at Otún-Quimbaya

Streaked Saltator, Saltator striatipectus—Found at Sonesta, Hacienda Venecia, and Tinamú

MAMMALS (5):

Central American Agouti, Dasyprocta punctata—Seen on at least 2 of the days at Tinamú

Red-tailed Squirrel, Sciurus granatensis—Recorded at the Sonesta, Hacienda Venecia, and Romelia

Andean Squirrel, Sciurus pulcheranii—Seen during the road walk at Rio Blanco

Colombian Red Howler-Monkey, *Alouatta seniculus*—Small group moving through the trees at Otún-Quimbaya was our only primate siting of the tour

Western Mountain Coati, Nasuella olivacea—An injured individual of this species was in the grasses near the Rio Blanco Visitor Center after we returned from our first antpitta viewing; Manuel called the vets about it and it was picked up and taken in for rehab

REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS (1 species)

Green Iguana, Iguana iguana—Several of various ages, sexes, and sizes were around Hacienda Venecia

BUTTERFLIES AND OTHER INVERTEBRATES (2 species)

Sulkowsky's Morpho, *Morpho* sulkowskyi—This very white-colored morpho was seen during the afternoon walk at Rio Blanco on the forest road

Red Peacock, Anartia amathea—Seen at several places during the tour, including Tinamú

The extension included the days of February 2 – 5, 2024, and is summarized in this section. Guides were Manuel Espejo and Dave Mehlman, with participants: Dina, Jay, John, Larry, Linda C., and Phil (and driver Darío). This was a short visit to several key birding sites in the Western Cordillera while based in Cali, with the first day a drive south through the Cauca Valley from Pereira and one stop on the way.

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BIRDS (152 species recorded, of which were 6 heard only, 7 were seen by guides only, and 1 was endemic to Colombia):

TINAMOUS: TINAMIDAE (1)

Little Tinamou, Crypturellus soui—A pair of these fascinating birds came into the feeding area at La Florida

DUCKS, GEESE, WATERFOWL: ANATIDAE (1)

Black-bellied Whistling-Duck, *Dendrocygna autumnalis*—Spotted on the start day of the extension, when one was seen sitting in the top of a dead palm in the town of La Victoria

GUANS, CHACHALACAS, CURASSOWS: CRACIDAE (2)

Colombian Chachalaca (E), Ortalis columbiana—Several seen at La Minga

Sickle-winged Guan, Chamaepetes goudotii—Seen at La Minga at the house and during our walk

NEW WORLD QUAIL: ODONTOPHORIDAE (1)

Chestnut Wood-Quail, *Odontophorus hyperythrus*—One of the highlights of the extension, a covey of at least 8 individuals, adults and chicks, came to feed at the feeding station at La Florida on our morning visit on the last day. This species is very difficult to find in the wild, but has taken to coming to feeding stations at some of the birding sites in the Andes.

PIGEONS AND DOVES: COLUMBIDAE (3)

Rock Pigeon, Columba livia—Seen every day when in Cali
Ruddy Ground Dove, Columbina talpacoti—Parque de la Uva and La Florida
Eared Dove, Zenaida auriculata—Seen on both visits to La Florida

CUCKOOS: CUCULIDAE (1)

Smooth-billed Ani, Crotophaga ani—Parque de la Uva

NIGHTJARS AND ALLIES: CAPRIMULGIDAE (1)

Lyre-tailed Nightjar, *Uropsalis lyra*—A female on its nest closely observed on a rock face along the road above Doña Dora

POTOOS: NYCTIBIIDAE (1)

Common Potoo, *Nyctibius griseus*—Glimpsed by a few out of the side of the bus on our first morning driving up the cordillera; a roosting bird was seen again in full daylight at La Florida

HUMMINGBIRDS: TROCHILIDAE (28)

White-necked Jacobin, Florisuga mellivora—Doña Dora, both visits to La Florida

White-whiskered Hermit, Phaethornis yaruqui—Doña Dora

Green Hermit, Phaethornis quy—(G) Seen by Manuel and Dave at La Minga

Tawny-bellied Hermit, Phaethornis syrmatophorus—Periodically came into the feeders at La Florida

White-throated Daggerbill, Schistes albogularis—(G) Seen briefly by Manuel at La Florida

Brown Violetear, Colibri delphinae—Regular feeder visitor at La Minga and La Florida

Lesser Violetear, Colibri cyanotus—Doña Dora

Ruby-topaz Hummingbird, *Chrysolampis mosquitus*—At least 2 males and a female visiting the flowering aloes at Parque de la Uva

Black-throated Mango, Anthracothorax nigricollis—Parque de la Uva

Green Thorntail, Discosura conversii—Doña Dora

Speckled Hummingbird, Adelomyia melanogenys—La Minga and La Florida

Long-tailed Sylph, Aglaiocercus kingii—La Minga and La Florida

Greenish Puffleg, Haplophaedia aureliae—La Florida on both visits

Bronzy Inca, Coeligena coeligena—La Florida on both visits

Buff-tailed Coronet, Boissonneaua flavescens—La Minga

Velvet-purple Coronet, Boissonneaua jardini—Doña Dora

White-booted Racket-tail, Ocreatus underwoodii—La Minga and La Florida; this is the northern species of a split of the former Booted Racket-tail

Rufous-gaped Hillstar, Urochroa bouqueri—Doña Dora

Purple-bibbed Whitetip, Urosticte benjamini—Doña Dora

Fawn-breasted Brilliant, Heliodoxa rubinoides—La Minga and La Florida

Green-crowned Brilliant, Heliodoxa jacula—Doña Dora, though not as numerous as Empress Brilliant

Empress Brilliant, Heliodoxa imperatrix—Doña Dora

Purple-throated Woodstar, Philodice mitchellii—La Florida on both visits

Western Emerald, Chlorostilbon melanorhynchus—Seen at Parque de la Uva and La Florida on both visits

Crowned Woodnymph, Thalurania colombica—Doña Dora and La Minga

Steely-vented Hummingbird, Saucerottia saucerottei—Parque de la Uva and La Florida

Rufous-tailed Hummingbird, Amazilia tzacatl—Parque de la Uva

Andean Emerald, Uranomitra franciae—Doña Dora and La Florida

LIMPKIN: ARAMIDAE (1)

Limpkin, Aramus guarauna—One bird seen at Parque de la Uva at the start of our walk

PLOVERS AND LAPWINGS: CHARADRIIDAE (1)

Southern Lapwing, Vanellus chilensis—Parque de la Uva and La Minga

CORMORANTS AND SHAGS: PHALACROCORACIDAE (1)

Neotropic Cormorant, Nannopterum brasilianum—Seen at the Sonesta before departing

HERONS, EGRETS, BITTERNS: ARDEIDAE (3)

Great Egret, Ardea alba—Seen in roadside ponds in the Cauca Valley

Snowy Egret, Egretta thula— Seen in roadside ponds in the Cauca Valley

Western Cattle Egret, Bubulcus ibis—Frequently seen from the road on the first 2 days

IBISES AND SPOONBILLS: THRESKIORNITHIDAE (1)

Bare-faced Ibis, Phimosus infuscatus—Many wandering around Parque de la Uva, especially under the grapes

NEW WORLD VULTURES: CATHARTIDAE (2)

Black Vulture, *Coragyps atratus*—Seen all days of the extension

Turkey Vulture, Cathartes aura—Recorded first 2 days of extension from the road

OSPREY: PANDIONIDAE (1)

Osprey, Pandion haliaetus—Several seen flying over ponds in the Cauca Valley

HAWKS, EAGLES, AND KITES: ACCIPITRIDAE (1)

Roadside Hawk, Rupornis magnirostris—One observed perching on a power line at Parque de la Uva

TROGONS: TROGONIDAE (1)

Golden-headed Quetzal, *Pharomachrus auriceps*—Good, but brief, views of this one were had at La Minga, first when it flew briefly out of a tree and then later on the entrance road

MOTMOTS: MOMOTIDAE (1)

Andean Motmot, Momotus aequatorialis—Encountered several times at Doña Dora and both visits to La Florida

KINGFISHERS: ALCEDINIDAE (1)

Ringed Kingfisher, Megaceryle torquata—A pair perched on the power line at Parque de la Uva

NEW WORLD BARBETS: CAPITONIDAE (2)

Red-headed Barbet, *Eubucco bourcierii*—Birds of both sexes easily seen at the fruit feeders at La Minga and La Florida

Spot-crowned Barbet, *Capito maculicoronatus*—A pair of this elegant barbet came into the feeding area at Doña Dora

TOUCAN-BARBETS: SEMNORNITHIDAE (1)

Toucan Barbet, *Semnornis ramphastinus*—A highlight of the extension, several of these gorgeous birds were seen at Doña Dora

WOODPECKERS: PICIDAE (4)

Grayish Piculet, Picumnus granadensis—(G) One seen by Manuel at Doña Dora

Acorn Woodpecker, *Melanerpes formicivorus*—Regular visitors at the feeders at La Minga and La Florida

Red-crowned Woodpecker, Melanerpes rubricapillus—Parque de la Uva

Red-rumped Woodpecker, *Dryobates kirkii*—A pair of these lovely species were very well seen while foraging in a dead tree at Parque de la Uva

FALCONS AND CARACARAS: FALCONIDAE (1)

Yellow-headed Caracara, Milvago chimachima—Seen every day of the extension when driving or in Cali

PARROTS: PSITTACIDAE (5)

Orange-chinned Parakeet, Brotogeris jugularis—Heard and seen by a few from their rooms at the Movich

Blue-headed Parrot, Pionus menstruus—Parque de la Uva

Spectacled Parrotlet, Forpus conspicillatus—Parque de la Uva

Chestnut-fronted Macaw, Ara severus—(G) Seen by Manuel at the Movich in Cali

Scarlet-fronted Parakeet, *Psittacara wagleri*—Small groups of these flew overhead many times at La Minga, but never did perch for good views

TYPICAL ANTBIRDS: THAMNOPHILIDAE (3)

Great Antshrike, Taraba major—A male very nicely viewed at Parque de la Uva

Bar-crested Antshrike, Thamnophilus multistriatus—(H) Parque de la Uva

Jet Antbird, *Cercomacra nigricans*—Several seen at very close range at Parque de la Uva; best views of this species on the tour

TAPACULOS: RHINOCRYPTIDAE (1)

Nariño Tapaculo, Scytalopus vicinior—(H) Heard at Doña Dora and La Minga

OVENBIRDS AND WOODCREEPERS: FURNARIIDAE (5)

Wedge-billed Woodcreeper, Glyphorynchus spirurus—Seen at Doña Dora during one of our walks

Cocoa Woodcreeper, Xiphorhynchus susurrans—Doña Dora

Streaked Xenops, Xenops rutilans—second visit to La Florida

Streak-capped Treehunter, Thripadectes virgaticeps— second visit to La Florida

Red-faced Spinetail, Cranioleuca erythrops— Doña Dora and La Florida

MANAKINS: PIPRIDAE (1)

Golden-winged Manakin, Masius chrysopterus—A female was foraging in one of the fruiting trees at La Minga

COTINGAS: COTINGIDAE (1)

Green-and-black Fruiteater, Pipreola riefferii—La Minga and La Florida

TYRANT FLYCATCHERS: TYRANNIDAE (14)

Scale-crested Pygmy-Tyrant, Lophotriccus pileatus—Doña Dora

Common Tody-Flycatcher, Todirostrum cinereum—Parque de la Uva

Cinnamon Flycatcher, Pyrrhomyias cinnamomeus—seen during the road walk at Doña Dora

Ornate Flycatcher, Myiotriccus ornatus—Doña Dora

Yellow-crowned Tyrannulet, Tyrannulus elatus—Parque de la Uva

Yellow-bellied Elaenia, Elaenia flavogaster—Parque de la Uva

Smoke-colored Pewee, Contopus fumigatus—seen at the start of the road walk at La Minga

Vermilion Flycatcher, Pyrocephalus rubinus—Parque de la Uva

Apical Flycatcher, Myiarchus apicalis—Parque de la Uva

Cattle Tyrant, Machetornis rixosa—seen at Sonesta Pereira before departing

Great Kiskadee, Pitangus sulphuratus—As expected, seen almost every day of the extension at many sites

Golden-bellied Flycatcher, Myiodynastes chrysocephalus—Doña Dora

Tropical Kingbird, Tyrannus melancholicus—Recorded on 2 days of the extension

Fork-tailed Flycatcher, Tyrannus savana—seen from the bus while driving through Cauca Valley

CROWS, JAYS, MAGPIES: CORVIDAE (1)

Green Jay, Cyanocorax yncas—La Minga

SWALLOWS: HIRUNDINIDAE (4)

Blue-and-white Swallow, Pygochelidon cyanoleuca—Several at Parque de la Uva and many at Cali airport

Southern Rough-winged Swallow, Stelgidopteryx ruficollis—Parque de la Uva

Barn Swallow, Hirundo rustica—Very large group of these at Parque de la Uva

Cliff Swallow, Petrochelidon pyrrhonota—(G) One seen by Dave in the large swallow flock at Parque de la Uva

WRENS: TROGLODYTIDAE (3)

House Wren, Troglodytes aedon—Seen or heard most days of the extension at most places visited

Gray-breasted Wood-Wren, Henicorhina negreti—(H) Singing at La Florida

Chestnut-breasted Wren, Cyphorhinus thoracicus—(H) Heard during our walk at La Minga along the road

THRUSHES AND ALLIES: TURDIDAE (4)

Andean Solitaire, Myadestes ralloides—(H) Heard at Doña Dora and La Minga; glimpsed at La Florida Swainson's Thrush, Catharus ustulatus—One seen briefly at La Minga from the patio Pale-eyed Thrush, Turdus leucops—(H) Heard during the road walk at La Minga Black-billed Thrush, Turdus ignobilis—Regular at Doña Dora and La Florida feeders

FINCHES, EUPHONIAS, ALLIES: FRINGILLIDAE (4)

Golden-rumped Euphonia, *Chlorophonia cyanocephala*—Seen by John at La Florida on the first visit **Thick-billed Euphonia**, *Euphonia laniirostris*—Parque de la Uva and Doña Dora **Orange-bellied Euphonia**, *Euphonia xanthogaster*—Doña Dora and La Florida (both visits) **Yellow-bellied Siskin**, *Spinus xanthogastrus*—seen at Sonesta Pereira before departing

Chestnut-capped Brushfinch, Arremon brunneinucha—La Florida on both visits

Rufous-collared Sparrow, Zonotrichia capensis—La Florida

White-naped Brushfinch, *Atlapetes albinucha*—Seen on both visits to La Florida; the Yellow-throated race occurs here

Tricolored (Choco) Brushfinch, *Atlapetes tricolor*—Easily seen at Doña Dora where they frequent the fruit feeders

ORIOLES, BLACKBIRDS, ALLIES: ICTERIDAE (3)

Yellow Oriole, Icterus nigrogularis—Parque de la Uva

Shiny Cowbird, Molothrus bonariensis—Parque de la Uva and La Florida

Great-tailed Grackle, Quiscalus mexicanus—Seen twice in Cali from the bus while driving

NEW WORLD WARBLERS: PARULIDAE (8)

Mourning Warbler, Geothlyis philadelphia—Doña Dora

Tropical Parula, Setophaga pitiayumi—Great views of one at La Florida on the second visit

Blackburnian Warbler, Setophaga fusca—Doña Dora, La Minga, and La Florida

Three-striped Warbler, Basileuterus triastriatus—Several seen at close range on the road walk at La Minga

Buff-rumped Warbler, Myiothlypis fulvicauda—Parque de la Uva and Doña Dora

Russet-crowned Warbler, *Myiothlypis coronata*—Excellent views of one of these were had at La Florida on the second visit when it came to glean insects of the black light sheet

Canada Warbler, Cardellina canadensis—La Minga and La Florida

Slate-throated Redstart, Myioborus miniatus—La Minga and La Florida

CARDINALS AND ALLIES: CARDINALIDAE (1)

Summer Tanager, Piranga rubra—Parque de la Uva and La Florida

TANAGERS AND ALLIES: THRAUPIDAE (26)

White-lined Tanager, Tachyphonus rufus—Intermittently came to the feeders at Doña Dora; also seen at La Florida

Flame-rumped Tanager, *Ramphocelus flammigerus*—Individuals of the Lemon-rumped race seen at Doña Dora and the flame-rumped race at La Minga and La Florida

Blue-winged Mountain Tanager, Anisognathus somptuosus—La Minga

Glistening-green Tanager, Chlorochrysa phoenicotis—At Doña Dora at the feeders and on the road walks Multicolored Tanager, Chlorochrysa nitidissima—Seen very well at the La Florida feeders on both visits Blue-gray Tanager, Thraupis episcopus—Parque de la Uva, Doña Dora, and La Florida

Palm Tanager, Thraupis palmarum—La Florida

Rufous-throated Tanager, Ixothraupis rufigula—Doña Dora

Golden-naped Tanager, Chalcothraupis ruficervix—La Minga and La Florida

Gray-and-gold Tanager, *Poecilostreptus palmeri*—A pair of these seen during the road walk at Doña Dora **Black-capped Tanager**, *Stilpnia heinei*—One appeared at the feeders at La Florida on the first visit

Scrub Tanager, Stilpnia vitriolina—La Florida

Beryl-spangled Tanager, *Tangara nigroviridis*—(G) Seen by Dave at La Minga, though not at the feeders **Metallic-green Tanager**, *Tangara labradorides*—One briefly sat in a tree at La Minga

Saffron-crowned Tanager, Tangara xanthocephala—La Minga

Golden Tanager, Tangara arthus—Doña Dora, La Minga, and La Florida

Silver-throated Tanager, *Tangara icterocephala*—One of the most common tanagers at the Doña Dora feeders **Green Honeycreeper**, *Chlorophanes spiza*—A common feeder visitor at Doña Dora, La Minga, and La Florida **White-sided Flowerpiercer**, *Diglossa albilatera*—Occasionally seen foraging in the flowering shrubs at La Florida

Rusty Flowerpiercer, Diglossa sittoides—(G) Seen by Manuel and Dave at La Minga

Masked Flowerpiercer, Diglossa cyanea—La Minga

Saffron Finch, Sicalis flaveola—Recorded all days of the extension at most sties visited

Blue-black Grassquit, Volatinia jacarina—Parque de la Uva

Bananaquit, Coereba flaveola—Found regularly at all the feeding stations visited

Black-winged Saltator, Saltator atripennis—La Minga

Streaked Saltator, Saltator striatipectus—Parque de la Uva

Central American Agouti, *Dasyprocta punctata*—Seen on both visits to La Florida **Red-tailed Squirrel**, *Sciurus granatensis*—Parque de la Uva **Andean Squirrel**, *Sciurus pulcheranii*—La Minga
