Honduras: Stellar Birding & Maya Ruins | Species List February 11 – 18, 2024 | with Naturalist Journeys

Honduras' varied landscapes offer the opportunity to see a wide variety of birds and other wildlife. Its vast pine-oak forests do not occur in countries to the south, which is part of the reason why so many North American migrants call Honduras 'home' for so many months. The southern winter months were still lingering, so the birds were still fairly 'quiet' at many sites and we encountered two full days of rain at Lake Yojoa. This resulted in a much lower than normal bird count. Regardless, we did observe some great birds, including species like Keel-billed Motmot and Elegant Trogon. The guided walk at the Mayan site was also a bonus addition to this trip.

A total 189 birds were recorded and were 17 heard only.

Family, Species Common Name, and Scientific Name

TINAMOUS:Tinamidae— (2)

Great Tinamou *Tinamus major*—HO near the restaurant at Meambar N.P. **Little Tinamou** *Crypturellus soui*—HO at the reservoir below Meambar N.P.

DUCKS, GEESE, AND SWANS: Anatidae — (6)

Black-bellied Whistling-Duck *Dendrocygna autumnalis*— A few small flocks seen from a distance during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Fulvous Whistling-Duck *Dendrocygna bicolor*— A few small flocks seen from a distance during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Muscovy Duck *Cairina moschata*—Several males seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa. Another seen at the Los Naranjos archaeological park.

Blue-winged Teal Spatula discors—Fairly large numbers seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

American Wigeon Mareca americana— Probably 70+ seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Lesser Scaup Aythya affinis — Large flotillas seen on Lake Yojoa, likely numbering into the lower 100's.

GUANS AND CURASSOWS:Cracidae— (2)

Plain headed Chachalaca *Ortalis cinereiceps*— Seen briefly along the entrance road to Meambar N.P. A few also seen on the hotel grounds of San Lucas in Copan.

Crested Guan Penelope purpurascens— A couple seen in the ravine near the Vencejo cabins at Meambar N.P.

GREBES:Podicipedidae— (2)

Least Grebe *Tachybaptus dominicus*— Two seen at beginning of boat ride, near the Pied-billed's. An unexpected sighting for this area.

Pied-billed Grebe Podilymbus podiceps—At least 20 seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

<u>PIGEONS AND DOVES: Columbidae — (9)</u>

Rock Pigeon (I) Columba livia— A few seen in San Pedro Sula before departing for Lake Yojoa. A few also seen around Pena Blanca.

Pale-vented Pigeon Patagioenas cayennensis—Small numbers seen just below Meambar N.P.

Red-billed Pigeon *Patagioenas flavirostris*—A few seen along the entrance road to Meambar N.P. One flew over the grounds at H. San Lucas in Copan.

Short-billed Pigeon Patagioenas nigrirostris— HO-A few heard on Day 2 at Meambar N.P.

Inca Dove *Columbina inca*—A few seen at the Mayan Ruins site in Copan.

Ruddy Ground Dove Columbinatalpacoti— Seen at H. Metrotel on Day 1.

White-tipped Dove *Leptotila verreauxi*— Heard numerous times on Day 2 at Meambar N.P. Also, heard at the Las Sepulturas site and seen on the lawn at H. San Lucas in Copan.

Gray-headed Dove Leptotila plumbeiceps— HO along the entrance road to Meambar N.P.

White-winged Dove Zenaida asiatica— Small numbers seen around San Pedro Sula and Pena Blanca.

CUCKOOS AND ALLIES:Cuculidae— (2)

Groove-billed Ani *Crotophaga sulcirostris*— Small numbers seen in fields during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa. A small flock seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Squirrel Cuckoo *Piayacayana*— Two seen near the canopy tower at Meambar N.P. on Day 2. Also observed during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa and numerous times along the entrance road to Meambar. Also seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan. Quite common this trip.

NIGHTJARS:Caprimulgidae— (1)

Common Pauraque *Nyctidromus albicollis*—HO near the hotel grounds at San Lucas.

SWIFTS: Apodidae — (2)

White-collared Swift *Streptoprocne zonaris*—One large flock seen above the visitor center at Meambar N.P. A few also seen on the grounds at H. San Lucas in Copan.

Vaux's Swift Chaetura vauxi— A large flock of at least 30 birds seen by the reservoir below Meambar N.P.

HUMMINGBIRDS: Trochilidae — (6)

Long-billed Hermit Phaethornis longirostris— At least two seen on the feeders at Meambar N.P.

Stripe-throated Hermit *Phaethornis striigularis*— () Many heard and a few seen at leks inside the forest along most lower trails at Meambar N.P. Very hard to locate them on their perches.

Violet Sabrewing Campylopterus hemileucurus— Males and females observed daily on the feeders at Meambar N.P.

White-bellied Hummingbird *Amazilia candida*—Seen daily at the feeders at Meambar as well as in adjacent forested habitats.

Cinnamon Hummingbird *Amazilia rutila*— Seen at H. Metrotel in San Pedro Sula. One observed at the Los Naranjos arch site feeding on Porterweed. Seen at Hotel San Lucas and the Las Sepulturas site.

Rufous-tailed Hummingbird *Amazilia tzacatl*— Seen daily at different sites around Lake Yojoa. The most common hummingbird species observed.

RAILS, COOTS, AND ALLIES:Rallidae— (4)

Common Gallinule *Gallinula galeata*—Many seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

American Coot *Fulica americana*—Small flotillas seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Purple Gallinule Porphyrio martinica— Half dozen seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Ruddy Crake Laterallus ruber—One seen briefly in a weedy field along the entrance road to Meambar N.P.

LIMPKIN:Aramidae— (1)

Limpkin Aramus guarauna—Small numbers seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

STILTS AND AVOCETS:Recurvirostridae— (1)

Black-necked Stilt *Himantopus mexicanus*—One small group seen in an inlet during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

PLOVERS AND LAPWINGS: Charadriidae — (1)

Killdeer Charadrius vociferus — Seen by some during the drive from Lake Yojoa to Copan Ruins.

JACANAS: Jacanidae — (1)

Northern Jacana Jacana spinosa—Adults and immatures seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

SANDPIPERS AND ALLIES: Scolopacidae — (1)

Spotted Sandpiper *Actitis macularius*—A few seen along the Copan River near H. San Lucas.

GULLS AND TERNS:Laridae — (1)

Laughing Gull Leucophaeus atricilla— Two observed during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

STORKS: Ciconiidae — (1)

Wood Stork *Mycteria americana*—Seen by some participants along the highway en route from Lake Yojoa to Copan.

CORMORANTS: Phalacrocoracidae — (1)

Neotropic Cormorant *Nannopterum brasilianum*—A couple observed during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

HERONS AND EGRETS: Ardeidae — (9)

Bare-throated Tiger-Heron Tigrisoma mexicanum— Two seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Great Blue Heron Ardea herodias—Small numbers seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Great Egret *Ardea alba*— Seen along the drive from San Pedro Sula to Meambar N.P. Small numbers seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa. A few also seen during the drive from Lake Yojoa to Copan as well as along the Copan River.

Snowy Egret *Egretta thula*— A few observed during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa. A few also seen during the drive from Lake Yojoa to Copan as well as along the Copan River.

Little Blue Heron *Egretta caerulea*— Small numbers seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa. Two seen along the Copan River.

Tricolored Heron *Egretta tricolor*— Three seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Western Cattle Egret *Bubulcus ibis*— Small numbers seen along the drive from San Pedro Sula to Meambar N.P. A few also seen during the drive from Lake Yojoa to Copan as well as along the Copan River.

Green Heron Butorides virescens— Small numbers seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Black-crowned Night-Heron Nycticorax nycticorax — A few observed during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

NEW WORLD VULTURES: Cathartidae — (3)

Black Vulture *Coragyps atratus*— Seen daily virtually everywhere.

Turkey Vulture *Cathartes aura*—Seen daily virtually everywhere.

Lesser Yellow-headed Vulture *Cathartes burrovianus*— Small numbers seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa. Another perched individual seen along the boardwalk at Los Naranjos arch site.

OSPREY:Pandionidae— (1)

Osprey *Pandion haliaetus*— A couple observed during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa. Another one seen at the reservoir below Meambar N.P.

HAWKS, KITES, AND EAGLES: Accipitridae — (6)

Swallow-tailed Kite *Elanoidesforficatus*—One seen briefly soaring overhead at Meambar N.P. on Day 2. Another seen along the main highway en route from Copan to San Pedro Sula.

Snail Kite Rostrhamus sociabilis— Many seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Common Black Hawk Buteogallus anthracinus—Seen by some in early am hours at H. San Lucas.

Roadside Hawk *Rupornis magnirostris*—A couple seen along the highway from Lake Yojoa to Copan Ruins. Another pair at the Copan Mayan site.

Gray Hawk *Buteo plagiatus*— One seen at H. Metrotel in San Pedro Sula. Another seen along the boardwalk at Los Naranjos arch site. One HO at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Short-tailed Hawk *Buteo brachyurus*— One light morph seen at H. Metrotel in San Pedro Sula. One dark morph seen at Meambar N.P. on Day 2.

OWLS: Strigidae — (3)

Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl *Glaucidium brasilianum*— Two seen during the lunch break along the canal after the boat ride. Another seen on two consecutive afternoons along the road below Meambar N.P. One seen at close range at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Mottled Owl Strix virgata — HO by some at H. San Lucas in Copan.

Great Horned Owl *Bubo virginianus*—HO by some at H. San Lucas in Copan.

TROGONS: Trogonidae— (3)

Gartered Trogon *Trogon caligatus*— Male and female observed well at Meambar N.P. on Day 2. Also observed along the entrance road below Meambar N.P. A male seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Elegant Trogon *Trogon elegans*—Two males seen in the forest very close to the restaurant at H. San Lucas.

Collared Trogon Trogon collaris — Male and female observed at Meambar N.P. on Day 2.

MOTMOTS: Momotidae— (3)

Lesson's Motmot *Momotus lessonii*— Observed at close range at Meambar N.P. Common there. Seen at H. San Lucas in Copan and the Las Sepulturas site.

Keel-billed Motmot *Electron carinatum*— At least five seen at Meambar N.P. all at once high the canopy. A pair was seen well at close range from the canopy tower.

Turquoise-browed Motmot *Eumomota superciliosa*— Seen numerous times along the lower entrance road to Meambar N.P. Many seen in Copan at H. San Lucas and both Mayan sites.

KINGFISHERS: Alcedinidae— (1)

Belted Kingfisher *Megaceryle alcyon*— At least 4 seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa. Another pair seen at the reservoir below Meambar N.P.

TOUCANS: Ramphastidae — (2)

Collared Aracari *Pteroglossustorquatus*— Small numbers seen at Meambar N.P. Several seen at H. San Lucas in Copan. **Keel-billed Toucan** *Ramphastossulfuratus*— Seen and heard at Meambar N.P. A pair was seen at close range while having lunch on Day 2.

WOODPECKERS: Picidae — (4)

Golden-fronted Woodpecker *Melanerpes aurifrons*—Seen virtually daily at most sites. This is the most abundant woodpecker in Honduras.

Yellow-bellied Sapsucker *Sphyrapicus varius*—Seen by some at the main Mayan archaeological site. Another also seen in the forest at H. San Lucas.

Lineated Woodpecker *Dryocopus lineatus*—Seen by some at H. San Lucas and another at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan. Another also observed at H. San Lcuas.

Golden-olive Woodpecker Colaptes rubiginosus— Several heard on Day 2 at Meambar N.P.

FALCONS AND CARACARAS:Falconidae—(4)

Laughing Falcon *Herpetotheres cachinnans*— Heard only near the reservoir below Meambar N.P. Seen at H. San Lucas in Copan.

Collared Forest-Falcon Micrastur semitorquatus— HO-A pair heard calling at dawn at Meambar N.P. on Day 2.

Crested Caracara *Caracara plancus*— Seen by some participants at H. Metrotel in San Pedro Sula. One flew over the visitor center at Los Naranjos arch site. A 'saving grace' caracara flew by the bus on the last afternoon along a road just north of Copan. Barbara had been wanting to see one the entire trip.

American Kestrel *Falco sparverius* — Seen along the highway between Lake Yojoa and Copan Ruinas. Another seen in ravine below H. San Lucas in Copan.

PARROTS: Psittacidae —(7)

Brown-hooded Parrot Pyrilia haematotis— A pair fly over along the entrance road to Meambar N.P.

White-crowned Parrot *Pionus senilis* — Heard at Meambar N.P. on Day 2. A few seen flying overhead along the entrance road to Meambar.

Red-lored Parrot *Amazona autumnalis*— Seen at H. Metrotel in San Pedro Sula. Two pair seen along the boardwalk at Los Naranjos arch site.

White-fronted Parrot Amazona albifrons—A few seen at the main Mayan archaeological site in Copan.

Red-throated Parakeet *Aratinga rubritorques*—A few seen passing low overhead at the main Mayan archaeological site. **Olive-throated Parakeet** *Eupsittula nana* — A pair briefly seen passing overhead at Meambar N.P. on Day 2. A few seen at the main Mayan archaeological site in Copan. A small flock perched at the H. San Lucas.

Scarlet Macaw *Ara macao*—We saw a group of 4-6 almost daily at H. San Lucas. All were apparently investigating the two next boxes on the property.

ANTBIRDS: Thamnophilidae— (2)

Barred Antshrike*Thamnophilus doliatus*— A pair HO along the entrance road to Meambar N.P. Also heard the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Dusky Antbird Cercomacroides tyrannina—HO at Meambar N.P. on Day 2.

OVENBIRDS AND WOODCREEPERS: Furnariidae — (2)

Northern Barred-Woodcreeper Dendrocolaptes sanctithomae— Two seen well at Meambar N.P.

Ivory-billed Woodcreeper *Xiphorhynchus flavigaster*—Seen well along the entrance road below Meambar N.P. and others heard in the area. Many heard at different sites in Copan. The most common woodcreeper in Honduras.

MANAKINS: Pipridae— (1)

White-collared Manakin *Manacus candei*— A male was briefly seen on an upper trail at Meambar N.P. on Day 2. A few others heard along the entrance road to Meambar.

TITYRAS AND BECARDS: Tityridae— (2)

Masked Tityra *Tityra semifasciata*— A male/female pair seen at Meambar N.P. on Day 2, apparently inspecting a nest site. Also seen at H. San Lucas, the main Mayan archaeological site, and Las Sepulturas in Copan.

Rose-throated Becard *Pachyramphus aglaiae*—A male seen at close range below the bar at H. San Lucas. Male-female pair also seen at H. San Lucas and others at the Las Sepulturas site.

TYRANT FLYCATCHERS: Tyrannidae — (20)

Ochre-bellied Flycatcher *Mionectes oleagineus*— One seen at close range near the visitor center at Los Naranjos arch site. One also seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Northern Bentbill Oncostoma cinereigulare— HO near the tower at Meambar N.P.

Yellow-olive Flatbill *Tolmomyias sulphurescens*— One seen accompanying a mixed flock in the subcanopy at Meambar N.P. on Day 2. Another seen along the entrance road to Meambar N.P. Another seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Yellow-bellied Elaenia Elaenia flavogaster— Two seen well at the reservoir below Meambar N.P.

Mistletoe Tyrannulet *Zimmerius parvus*— One heard at Meambar N.P. on Day 2. One seen on the grounds at H. San Lucas. That is an unusual habitat for this species.

Northern Tropical Pewee Contopus bogotensis—Several seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Greater Pewee *Contopus pertinax*—HO in a stand of pines along a road just north of Copan.

Yellow-bellied Flycatcher *Empidonax flaviventris*— Several heard and seen at Meambar N.P. on Day 2 and 4. Also heard and seen at various sites in Copan. The most widespread migrant *Empidonax* in Honduras.

Willow Flycatcher Empidonax traillii—Two seen at the Los Naranjos arch site along the boardwalk.

Hammond's Flycatcher Empidonax hammondii—One seen at the edge of a field at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Least Flycatcher Empidonax minimus—One observed by some at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Black Phoebe *Sayornis nigricans* — Several seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa. A few also seen along the Copan River.

Bright-rumped Attila Attila spadiceus— HO at Meambar N.P. on Day 2.

Dusky-capped Flycatcher *Myiarchus tuberculifer*— A pair seen from the tower at Meambar N.P. on Day 2. Also seen along the road below Meambar N.P. Also observed at the Las Sepulturas site and H. San Lucas in Copan.

Great Crested Flycatcher *Myiarchus crinitus*— One heard only along the entrance road below Meambar N.P. Others observed at the Las Sepulturas site and H. San Lucas in Copan

Brown-crested Flycatcher *Myiarchus tyrannulus*— One seen in the forest at H. San Lucas.

Great Kiskadee Pitangus sulphuratus — Many seen at different sites throughout the trip. Common.

Boat-billed Flycatcher *Megarynchus pitangua*— A pair seen along the entrance road to Meambar N.P. Also observed at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan

Social Flycatcher *Myiozetetes similis*— Seen in small numbers at many sites in more open areas or with light forest. Also observed at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan

Tropical Kingbird *Tyrannus melancholicus*— Seen in small numbers in more open areas, often perched on wires. Some seen perched on emergent vegetation during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

VIREOS: Vireonidae— (4)

Rufous-browed Peppershrike *Cyclarhis gujanensis*— Seen at close range below the bar at H. San Lucas. Also, many heard and seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Lesser Greenlet Pachysylvia decurtata— A few seen and heard at Meambar N.P.

Yellow-throated Vireo *Vireo flavifrons*— One observed at Meambar N.P. Another also seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

White-eyed Vireo Vireo griseus—One spotted by Bob at the Los Naranjos arch site.

CROWS AND JAYS: Corvidae — (3)

White-throated Magpie-Jay Calocitta formosa—Many observed at different sites in Copan.

Green Jay Cyanocorax luxuosus—Two seen along the entrance road below Meambar N.P.

Brown Jay *Psilorhinus morio*— Many seen at different sites around Lake Yojoa where common. Also observed at H. San Lucas in Copan.

SWALLOWS AND MARTINS: Hirundinidae — (5)

Northern Rough-winged Swallow Stelgidopteryx serripennis— Fairly large numbers seen during the boat ride on Lake

Yojoa. A few more seen at the reservoir below Meambar N.P. Many seen along the Copan River.

Gray-breasted Martin *Progne chalybea*— Heard at the main Mayan site in Copan. Several seen along the main highway en route from Copan to San Pedro Sula.

Barn Swallow *Hirundo rustica* — Small numbers seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Mangrove Swallow Tachycineta albilinea—Seen by Bob along the Chamelecon R. as we passed near San Pedro Sula.

Tree Swallow Tachycineta bicolor—Large numbers seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

GNATCATCHERS: Polioptilidae— (2)

Long-billed Gnatwren Ramphocaenus melanurus— HO by the canopy tower at Meambar N.P.

Blue-gray Gnatcatcher Polioptila caerulea— One seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

WRENS: Troglodytidae — (5)

House Wren *Troglodytes aedon*— Seen at the hotel Microtel in San Pedro Sula.

Rufous-naped Wren *Campylorhynchus rufinucha*— Seen at the hotel Microtel in San Pedro Sula. Heard at Los Naranjos arch site. Also seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Spot-breasted Wren *Pheugopedius maculipectus*— Seen well along the entrance road below Meambar N.P. Seen by some at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan

Cabanis's Wren *Cantorchilus modestus*— Seen briefly below the bar at H. San Lucas. Also heard at the Las Sepulturas site.

White-breasted Wood-Wren Henicorhina leucosticta— HO along the trails at Meambar N.P.

MOCKINGBIRDS AND THRASHERS: Mimidae— (1)

Gray Catbird *Dumetella carolinensis* — Seen along the entrance road to Meambar N.P. and many present at the Los Naranjos arch site.

<u>THRUSHES: Turdidae — (2)</u>

Wood Thrush *Hylocichla mustelina* — Common within Meambar N.P. and many along the trails at Los Naranjos arch site. Also seen at various sites in Copan.

Clay-colored Thrush Turdus grayi— Common virtually everywhere.

OLD WORLD SPARROWS: Passeridae— (1)

House Sparrow (I) *Passer domesticus*— A few seen in Pena Blanca. Seen in some towns along the drive from Lake Yojoa to Copan Ruins.

FINCHES AND EUPHONIAS: Fringillidae — (2)

Yellow-throated Euphonia *Euphonia hirundinacea*— A male-female pair seen during lunch along the canal at Lake Yojoa. **Lesser Goldfinch** *Spinus psaltria*— A few seen at the hotel Microtel in San Pedro Sula.

NEW WORLD SPARROWS: Passerellidae— (1)

Green-backed Sparrow Arremonops chloronotus— HO along the entrance road to Meambar N.P.

NEW WORLD BLACKBIRDS: Icteridae — (13)

Yellow-billed Cacique Amblycercus holosericeus— HO along the entrance road to Meambar N.P.

Chestnut-headed Oropendola Psarocolius wagleri — Small numbers observed in Meambar N.P.

Montezuma Oropendola *Psarocolius montezuma* — Small numbers seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa and along the entrance road to Meambar N.P. A few seen at H. San Lucas in Coppan.

Orchard Oriole Icterus spurius— Seen at H. Microtel in San Pedro Sula and a few during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Streak-backed Oriole Icterus pustulatus— Many seen at different sites around Copan.

Spot-breasted Oriole *Icterus pectoralis* — Many seen at different sites around Copan, often with the Streak-backed and Altamira.

Altamira Oriole Icterus gularis—Seen by some at the H. Microtel in San Pedro Sula.

Baltimore Oriole Icterus galbula — Seen at H. Microtel in San Pedro Sula and during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Red-winged Blackbird Agelaius phoeniceus — Many males and females seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Bronzed Cowbird *Molothrus aeneus* —A few seen at H. San Lucas.

Giant Cowbird *Molothrus oryzivorus*—One seen flying overhead along a road just north of Copan.

Melodious Blackbird *Dives dives*— Many heard and seen in light forest conditions at many sites. Common in Honduras. **Great-tailed Grackle** *Quiscalus mexicanus* — Common around cities.

NEW WORLD WARBLERS: Parulidae — (18)

Ovenbird Seiurus aurocapilla—One seen at the Los Naranjos arch site.

Northern Waterthrush *Parkesia noveboracensis*— A few seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa and others at the Los Naranjos arch site.

Blue-winged Warbler Vermivora cyanoptera—One briefly seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Golden-winged Warbler *Vermivora chrysoptera* — One briefly seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan, with the Bluewinged.

Black-and-white Warbler *Mniotilta varia* — One seen at Meambar N.P. and another at the Los Naranjos arch site. Also seen at the Las Sepulturas site and H. San Lucas in Copan.

Tennessee Warbler *Leiothlypis peregrina* — A few seen at the H. Microtel in San Pedro Sula. A flock seen at the beginning of the boat ride on Lake Yojoa. A few individuals along the entrance road to Meambar N.P.

Gray-crowned Yellowthroat *Geothlypis poliocephala*—One seen in a weedy field adjacent to the Las Sepulturas site in Copan as it was being plowed.

Common Yellowthroat *Geothlypis trichas*—A few heard and seen during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa as well as in the marshes at the Los Naranjos arch site. Also seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Kentucky Warbler *Geothlypis formosa*—One seen at Meambar N.P. along the trail and at least two at the Los Naranjos arch site.

Hooded Warbler *Setophaga citrina*— Seen almost daily at Meambar N.P. and along the lower entrance road. Others seen at the Los Naranjos arch site. Also seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

American Redstart *Setophaga ruticilla* — A female seen from the tower at Meambar N.P. Another one along the road below Meambar. Numerous males seen at the Los Naranjos arch site. Also seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Magnolia Warbler *Setophaga magnolia*—Seen along the entrance road to Meambar N.P. and a few at the Los Naranjos arch site. Many seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Yellow Warbler *Setophaga petechia* — Seen by some at the H. Microtel in San Pedro Sula. Another during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa. A male seen at H. San Lucas and the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Chestnut-sided Warbler *Setophaga pensylvanica* —Small numbers seen within Meambar N.P. and others along the entrance road to Meambar. A few at the Los Naranjos arch site. Also seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Black-throated Green Warbler *Setophaga virens* — Two seen within Meambar N.P. on Day 2. One seen at H. San Lucas in Copan.

Chestnut-capped Warbler Basileuterus delattrii—Several seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Golden-crowned Warbler Basileuterus culicivorus—One seen well from the tower at Meambar N.P. on Day 2.

Wilson's Warbler *Cardellina pusilla*—A few seen at the Los Naranjos arch site. Another seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

CARDINALS AND ALLIES: Cardinalidae — (7)

Summer Tanager *Piranga rubra* — A few males and females seen at different sites around Lake Yojoa. Also seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Red-crowned Ant-Tanager *Habia rubica*— A small flock seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Red-throated Ant-Tanager *Habia fuscicauda*—A few females seen at the Los Naranjos arch site.

Rose-breasted Grosbeak Pheucticus Iudovicianus—Seen by some at the H. Microtel in San Pedro Sula.

Blue-black Grosbeak Cyanoloxia cyanoides—One female observed along the forest trail within Meambar N.P.

Indigo Bunting Passerina cyanea—Seen by some at the H. Microtel in San Pedro Sula.

Painted Bunting Passerina ciris— One female seen flying out of a weedy field at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

TANAGERS AND ALLIES: Thraupidae — (7)

Blue-gray Tanager Thraupis episcopus—Seen by some at the H. Microtel in San Pedro Sula.

Yellow-winged Tanager Thraupis abbas—Seen at the H. Microtel in San Pedro Sula and the Los Naranjos arch site.

Blue-black Grassquit *Volatinia jacarina*—One female seen in a weedy field at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Morelet's Seedeater *Sporophila morelleti*— Seen at the H. Microtel in San Pedro Sula and a few at the reservoir below Meambar N.P.

Buff-throated Saltator *Saltator maximus* — A few seen along the road below Meambar N.P. and one at the Los Naranjos arch site

Black-headed Saltator *Saltator atriceps*—A few seen along the road below Meambar N.P. A few seen at H. San Lucas in Copan.

Cinnamon-bellied Seedeater *Saltator grandis* — Seen at the H. Microtel in San Pedro Sula and one at the Los Naranjos arch site.

MAMMALS:— (4)

Proboscis Bat *Rhynchonycteris naso*— A large group seen on the side of a huge boulder during the boat ride on Lake Yojoa.

Central American Agouti *Dasyprocta punctata* —Individuals seen at Meambar N.P., the Los Naranjos arch site, and the main Mayan site in Copan.

Variegated Squirrel *Sciurus variegatoides*— Individuals seen at Meambar N.P., the Las Sepulturas arch site, and the main Mayan site in Copan.

White-nosed Coati Nasua narica — Smalls groups and one individual seen at Meambar N.P.

REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS:— (2)

Green Iguana *Iguana iguana*— A large, orange-colored male observed in the trees at H. Microtel in San Pedro Sula. **Rose-bellied Lizard** *Sceleporus variabilis*—One seen at the main Mayan site in Copan.

BUTTERFLIES (17)

Black-banded White Itaballia demophile—Many seen at both arch sites in Copan.

Brown-bordered White *Itaballia pandosia*—One observed at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Yellow Angled-Sulphur Anteos maerula—One feeding on Bougainvillea at H. San Lucas.

Orange-barred Sulphur *Phoebis philea*—Two feeding on Bougainvillea at H. San Lucas.

Cloudless Sulphur Phoebis sennae—One feeding on Bougainvillea at San Lucas.

Cattleheart White Archonias brassolis—One seen by the tower at Meambar N.P.

Rusty Clearwing *Great morgane*—Many seen along trails at Meambar N.P.

Julia Dryas iulia—Some seen at Meambar N.P.

Crimson-patched Longwing Heliconius erato—Seen along the entrance road to Meambar N.P.

Starry Cracker Hamadryas laodamia—A female seen by the restaurant at Meambar N.P.

Banded Peacock Anartia fatima—Seen virtually everywhere. The most common butterfly in Honduras.

Malachite Siproeta stelenes—One seen at the Las Sepulturas site in Copan.

Northern Olivewing Nessaea aglaura—One female seen at Meambar N.P.

Blue-stitched Eighty-eight Callicore astarte—Two seen mating along a trail at Meambar N.P.

Intricate Satyr Hermeuptychia intricata—Seen virtually everywhere. The most common satyr in Honduras. Golden Euselasia Euselasia chrysippe—Two seen from atop the tower at Meambar N.P. Black-edged Euselasia Euselasia cataleuca—Two seen by the tower at Meambar N.P.
