## **2011 ALASKA BIRD LIST**

**Gr White-fronted Goose** A scattering of individuals throughout Denali's wetlands.

**Canada Goose** Ubiquitous anywhere in interior of Alaska with farmed fields & water.

**Cackling Canada Goose** Small groups of taverneri on Safety Sound.

**Emperor Goose** A pair at the Safety Sound bridge were outstanding!

**Brant** Late migrants were scattered along Safety Sound out of Nome.

Trumpeter Swan
Tundra Swan
About 200 of these birds were concentrated along Safety Sound.
A male and female were feeding in Westchester Lagoon in ANC.
Probably the second most common waterfowl in our travels.

American wigeon Frobably the second most common waterlown in our travels.

Mallard Certainly not a common bird on this trip, with five being the high count.

N. Shoveler The white belly & dark head made for easy identification.N.Pintail The most common waterfowl on our trip – everywhere.

Green-winged TealSmall numbers of this handsome bird were seen in all areas of Alaska.Ring-necked DuckA pair of birds were spotted in the kettle ponds on Denali Road.Greater ScaupThe "common" scaup for our trip. In most freshwater ponds.Lesser ScaupA few individuals of this "peaked" species. Best looks in Denali.Common EiderSafety Sound had scattered pairs of the subtle female & gaudy male.Harlequin DuckFine looks at this striking bird in Nome & along the Seward shoreline.

**Surf Scoter** Our boat trip produced lingering sea duck pairs.

Black Scoter A flock at the Nome harbor gave us great looks at the Velvet Scoter.

Long-tailed Duck Numerous pairs with the best look at a striking male on Kougarauk Rd.

**Bufflehead** A pair on Westchester Lagoon was all we saw. **Common Goldeneye** A gorgeous male seen from the train to Anchorage.

**Barrow's Goldeneye** Common in the waters around Seward.

**Red-breasted Merg**Loose groups in the ocean opposite Safety Sound. **Willow Ptarmigan**Often seen perched alongside all the roads in Nome.

**Rock Ptarmigan**Teller Road out of Nome had scattered individuals on rocky sentinels. **Red-throated Loon**Beautiful alternate plumaged adults on small ponds throughout Nome.

**Pacific Loon** An alternate plumaged adult on Safety Sound.

**Common Loon** A stunning adult on Wonder Lake.

Horned Grebe A pair were building a nest on a kettle pond in Denali!

**Red-necked Grebe** The best view was on Westchester Lagoon of nesting adults! **N. Fulmar** One dark phase adult were seen by a few around the Chiswells.

**Sooty Shearwater** A fly by on our pelagic trip to NW Glacier out of Seward.

**Double-crested Corm** Numerous on Resurrection Bay out of Seward.

**Red-faced Cormorant** Vibrant birds off of the Chiswell Islands out of Seward!

**Pelagic Cormorant** White-thighed adults were the most common cormorant in SE Alaska. **Bald Eagle** The common raptor on the trip, but stunning every time we saw one.

Northern Harrier More common than you would think in AK. Everywhere!

**Rough-legged Hawk** Only saw one on Teller Road.

Golden Eagle A nesting pair on the Kougarok gave us our best looks.

Merlin A single individual blasted by us on Safety Sound.

Gyrfalcon
The best look at this striking falcon was on Kougarok Road.

Sandhill Crane
Large rust and gray-colored birds were feeding in Cook Inlet.

Stunning alternate plumaged birds along the road to Cape Wooley.

Am. Golden Plover
Seemed to be on every nearly level slope in Nome. Gorgeous!

Pacific Golden Plover
Not as common as the above, but in the same habitat.

Semipalmated Plover
Usually found along the Nome Roads defending territories.

**Black Oystercatcher** From our boat along the Seward Peninsula. **Spotted Sandpiper** Along Safety Sound in the Nome area.

**Solitary Sandpiper** A solitary individual gave us looks along side a LeYe in Denali..

**Wandering Tattler** A pair was seen roosting along the Kougarok Road.

**Greater Yellowlegs** Westchester Lagoon had a single bird along the coastal side.

**Lesser Yellowlegs** Seen on the kettle ponds deep inside Denali.

**Whimbrel** A pair chasing a jaeger were well lit by Nome's morning light.

**Bristle-thighed Curlew** A beautiful individual circled overhead calling & then landed nearby.

**Bar-tailed Godwit** The Situk River had a solitary individual.

**Semipalmated Sandpiper** Their aerial displays wowed all of us. What stamina!

Western Sandpiper Their hunch-backed territorial displays in Nome were easily recognized

**Spotted Sandpiper** Any freshwater or rocky shoreline had a pair.

**Least Sandpiper** No breeding individuals, but scattered groups in Nome were present.

**Dunlin** This black-bellied sandpiper was on the Cape Wooley Road.

**Long-billed Dowitcher** Great looks at an alternate plumaged individual on a kettle pond. **Wilson's Snipe** Their aerial displays in and around Nome brought all eyes skyward.

**Red-necked Phalarope** The appropriate sized pond in Nome usually had a pair.

**Black-legged Kittiwake** Nesting colonies at the outlet of Resurrection Bay were a treat!

Sabine's Gull

A nice adult in the ocean along Safety Sound.

Bonaparte's Gull

In the kettle ponds along the Denali Road.

Mew Gull Common everywhere in Alaska. The loud call resonated everywhere!

**Herring Gull** Individuals scattered around Alaska.

**Glaucous-winged Gull** Westchester Lagoon and Seward each had a of worn individual.

Glaucous Gull The gull in Nome!!!

**Aleutian Tern** The colony at the Bonanza bridge were gone but had a flyby in Nome.

**Arctic Tern** The "common" tern in most of our stops in Alaska.

Parasitic Jaeger An individual appeared to be searching for the AGPI's nest at Wooley

Pomeraine Jaeger A nice adult on the way to Safety Sound

**Long-tailed Jaeger** The most common and agile aerial hunter in areas around Nome. **Common Murre** The "common" alcid on our boat trip thru Resurrection Bay.

**Pigeon Guillemot** Not as common as the murre, but plenty of pairs on the boat trip.

Marbled Murrelet Seen from shore in Seward quite close to shore. Great looks!

Kittlitz's Murrelet Just outside the ice floe from the Northwestern Glacier.

Ancient Murrelet There were a few small flocks out in the Chiswells.

**Cassin's Auklet** A few flybys by the Humpback Whales.

**Rhinoceros Auklet** We saw them from the boat, but mostly from the back as they flew.

**Horned Puffin** Abundant out by the Chiswell Islands.

**Tufted Puffin** More abundant than the Horned and usually in pairs.

**Rock Pigeon** In Anchorage and Fairbanks.

**Belted Kingfisher** A single bird by the River's Edge Resort.

**Downy Woodpecker** A female gathering food at Westchester Lagoon was one of two **N. Flicker** We had one Yellow-shafted with all the others being Red-shafted.

Olive-sided Flycatcher On the "Moderate" hike at Camp Denali.

Alder Flycatcher Calling in Fairbanks and a few in Nome.

Say's Phoebe Interesting to see this desert dweller along the Denali Road.

**N. Shrike** A single bird in the Safety Sound area.

**Gray Jay** Camp robbers were in the campground in Chugach National Forest.

**Steller's Jay** Along the roadside between Seward and Anchorage.

**Black-billed Magpie** Everywhere in the lower part of the state, especially in urban areas

**Northwestern Crow** Seward had their fair share of these coastal crows.

Common RavenAn incredibly adaptive bird given that it was in all habitats.Tree SwallowThe most common of the swallows, especially in Fairbanks.Violet-green SwallowLoosely associated with Tree Swallow flocks in migration north.

**N. Rough-winged Swallow** A pair in the Anchorage area were the only ones

**Bank Swallow** On the Seward Highway and in Seward at exposed sandy cliffs.

**Cliff Swallow** Common in Anchorage and other areas of the state.

**Barn Swallow** A few individuals as far north as Nome. **Black-capped Chickadee** In the forests of Fairbanks and Seward.

Boreal ChickadeeOne individual nesting behind ABO in Fairbanks.Red-breasted NuthatchA pair entertained us near the Copper Whale Inn.American DipperOne along the road between Seward and Alyeska.

Ruby-crowned KingletCommon singers in Anchorage and Fairbanks woodlands.Arctic WarblerFirst of the season bird in Denali was singing his head off.N. WheatearGood looks at a pair on Teller Road as they foraged together.

Gray-cheeked Thrush
Swainson's Thrush
Singing in most willow filled draws I the Nome area.
Singing birds in the woodland behind our Fairbanks hotel.

Hermit Thrush In the Chugach National Forest campgrounds between Seward & ANC.

American Robin Hard to miss this red-breasted singer anywhere there were fields.

**Varied Thrush** Great looks in the Chugach National Forest.

European StarlingE. Yellow WagtailAmerican PipitIn Anchorage, Seward and Fairbanks.Seen on all three roads out of Nome!Alongside the road in the Nome area.

**Bohemian Waxwing** Great looks at a small flock in the Georgeson Botanic Gardens.

**Lapland Longspur** All along the Safety Sound road.

**Orange-crowned Warbler** Bright Alaska males were singing their hearts out. **Yellow Warbler** Common where trees were available for singing.

**Yellow-rumped Warbler** We only saw Myrtle's on this trip, and the males were stunning.

**Townsend's Warbler** A singing male in the woodlands behind the Alyeska was all we had.

**Blackpoll Warbler** Scattered here and there were these long distance migrants!

N. Waterthrush
 Wilson's Warbler
 American Tree Sparrow
 The most robust singer of all the birds we saw in Nome area creeks.
 Along side most creeks and rivers in Alaska, it was not uncommon.
 Very common in the Nome area sitting atop a perch and singing.

**Savannah Sparrow** Grassy fields in Alaska always had a pair for us to view.

**Fox Sparrow** Bright rufous and gray birds were not shy about belting out their song

**Lincoln's Sparrow** Along Westchester Lagoon.

**Song Sparrow** This race was larger and darker than their southern races.

The Gambel's race of this species was very common – everywhere.
Stunningly bright headed individuals were everywhere in Nome.
Slate-colored individuals were in woodland understory in ANC & FBK.
Common and striking in their alternate plumage in the Nome area.
An individual in the Creamer fields in FBK was the only one we saw.

Brewer's Blackbird Common all around Anchorage.

Pine Grosbeak A pair feeing in a tree in Seward were a great surprise!

Common Redpoll The less "common of the two redpolls in the Nome area.

**Hoary Redpoll** We found these guys on the edge of snow in most areas of Nome.

**Pine Siskin** All over the Alyeska grounds.

**English House Sparrow** In Anchorage along Cook Inlet and Westchester Lagoon.

## **MAMMALS**

**Common Muskrat** Seen building a nest along Westchester Lagoon

**Beaver** A few sightings during daylight hours on the train ride to Anchorage.

**Hoary Marmot** In the rocks around Nome.

**Arctic Ground Squirrel** Everywhere in Nome and Denali. Essentially a bear and fox burrito.

**Vole** Seen trying to cross the trail in Fairbanks.

Pica In the rocks at Denali.

**Red Squirrel** Common around the forests of Alaska.

**Arctic Hare** Always on the road in Denali while expired individuals perched in trees.

**Caribou** Along the Denali Road in small herds.

**Reindeer** All around the Nome area.

**Moose** The individuals we saw in Alaska were primarily in Denali NP.

**Musk Ox** Groups were common in the hills in and around Nome.

Mountain Goat We saw small numbers on the cliffs of Resurrection Bay in Seward. Dall's

**Bighorn Sheep** Always on Turnagain and many herds in Denali.

**Red Fox** Three different individuals on our trip. **Black Bear** Mostly on the Resurrection Bay boat trip.

Grizzly Bear The best was the sow and three cubs on the Denali Road.

N. Sea Otter Common in Resurrection Bay fjords as we boated various inlets.

**Steller Sea Lion** Large groups of this somewhat rare sea lion were hauled out on rocks.

**Harbor Seal** Lots of females with pups on the glacier ice flows.

Killer Whale Humpback Whale Fin Whale Dall's Porpoise Resurrection Bay had two pods of these charismatic predators. Cow/calf pairs & bulls were sighted a number of times from the boat.

One individual in Resurrection Bay.

Numerous animals left rooster tails around our boat.
