MAMMALS (11)

Southern Opossum Didelphis marsupialis - (1) one at LA

Proboscis Bat Rhynchonycteris naso – (24) NR, DC

Central American Agouti Dasyprocta punctata (2) both at LA

Yucatan Black Howler Monkey Alouetta pigra (7) seen daily at LA

White-tailed Deer Odocoileus virginianus (10) seen daily around GJ

White-nosed Coati Nasua narica (1) Seen a couple of times by a few people at LA

Gray Fox Urocyon cinereoargenteus (1) seen at night capturing small prey item GJ

Yucatan Gray Squirrel Sciurus yucatanensis (2) A couple seen at LA

Nectar Feeding Bat Glossophaga soricine (1) LA

Leaf-nosed Bat sp. (9) in shed LR

Fishing Bat *Noctilio leporinus* (3) this large Bulldog Bat was seen flying over the lagoon (NR) at Lamanai on a boat tour

REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS (9)

Morelet's Crocodile *Crocodylus moreletii* (4) Several of this endangered crocodile seen NR, including a large on from the Lamanai dock, and eyeshine DC.

Common (Asian) House Gecko Hemidactylus frenatus (8) a common invasive species from Mexico to Panama, with small populations in the US. Invasive ability enhanced by ability to store sperm for up to 9 months resulting in no

need for parthogenesis; sexual reproduction also increase competitive fitness against native parthenogenetic species. LA

Black Spiny-tailed Iguana Ctenosaura similis (1) LA

Brown Basilisk Basiliscus vittatus (2) a couple at LA

Green Iguana *Iguana iguana* (20) most common reptile – number probably an undercount - seen daily in forest and riverine habitats. Larger adult males were in rusty color as it was breeding season.

Anole Anolis sp. (several) not uncommon around LA

Central America Boa Boa imperator (2) one NR and one at LR

Giant Toad Rhinella horribilis (1) LA

Rainforest Toad (1) unknown sp.

Treefrog sp. (1) LS similar to Yellow Treefrog Dendropsophus but without the yellow fingers and toes.

White-edged Longtail Urbanus albimargo (1) LA

Potrillo Skipper Cabares potrillo (1) LA

Tailed Orange Pyrisitia proterpia (1) LA

Esmeralda Longtail Urbanus esmeraldus (3) LA
