Encountering Gull-billed and Least Terns, while scouring the beaches for Snowy and Piping Plovers, made for a pleasant outing. Walking Shell Mound Park—or the "Mounds" as we began to call it—each evening waiting for migrating Yellow-billed Cuckoos, Scarlet Tanagers, and Red-eyed Vireos to arrive, was a perfect way to close out each evening. Getting to listen and see a Bachman's Sparrow sing among the thousands of pitcher flowers at Splinter Hill Bog felt like a truly special moment. Not to be forgotten, though, was a truly unique and special day with Ben Raines on the Mobile-Tensaw Delta—a tour with many unforgettable moments, 125 bird species, delicious food, and fabulous company.
