Gr White-fronted Goose A scattering of individuals throughout Creamer's wetlands. **Canada Goose** Ubiguitous anywhere in interior of Alaska with farmed fields & water. **Cackling Canada Goose** Small groups of taverneri on Safety Sound. Late migrants were scattered along Safety Sound out of Nome. Brant The best views were of nesting birds from the Anchorage-bound train. **Trumpeter Swan Tundra Swan** About 200 of these birds were concentrated along Safety Sound. Gadwall A male and female were feeding in Potter Marsh ANC. **American Wigeon** Probably the second most common waterfowl in our travels. Mallard Certainly not a common bird on this trip, with five being the high count. N. Shoveler The white belly & dark head made for easy identification. N.Pintail First one was at Potter Marsh in ANC. Small numbers of this handsome bird were seen in all areas of Alaska. **Green-winged Teal Ring-necked Duck** A few of these birds were spotted on Smith Lake at UAF. The "common" scaup for our trip. In most freshwater ponds. **Greater Scaup** Lesser Scaup A few individuals of this "peaked" species. Best looks in FAI. **Common Eider** Safety Sound had scattered pairs of the subtle female & gaudy male. Harlequin Duck Fine looks at this striking bird in Nome & along the Seward shoreline. Surf Scoter Our boat trip produced lingering two of these sea duck pairs. A small flock flew by offshore by the quarry east of Nome. White-winged Scoter A flock at the Nome harbor gave us great looks at the Velvet Scoter. **Black Scoter** Long-tailed Duck Numerous with the best look at a striking male on a Denali kettle pond. **Bufflehead** A pair on the Peat Ponds in Fai were all we saw. **Common Goldeneye** A gorgeous male seen along the docks of Seward. **Barrow's Goldeneye** Common in the waters around Seward. **Red-breasted Merg** Pairs were observed along rivers and on ponds everywhere. Often seen perched along side all the roads in Nome. Willow Ptarmigan **Rock Ptarmigan** One was heard calling on a hillside outing above Cape Wooly. Beautiful alternate plumaged adults on small ponds throughout Nome. **Red-throated Loon Pacific Loon** Alternate plumaged adults on Safety Sound. Common Loon A stunning adult was on Westchester Lagoon Yellow-billed Loon A quick but gorgeous look at a flyover **Horned Grebe** A male on the Peat Ponds was stunning! **Red-necked Grebe** The best view was on Westchester Lagoon of nesting adults!

N. Fulmar One dark phase seen by a few feeding with BLKi around the Chiswells. **Sooty Shearwater** A few passed by our boat out of Seward **Double-crested Corm** Numerous on Resurrection Bay out of Seward. **Pelagic Cormorant** White-thighed adults were the most common cormorant in SE Alaska. **Brandt's Cormorant** A few on the rocks along Resurrection Bay. **Red-faced Cormorant** Vibrant birds off of the Chiswell Islands out of Seward! Two were seen: one over Tern Lake the other over Cook Inlet Osprey **Bald Eagle** The common raptor on the trip, but stunning every time we saw one. Northern Harrier More common than you would think in AK, especially Denali **Red-tailed Hawk** Most common in the Fairbanks area. **Rough-legged Hawk** Seen on all three roads out of Nome. Golden Eagle A solo bird soaring over Camp Denali was fairly low. N. Goshawk One was seen by a couple of folks racing through Camp Denali Merlin A single individual blasted by us on the road out of Denali.. Peregrine A gorgeous adult female of the *tundrius* race on the Council Road Gyrfalcon The best look at this striking falcon was in Denali at Eilson. Sandhill Crane Large rust and gray-colored birds were feeding at Creamer's Field. **Ruffed Grouse** One was drumming as we walked towards Smith Lake in FAI. **Black-bellied Plover** Stunning alternate plumaged birds along the road to Cape Wooley. Am. Golden Plover Seemed to be mostly on nearly level slopes in Nome. Gorgeous! **Pacific Golden Plover** Not as common as the above, but in the same habitat. **Semipalmated Plover** First ones seen were on Turnagain Arm in ANC. Killdeer A single individual on one of the kettle ponds in Denali was unexpected **Black Oystercatcher** From our boat along the Seward Peninsula. Along Safety Sound in the Nome area. **Spotted Sandpiper Solitary Sandpiper** A solitary individual gave us looks along side a LeYe in Denali.. Wandering Tattler Seen by some along Betty's Brook in Denali **Greater Yellowlegs** Westchester Lagoon had a single bird along the coastal side. **Lesser Yellowlegs** First seen on Westchester Lagoon. Whimbrel A pair chasing a jaeger were along a dome on the Council Road in Nome **Hudsonian Godwit** Nice flocks along Turnagain Arm. **Bar-tailed Godwit** The Situk River had a solitary individual. Black Turnstone Best looks were on the Safety Sound. **Red Knot** A wonderful adult female in alternate plumage in the hills above Wooly. Dunlin This black-bellied sandpiper was on the Cape Wooley Road flying. Their aerial displays wowed all of us. What stamina! Semipalmated Sandpiper Western Sandpiper Their hunch-backed territorial displays in Nome were easily recognized Least Sandpiper No breeding individuals, but scattered groups in Nome were present. **Red-necked Stint** Brief looks at an individual along Safety Sound. **Short-billed Dowitcher** A few seen at Potter's Marsh. Long-billed Dowitcher Great looks at an individual along Cook's Inlet. Wilson's Snipe Their aerial displays in and around Nome brought all eyes skyward. **Red-necked Phalarope** The appropriate sized pond in Nome and Denali usually had a pair. **Black-legged Kittiwake** Nesting colonies at the outlet of Resurrection Bay were a treat!

Bonaparte's Gull On Smith Lake at UAF. **Mew Gull** Common everywhere in Alaska. The loud call resonated everywhere! Slaty-backed Gull A nice adult was foraging at the Nome landfill. Individuals scattered around Alaska. **Herring Gull Glaucous-winged Gull** Nesting colonies out on the Chiswell Islands. **Glaucous Gull** The big gull in Nome!!! **Aleutian Tern** The colony at the Bonanza bridge were back! **Arctic Tern** The "common" tern in most of our stops in Alaska. **Parasitic Jaeger** A pair were on a nest along Cape Wooly Road. **Pomeraine Jaeger** A nice adult was seen on the way to Safety Sound Long-tailed Jaeger The most common and agile aerial hunter in areas around Nome. **Common Murre** The "common" alcid on our boat trip thru Resurrection Bay. **Pigeon Guillemot** Not as common as the murre, but plenty of pairs on the boat trip. **Marbled Murrelet** Seen from shore in Seward guite close to shore. Great looks! **Kittlitz's Murrelet** Just outside the ice floe from the Northwestern Glacier. Ancient Murrelet There were a few small flocks out in the Chiswells. **Cassin's Auklet** A few flybys by the Fin Whales. **Rhinoceros Auklet** We saw them from the boat, but mostly from the back as they flew. Horned Puffin Abundant out by the Chiswell Islands. **Tufted Puffin** More abundant than the Horned and usually in pairs. **Rock Pigeon** In Anchorage and Fairbanks. **Belted Kingfisher** A pair of birds by the River's Edge Resort. **Downy Woodpecker** A female gathering food at Creamer's Field was one of two **N. Flicker** We had one bird calling at the Peat Ponds in FAI. **Alder Flycatcher** Calling in ANC and FAI and a few in Nome. Say's Phoebe Interesting to see this desert dweller along the Denali Road. **Gray Jay** Camp robbers were all around Camp Denali. Steller's Jay Along the roadside between Seward and Anchorage. **Black-billed Magpie** Everywhere in the lower part of the state, especially in urban areas Northwestern Crow Seward had their fair share of these coastal crows. **Common Raven** An incredibly adaptive bird given that it was in all habitats. **Tree Swallow** The most common of the swallows, especially in Fairbanks. **Violet-green Swallow** Loosely associated with Tree Swallow flocks in migration north. **Bank Swallow** On the Kougarok Road near Salmon Lake. **Cliff Swallow** Common in Anchorage and other areas of the state. A few individuals as far north as Nome. **Barn Swallow Black-capped Chickadee** In the forests of Fairbanks and Seward. **Red-breasted Nuthatch** A pair were seen by a few at Alyeska Resort. **Ruby-crowned Kinglet** Common singers in Anchorage and Fairbanks woodlands. **Arctic Warbler** First seen in Denali, common in Nome. N. Wheatear Good looks at a pair on Council Road as they foraged together. Bluethroat Very good looks at Salmon Lake on the Kougarok Road. Singing in most willow filled draws I the Nome area. **Gray-cheeked Thrush** Swainson's Thrush Singing birds in the woodland behind our Fairbanks hotel. Hermit Thrush In the Chugach National Forest campgrounds between Seward & ANC. American Robin Hard to miss this red-breasted singer anywhere there were fields. Varied Thrush Great looks in the Chugach National Forest. **European Starling** In Anchorage, Seward and Fairbanks. Seen on all three roads out of Nome! E. Yellow Wagtail **American Pipit** Along side the Teller Road in the Nome area. **Bohemian Waxwing** Great looks at a small flock at Smith Lake on UAF. **Orange-crowned Warbler** Bright Alaska males were singing their hearts out. **Yellow Warbler** Common where trees were available for singing. Yellow-rumped Warbler We only saw Myrtle's on this trip, and the males were stunning. **Townsend's Warbler** A singing male in the woodlands behind the Alyeska was all we had. Blackpoll Warbler Scattered here and there were these long distance migrants! N. Waterthrush The most robust singer of all the birds we saw in Nome area creeks. Wilson's Warbler Along side most creeks and rivers in Alaska, it was not uncommon. **American Tree Sparrow** Very common in the Nome area sitting atop a perch and singing. Savannah Sparrow Grassy fields in Alaska always had a pair for us to view. **Fox Sparrow** Bright rufous and gray birds were not shy about belting out their song Lincoln's Sparrow Along water courses at Creamer's Field. **Song Sparrow** This race was larger and darker than their southern races. White-crowned Sparrow The Gambel's race of this species was very common – everywhere. **Golden-crowned Sparrow** Stunningly bright headed individuals were everywhere in Nome. Dark-eyed Junco Slate-colored individuals were in woodland understory in ANC & FBK. Lapland Longspur Common and striking in their alternate plumage in the Nome area. **Red-winged Blackbird** A few were seen around the peat ponds in Fairbanks **Rusty Blackbird** Individuals in the Creamer's Fields in FAI was the only one we saw. **Brewer's Blackbird** Common all around Anchorage. Common Redpoll First seen along Turnagain Arm in ANC. **Hoary Redpoll** We found these guys on the edge of snow on Teller Road. **Pine Siskin** All over the Alyeska grounds. **English House Sparrow** In Anchorage along Cook Inlet and Westchester Lagoon.

Common Muskrat	Seen building a nest along Westchester Lagoon
Beaver	A great sighting on the inlet to Wonder Lake.
Arctic Ground Squirrel	Everywhere in Nome and Denali. Essentially a bear and fox burrito.
Vole	Seen trying to cross the Teller Road.
Red Squirrel	Common around the forests of Alaska.
Arctic Hare	Along the edgo of the road in Denali.
Caribou	Along the Denali Road in small herds.
Moose	The individuals we saw in Alaska were primarily in Denali NP.
Musk Ox	Groups were common in the hills in and around Nome.
Mountain Goat	We saw small numbers on the cliffs of Resurrection Bay in Seward.
Dall's Bighorn Sheep	Always on Turnagain and many herds in Denali.

Red Fox Black Bear Grizzly Bear Gray Wolf N. Sea Otter	Three different individuals on our trip. Mostly on the Resurrection Bay boat trip. A total of seven on the Denali Road. Near the bus leaving Denali. Common in Resurrection Bay fjords as we boated various inlets.
Steller Sea Lion	Large groups of this somewhat rare sea lion were hauled out on rocks.
Harbor Seal	Lots of females with pups on the glacier ice floes.
Killer Whale	Resurrection Bay had two pods of these charismatic predators.
Humpback Whale	Cow/calf pairs & bulls were sighted a number of times from the boat.
Fin Whale	One individual in Resurrection Bay.
Dall's Porpoise	Numerous animals left rooster tails around our boat.
