



Naturalist Journeys & Caligo Ventures Minnesota Bearskin Lodge and Boundary Waters Birds and Mammals Species List September 10-16, 2016 Tour Leader: Dodie Logue

Birds (77 species):

Anatidae: Ducks, Geese, and Swans (5)

Canada Goose Branta canadensis— Seen a few times at various places along the lake.

American Black Duck Anas rubripes— At Park Point and up the shore.

Mallard Anas platyrhynchos — Seen most days.

Redhead *Aythya americana*— A single one at the Two Harbors Marina, and a group of them on a distant lake seen while we hiked the Oberg Trail.

Common Merganser *Mergus merganser*— A few places along Lake Superior.

Phasianidae: Partridges, Pheasants, and Allies (2)

Ruffed Grouse *Bonasa umbellus*— At least one adult female and 5 young along a trail at Chik-Wauk Museum.

Spruce Grouse *Falcipennis canadensis*— Great views of a male along a trail at Chik-Wauk Museum.

Gaviidae: Loons (1)

Common Loon *Gavia immer*— Seen on Lake Superior as well as East Bearskin Lake.

Phalacrocoracidae: Cormorants (1)

Double-crested Cormorant *Phalacrocorax auritus*— Along the shore of Lake Superior as we drove up the shoreline.

<u>Ardeidae: Herons and Egrets (1)</u> Great Blue Heron Ardea herodias— A single one seen on the drive down the Gunflint Trail.

Cathartidae: New World Vultures (1) Turkey Vulture Cathartes aura— Seen most days.

Pandionidae: Osprey (1)

Osprey *Pandion haliaetus*— Three sightings, including one in the scope at Pigeon Falls.

Accipitridae: Hawks, Eagles, and Allies (6)

Northern Harrier Circus cyaneus— One seen the first day at Hake Ridge, banded and released. Sharp-shinned Hawk Accipiter striatus— Many seen in migration, especially at hawk Ridge. Cooper's Hawk Accipiter cooperii— One seen on our day with Naturalist Chel.

Bald Eagle *Haliaeetus leucocephalus*— Seen most days including one in a kettle of Broad-wing Hawks.

Broad-winged Hawk *Buteo platypterus*— Seen the first and last days, most at Hawk Ridge. **Red-tailed Hawk** *Buteo jamaicensis*— One seen the first day at Hawk Ridge.

Charadriidae: Plovers and Lapwings (2)

Black-bellied Plover *Pluvialis squatarola*— Seen the last day after some had departed, at the Park Point Airport on a dock with a single American Golden-Plover for good comparison. **American Golden-Plover** *Pluvialis dominica*— Seen the last day after some had departed, at the Park Point Airport on a dock with a few Black-bellied Plover for good comparison.

Scolopacidae: Sandpipers and Allies (1)

Sanderling *Calidris alba*— A flock seen along the shore of Lake Superior at Park Point.

Laridae: Gulls, Terns, and Skimmers (2)

Ring-billed Gull *Larus delawarensis*— Seen every day. **Herring Gull** *Larus argentatus*— Seen most days.

Columbidae: Pigeons and Doves (1)

Rock Pigeon (I) Columba livia— Seen the first two days around Duluth.

<u> Trochilidae: Hummingbirds (1)</u>

Ruby-throated Hummingbird *Archilochus colubris*— A couple of quick fly-bys in migration.

Alcedinidae: Kingfishers (1)

Belted Kingfisher *Megaceryle alcyon*— We chased one along the shore during our canoe trip on Bearskin Lake.

Picidae: Woodpeckers (5)

Yellow-bellied Sapsucker Sphyrapicus varius — Seen four separate days.
Downy Woodpecker Picoides pubescens — Common, seen nearly every day.
Hairy Woodpecker Picoides villosus — Seen a few days.
Northern Flicker Colaptes auratus — Common, seen nearly every day.
Pileated Woodpecker Dryocopus pileatus — Heard and seen day two and six.

Falconidae: Falcons (2)

American Kestral Falco sparverius — At Hawk Ridge the first day and on a wire on day four.

Merlin Falco columbarius— Seen twice, once in deep woods at Oberg Mountain.

Tyrannide: Tyrant Flycatchers (3)

Alder Flycatcher *Empidonax alnorum*— Seen three days, not vocalizing. After consulting eBird, I concluded that this was the one we were seeing, no Willow Flycatcher present at this time and place. Also, we were seeing them mostly in Alder thickets!

Eastern Phoebe *Sayornis phoebe*— Seen at Park Point and at Tettegouche SP.

Eastern Kingbird *Tyrannus tyrannus* — A single one seen on our hike around the Two Harbors Light House.

Vireonidae: Vireos (3)

Yellow-throated Vireo Vireo flavifrons— One seen in the woods near Two Harbors Lighthouse. Blue-headed Vireo Vireo solitarius— Seen and heard along Pigeon Falls trail.

Red-eyed Vireo *Vireo olivaceus*— Seen and heard a few days; Vireo were one of the few birds still singing at this time of year!

Corvidae: Crows and Jays (4)

Gray Jay Perisoreus canadensis — A single one calling, flew across the trail at Bearskin Lodge on an early morning bird walk.
Blue Jay Cyanocitta cristata — Common, seen every day.
American Crow Corvus brachyrhynchos — Common, seen every day.
Common Raven Corvus corax — Common, seen nearly every day.

Paridae: Tits and Chickadees (1)

Black-capped Chickadee *Poecile atricapillus*— Another everyday bird, very common and helped us find a few warbler flocks.

Sittidae: Nuthatches (2)

Red-breasted Nuthatch *Sitta canadensis*— We heard their "yank" every day, getting great views.

White-breasted Nuthatch Sitta carolinensis— Less common, seen day two and three.

Certhiidae: Creepers (1)

Brown Creeper Certhia americana — A single one seen along Pigeon Falls trail.

Regulidae: Kinglets (2)

Golden-crowned Kinglet *Regulus satrapa*— Both kinglets seen along trails at Bearskin Lodge. **Ruby-crowned Kinglet** *Regulus calendula*— Both kinglets seen along trails at Bearskin Lodge.

Turdidae: Thrushes (2)

Swainson's Thrush Catharus ustulatus— Common during migration, seen a few times. American Robin Turdus migratorius— Saw surprisingly few, only seen on day 6.

Mimidae: Mockingbirds and Thrashers (1)

Gray Catbird Dumetella carolinensis— One seen and heard on departure day at Hawk Ridge.

<u>Sturnidae: Starlings (1)</u> European Starling *Sturnus vulgaris*— A few sightings near human habitation.

Bombycillidae: Waxwings (1)

Cedar Waxwing *Bombycilla cedrorum*— Common, seen most days, often enjoying the colorful berries of the Mountain Ash.

Parulidae: Wood-Warblers (15)

Northern Waterthrush *Parkesia noveboracensis* — Heard only - maybe briefly seen? - two separate days near the marshy outlet on Bearskin Lake.

Black-and-white Warbler *Mniotilta varia*— Seen a few times in warbler waves, at Park Point and at Pigeon Falls.

Tennessee Warbler *Oreothlypis peregrina*— Seen in warbler flock on Park Point and at Chik Wauk Museum.

Orange-crowned Warbler *Oreothlypis celata*— Seen a few time amidst group of warblers.

Nashville Warbler *Oreothlypis ruficapilla*— A common migrant, seen nearly everyday.

Common Yellowthroat *Geothlypis trichas*— Seen at Naniboujou Lodge grounds.

American Redstart Setophaga ruticilla – A common migrant, seen most days.

Magnolia Warbler *Setophaga magnolia*— Seen along the trail at Cascade Falls on our hike with Chel.

Blackburnian Warbler *Setophaga fusca*— One seen at the Tettegouche SP Visitor Center grounds.

Chestnut-sided Warbler *Setophaga pensylvanica*— A common migrant in this area, seen three days.

Blackpoll Warbler *Setophagastriata*— Seen at Pigeon Falls with a nice mixed flock.

Palm Warbler *Setophaga palmarum*— Seen most days, especially on Park Point and at Naniboujou Grounds.

Pine Warbler *Setophaga pinus*— A few sightings, one at Naniboujou Grounds.

Yellow-rumped Warbler *Setophaga coronata*— It was a bit early for large numbers, but seen a few days.

Black-throated Green Warbler Setophaga virens— Seen at Bearskin Lodge and at Pigeon Falls.

Emberizidae: New world Sparrows (4)

Dark-eyed Junco Junco hyemalis— Just starting to move south, seen at Pigeon Falls.

White-throated Sparrow Zonotrichia albicollis— Common, seen most days.

Song Sparrow *Melospiza melodia*— At Park Point and Naniboujou Grounds.

Lincoln's Sparrow Melospiza lincolnii—A single one seen near the feeders at Tettegouche SP.

Cardinalide: Cardinal-Grosbeaks (1)

Rose-breasted Grosbeak Pheucticus Iudovicianus— Seen on Park Point.

Icteridae: Blackbirds, Orioles, and Allies (1)

Common Grackle *Quiscalus quiscula*— A few were seen around the lake at Bearskin Lodge.

Fringillidae: Finches (1)

American Goldfinch Spinus tristis— Common, seen a few times.

Passeridae: Old World Sparrows (1)

House Sparrow (I) Passer domesticus— Seen only in Duluth.

Mammals (5 species):

White-tailed Deer Odocoileus virginianus— Red Fox Vulpes vulpes— Eastern Gray Squirrel Sciurus carolinensis— Eastern Chipmunk Tamias striatus— Red Squirrel Tamiasciurus hudsonicus— Ground Squirrel
