Big Cats & Breathtaking Birds of India Main Tour: February 24 – March 13, 2025 Pallas's Cat Extension: March 13 – 19, 2025 Species List | with Naturalist Journeys

Our Naturalist Journeys group spent 18 days traveling through three different areas of India on our main tour. The first area we visited, in central India, was Tadoba Tiger Reserve. This area is mainly dry deciduous forest dominated by teak trees and a bamboo understory. Most of our birding and mammal viewing was done from safari vehicles. Notable birds we saw in Tadoba included Indian Gray Hornbill, four species of Kingfishers (Pied, Stork-billed, Common, and White-throated), Indian Golden Oriole, Orange-headed Thrush, and Indian Paradise-Flycatcher. We saw great mammals here including Bengal Tiger, Spotted Deer, both Indian Gray and Ruddy Mongoose, and Sambar. Our next stop was in the state of Gujurat, in western India, where we visited both Blackbuck National Park and Gir National Park. Blackbuck was dominated by grassland and we had great raptor viewing here including Short-toed Snake-Eagle, Steppe Eagle, and all three Harrier species found here including Montagu's, Pallid, and Western Marsh Harrier. Mammal highlights included hundreds of Blackbuck, a Striped Hyena with four pups, and several Jungle Cats. In Gir, we had great views of four owl species including Spotted Owlet, Mottled Wood Owl, Brown Fish Owl, and Indian Scops-Owl. We also saw several Asiatic Lion, which only occur in this area. We also saw hundreds of Indian Flying Fox both at their day roost and flying from their roost at night. Our last stop on the main tour took us to the Himalaya in Ladakh. As temperatures were colder here with lingering snow still on the ground, we had fewer species. Some of the highlights in this area were Ibisbill, Bearded Vulture, Mongolian Finch, and White-browed Tit-Warbler. We had great luck with mammals and spotted eight Snow Leopards, several Himalayan Wolf, three Red Fox, Ibex, Urial, and Blue Sheep.

On the Pallas's Cat extension, we added a few new bird species in eastern Ladakh including Tibetan Sandgrouse, Tibetan Partridge, Ground Tit, and a lone Black-necked Crane that may have been the first arrival of the season. We again had great luck with mammals and saw a very rare Eurasian Lynx, Himalayan Wolf, Tibetan Gazelle, Tibetan Wild Ass, Tibetan Sand Fox, and two Pallas's Cats.

217 species of birds were recorded on the main tour. 17 species were recorded on the extension.
