

New Zealand Birding & Nature Species List | January 7-23, 2026 with Naturalist Journeys

An intrepid and experienced group of nine gathered in Auckland to meet with local Nature Quest birding guide Richard and Naturalist Journeys guide Dave for an incredible and highlight-filled tour of almost all of New Zealand and its birds. Starting on the North Island, we visited numerous birding sites, including islands, forested tracts, and coastal areas, as we worked our way south to Wellington at the southern end. Arriving there, we took the ferry across the Cook Strait (experiencing the “excellent customer service”—not of Bluebridge Cook Street Ferries!) to the sweet little town of Picton at the northern end of the South Island. We continued from there by van, on boats, and on foot to explore the myriad habitats of the “mainland” on our way south. Here, too, we explored numerous kinds of forest types (including some mystical and memorable old-growth tracts), coasts, off-shore waters, lakes, and alpine habitats in search of New Zealand’s endemic bird species.

Arriving in Bluff, just south of Invercargill at the south end of the South Island, we shed our gear for a few days and enjoyed a walk-on trip on the ferry to the tranquil and delightful Stewart Island. On Stewart, we experienced kiwis on a nocturnal walk, watched Little Penguins emerge at dusk from their daily ocean voyage, watched an albatross feeding frenzy, and experienced the delight of the predator-free Ulva Island, all without driving a single kilometer in our van! Upon our return to the South Island, we wound up the trip in the lake town of Te Anau, where we were rewarded with a full-on Aurora Australis at night over the lake, exploration of the scenic Eglington Valley, and a classic Milford Sound cruise. The tour ended in the lovely university town of Dunedin, where the trip concluded with a wet, but enjoyable, boat trip around Taiaroa Head to see a nesting colony of Northern Royal Albatross.

This tour truly had so many highlights it was nearly impossible to comment on them all. Impressive habitats included ancient old-growth podocarp and southern beech forests (thankfully saved from cutting by far-sighted conservationists), the critically important “wintering” shorebird habitats at Pukorokoro Miranda, and the most classic pelagic birding and wildlife-watching waters in the world. Of the birds, we found almost all of the avian, endemic, “target” species we were looking for; of the few missed, we tried very, very hard for them. Best birds depend, of course, on the viewer, but we admired the widespread, but incredibly showy Tui; had a great night with several Southern Brown Kiwis; had great views of a total of 17 Procellariiform species (tubenoses), many at very close range from boats; enjoyed the well-known antics of a Kea or two; found several Rifleman and a pair of South Island Wren (aka, Rock Wren) which are members of the family of the very earliest-evolved Passerines; saw all three extant species of Wattlebirds (Kokako and Saddleback); and twitched a rare Maned Duck from Australia. We literally could not have asked for more from this tour or our incredible guide Richard.

BIRDS 118 species were recorded of which 42 were endemic and 23 were introduced.

MAMMALS (6):

New Zealand Fur Seal *Arctocephalus forsteri* — Seen frequently at several coast sites or on boat trips; probably most numerous at the Ohau Point Lookout and seal colony just north of Kaikoura

New Zealand Sea Lion *Phocarctos hookeri* — Large male seen loafing on a beach during the Halfmoon Bay boat trip

Hector’s Dolphin *Cephalorhynchus hectori* — Several seen on the Taiaroa Head boat trip

Dusky Dolphin *Sagmatias obscurus* — Several seen on the Kaikoura Albatross Encounter boat trip

European Hare (I) *Lepus europaeus* — Several seen at Arthur’s Pass Wilderness Lodge

European Rabbit (I) *Oryctolagus cuniculus* — Encountered numerous times during the trip
