Birds (77 species):

Anatidae: Ducks, Geese, and Swans (15)

- Canada Goose Branta canadensis Seen almost daily in lakes and rivers in both national parks
- **Trumpeter Swan** *Cygnus buccinators* Seen most days on Jackson Lake and Yellowstone River
- Wood Duck Aix sponsa—Pair seen on first day in wetlands at Jackson Visitor Center
- Gadwall Anas strepera Seen behind Jackson Visitor Center and on Yellowstone Lake
- American Wigeon Anas Americana—Seen on first four days on various rivers and lakes
- Mallard Anas platyrhynchos Seen most days
- Green-winged Teal Anas crecca—Seen at Jackson wetlands, on Snake and Yellowstone Rivers
- Redhead Aythya americana— Several in wetlands behind Jackson Visitor Center
- Ring-necked Duck Aythya collaris Several in wetlands behind Jackson Visitor Center
- Greater Scaup Aythya marila Seen on several days on Yellowstone Lake
- Harlequin Duck Histrionicus histrionicus— One female on Yellowstone River at LeHardy Rapids
- **Common Goldeneye** Bucephala clangula— Mixed in the Barrow's at Gull Point Drive pond
- Barrow's Goldeneye Bucephala islandica— Many on Yellowstone Lake and on Indian Pond
- **Common Merganser** *Mergus merganser* Often seen in lakes and rivers in both national parks
- Ruddy Duck Oxyura jamaicensis Several in wetlands behind Jackson Visitor Center

Phasianidae: Partridges, Pheasants, and Allies (1)

 Ruffed Grouse Bonasa umbellus— Three seen crossing road near LeHardy Rapids in Yellowstone NP

Gaviidae: Loons (1)

• Common Loon Gavia immer— Seen on Jackson and Yellowstone Lakes

Podicipedidae: Grebes (3)

- Pied-billed Grebe Podilymbus podiceps— At wetlands behind Jackson Visitor Center
- Eared Grebe Podiceps nigricollis—A small flock in the middle of Beartooth Lake
- Western Grebe Aechmophorus occidentalis— One on Jackson Lake

Phalacrocoracidae: Cormorants (1)

 Double-crested Cormorant Phalacrocorax auritus— Along the shore of Yellowstone Lake and one on Yellowstone River

Pelecanidae: Pelicans (1)

 American White Pelican Pelecanus erythrorhynchos—Small flock on north end of Jackson Lake

Ardeidae: Herons and Egrets (1)

• Great Blue Heron Ardea herodias — Seen on most days along lakes and rivers

Accipitridae: Hawks, Eagles, and Allies (5)

- Golden Eagle Aquila chrysaetos— Pair seen soaring north of Dunraven Pass, Yellowstone NP
- Northern Harrier Circus cyaneus Behind Jackson Visitor Center
- **Northern Goshawk** *Accipiter gentilis* An immature Goshawk flew directly overhead and perched briefly on a snag at Dunraven Pass trail to Mt. Washburn exciting!
- Bald Eagle Haliaeetus leucocephalus—Seen on 4 days near water environs
- Red-tailed Hawk Buteo jamaicensis— Seen almost daily

Rallidae: Rails, Coots and Crakes (2)

- Sora Porzana carolina— Great look at one swimming in wetlands behind Jackson Visitor Center
- American Coot Fulica americana A raft of them in Jackson Lake and more in Yellowstone Lake

Gruidae: Cranes (1)

 Sandhill Crane Antigone canadensis— A few seen on Jackson Lake and along Yellowstone River

Laridae: Gulls, Terns, and Skimmers (1)

• California Gull Larus californicus—Several on Yellowstone and Jackson Lakes

Columbidae: Pigeons and Doves (2)

- Rock Pigeon (I) Columba livia— Seen the first and last days around Jackson
- Eurasian Collared Dove (I) Streptopelia decaocto— One in Mammoth village

Strigidae: Owls (2)

- Great Horned Owl Bubo virginianus— One spotted in Hayden Valley
- **Great Gray Owl** *Strix nebulosa* Incredibly, two seen! One at Bridge Creek, and one near Canyon both great looks and both in Yellowstone NP.

Alcedinidae: Kingfishers (1)

• Belted Kingfisher Megaceryle alcyon— Seen on four days along lakes and rivers

Falconidae: Falcons (4)

- American Kestral Falco sparverius— Flew over us at Hayden Valley in Yellowstone NP
- Merlin Falco columbarius Flapped around as if hunting then disappeared into steam at Grand Prismatic Pool, Yellowstone NP
- Peregrine Falcon Falco peregrinus— Flew over us while we were having first picnic lunch in Moose, Wyoming – Grand Teton NP
- Prairie Falcon Falco mexicanus—A flyover in the Beartooth Mountains in Montana

Corvidae: Crows and Jays (6)

- Gray Jay Perisoreus canadensis— Frequent visitors at campgrounds and picnic areas
- Steller's Jay Cyanocitta stelleri— On Dunraven Pass and in wooded areas in Montana
- Black-billed Magpie Pica hudsonia—Seen and heard most days
- Clark's Nutcracker Nucifraga columbiana—Common and active in high country of Yellowstone and Beartooth Mountains
- American Crow Corvus brachyrhynchos Seen in Jackson and in Canyon village
- **Common Raven** *Corvus corax* Common, seen nearly every day.

Alaudidae: Larks (1)

• Horned Lark Eremophila alpestris—One clearly seen in grass lands at Clay Butte Lookout

Hirundinidae: Swallows and Martins (3)

- Tree Swallow Tachycineta bicolor—Behind Jackson Visitor Center
- Barn Swallow Hirundo rustica—Behind Jackson Visitor Center
- Cliff Swallow Petrochelidon pyrrhonota—Behind Jackson Visitor Center

Paridae: Tits and Chickadees (1)

• **Mountain Chickadee** *Poecile gambeli—C*ommon in Yellowstone conifers

Sittidae: Nuthatches (2)

- Red-breasted Nuthatch Sitta canadensis— Often Seen and heard in Yellowstone conifers
- White-breasted Nuthatch Sitta carolinensis— One seen well at Calcite Canyon in Yellowstone

Troglodytidae: Wrens (1)

• Marsh Wren Cistothorus palustris—One in wetlands behind Jackson Visitor Center

Cinclidae: Dippers (1)

American Dipper Cinclus mexicanus—Two flying over LeHardy Rapids

Regulidae: Kinglets (1)

• Ruby-crowned Kinglet Regulus calendula— One at Jackson Visitor Center

Turdidae: Thrushes (2)

- Mountain Bluebird Sialia currucoides—Several lingering individuals at Clay Butte prior to migration
- American Robin Turdus migratorius Saw surprisingly few, only on days 4 and 5

Sturnidae: Starlings (1)

• European Starling (I) Sturnus vulgaris— Only in Jackson, Wyoming

Anthus rubescens: Pipits and Wagtails (1)

American Pipit Anthus rubescens—Many at Clay Butte and in Beartooth Mountains

Parulidae: Wood-Warblers (3)

- Orange-crowned Warbler Oreothlypis celata— Two seen in Willows across from LeHardy Rapids, Yellowstone NP
- Common Yellowthroat Geothlypis trichas— Several in wetlands behind Jackson Visitor Center
- Yellow-rumped Warbler Setophaga coronata— At Jackson Visitor Center and at Dunraven Pass

Emberizidae: New world Sparrows (5)

- Dark-eyed Junco Junco hyemalis— Seen on three days flitting through conifers in Yellowstone
- White-crowned Sparrow Zonotrichia leucophrys—At Jackson Visitor Center
- Song Sparrow Melospiza melodia— At Jackson Visitor Center
- **Lincoln's Sparrow** *Melospiza lincolnii*—One seen on colorful fall foliage at Jackson Visitor Center
- Green-tailed Towhee Pipilo chlorurus—One perched on a rock at close range in Mammoth

<u>Icteridae: Blackbirds, Orioles, and Allies (3)</u>

- Red-winged Blackbird Agelaius phoeniceus—Common at Jackson Visitor Center
- Yellow-headed Blackbird Xanthocephalus xanthocephalus—One seen at Jackson Visitor Center
- Brewer's Blackbird Euphagus cyanocephalus—The most common trip blackbird

Fringillidae: Finches (3)

- Cassin's Finch Haemorhous cassinii—At Dunraven Pass, Yellowstone NP; and at Clay Butte, Wyo
- **Pine Siskin** *Spinus pinus*—Dunraven Pass, Calcite Canyon and in the Absaroka/Beartooth Mountains
- Black Rosy Finch leucosticte atrata—Flew by in mixed flock with American Pipits in Beartooths

Passeridae: Old World Sparrows (1)

 House Sparrow (I) Passer domesticus— Seen only in Jackson







Mammals (20 species):

- Pronghorn Antilocapra americana—Seen most days especially in Jackson Hole Sagebrush areas; Hayden and Lamar valleys in Yellowstone
- American Bison Bison bison—By far most common mammal of trip. 100s seen in Lamar and Hayden valleys and some near to our living spaces at Lake Hotel, Silver Gate and Old Faithful
- **Bighorn Sheep** *Ovis canadensis*—First seen at Dunraven Pass, then at Tower and entrance to Lamar Valley
- Moose Alces americanus—A cow and calf seen at Pebble Creek, Yellowstone NP

- **Elk** *Cervus elaphus*—Abundant and seen almost daily, including on Travertine formations at Mammoth
- Mule Deer Odocoileus hemionus—Seen most days
- **Coyote** *Canis latrans*—Good looks at Hayden and Lamar Valleys. Great chorus heard at Old Faithful.
- Gray Wolf Canis lupus—Nice scope views on two different days in Hayden Valley
- Red Fox Vulpes vulpes One at Clay Butte, Wyoming
- American Black Bear *Ursus americanus*—One large cinnamon-colored individual near Tower and an adult with two cubs in Slough Creek, Yellowstone NP
- American Beaver Castor canadensis—One seen on second day in Pelican Creek area
- Yellow-pine Chipmunk Tamias amoenus—Common denizen of high elevation pine forests
- Least Chipmunk Tamias minimus—An everyday sighting, often darting about at high speed in search of crumbs
- Red Squirrel Tamiasciurus hudsonicus Seen and heard at Gull Point picnic area
- Uinta Ground Squirrel Urocitellus armatus—Spotted near Fishing Bridge in Yellowstone
 NP
- **Muskrat** *Ondatra zibethicas*—One swimming with mouth full of vegetation in pond along Gull Point Drive
- American Pika Ochotona princeps—Several seen scurrying and perching on rocks in Beartooth Mountains
- Mountain Goat Oreamnos americanus—One resting on a rock outcrop at Beartooth
 Pass
- Meadow Vole Microtus pennsylvanicus—Seen at Jackson Hole, Hayden and Lamar valleys
- **Mountain Cottontail** *Sylvilagus nuttallii* Seen multiple times, especially in Jackson Hole sagebrush flats

Reptiles (1)

 Prairie Garter Snake Thamnophis radix – One at trailhead to Morning Glory Pool, Old Faithful

Fish (1)

• Cutthroat Trout Oncorhynchus clarkia – One seen swimming upstream in Firehole River
