Summary

An enjoyable eight-day tour of the Southe's charming low-country from Savannah, Georgia, to Charleston, South Carolina, with stops in between sighting many of the local specialties: Anhinga, Tricolored Heron, White and Glossy Ibis, Roseate Spoonbill, Wood Stork, Mottled Duck, Clapper Rail, American Oystercatcher, American Avocet, Red Knot, Black Skimmer, Red-cockaded Woodpecker, Black-throated Blue Warbler, Seaside Sparrow, and Salt-marsh Sparrow. American Alligators were seen at close range on the frequent visits to swamp areas. The city tours of Savannah and Charleston provided a historical picture of their participation in the Revolutionary and Civil Wars. Visits to scenic Ft. Sumter and Ft. Moultrie were educational, and meals at many of the local restaurants featuring low-country cuisine were delicious! The group enjoyed visits to the Savannah National Wildlife Refuge where Spanish moss-covered Live Oak trees create a haven for many bird species. The ACE Basin is home to many of the area species that prefer marsh and river habitat. The Francis Beidler Audubon Center is a tupelo and bald cypress swamp, home to all species of woodpecker in the southern United States. We visited beaches for shorebirds and seabirds. We worked around a couple of rainy days but that didn't slow down this energetic and delightful group!

Birds: 128 Species

Anatidae: Ducks, Geese and Swans (8)

Canada Goose Branta canadensis-(3) Seen on the first and last day in a pond near the Charleston airport

Wood Duck *Aix sponsa-*(1) Special request of Jean's: 30 males, females and juveniles seen at Magnolia's Audubon Swamp

Blue-winged Teal *Anas discors-*(2) Many seen in ponds at ACE Basin, 10 more found at Magnolia's Audubon Swamp

Northern Shoveler Anas clypeata-(1) Fifteen in Ashepoo River at Bear Island WMA

American Wigeon Anas americana-(1) Two in Ashepoo River at Bear Island WMA

Mallard *Anas platyrhynchos*-(3) Seen in ponds at Donnelley WMA, in Ashepoo River at Bear Island, and Audubon Swamp

Mottled Duck Anas fulvigula-(1) Male and female in the Ashepoo River at Bear Island WMA

Northern Pintail Anas acuta-(1) Fifteen males and females in the Ashepoo River at Bear Island WMA

Podicipedidae: Grebes (1)

Pied-billed Grebe *Podilymbus podiceps-*(4) Seen often in ponds including Savannah NWR, ACE Basin, Audubon Swamp

Ciconiidae: Storks (1)

Wood Stork *Mycteria americana-*(2-RS) Always fun to see, close look at one at Pitt Street Bridge and roosting in the trees; many seen soaring at Donnelley WMA

Phalacrocoracidae: Cormorants (1)

Double-crested Cormorant Phalacrocorax auritus -(5) Seen almost daily at fresh and saltwater locations

Anhingidae: Anhingas (1)

Anhinga *Anhinga anhinga*-(2-RS) Fitting that we would have our first sighting near the Audubon Swamp where John James Audubon observed and collected his first Anhinga specimen; another was perched along the channel at swamp at Francis Beidler

Pelecanidae: Pelicans (1)

Brown Pelican Pelecanus occidentalis-(4) Good numbers seen at all salt water locations

Ardeidae: Herons and Egrets (6)

Great Blue Heron *Ardea Herodias-*(7) This largest of all herons was seen daily at all locations; very close looks at the Savannah NWR

Great Egret Ardea alba-(7) This plentiful egret was seen daily at all locations

Snowy Egret *Egretta thula-*(5) Seen at all fresh water ponds and lakes, often with Little Blue Herons for comparison

Little Blue Heron *Egretta caerulea*-(6) Both blue and white plumages seen, often together for comparison, at Savannah NWR; also seen at ACE Basin, Audubon Swamp and Pitt Street Bridge

Tricolored Heron *Egretta tricolor*-(3 RS) Twenty seen at various locations at ACE Basin; two seen at Pitt St. Bridge **Cattle Egret** *Bubulcus ibis*-(1) Four seen standing on the levee and in the marsh at Savannah NWR

Threskiornithidae: Ibis and Spoonbills (3)

White Ibis Eudocimus albus-(8) Seen daily at all locations and in residential areas; first seen roosting in trees at Savannah NWR

Glossy Ibis *Plegadis falcinellus*-(1) Two seen at close range flying low over the Savannah NWR marsh **Roseate Spoonbill** *Platalea ajaja*-(3-RS) We were lucky to see ten of this spectacular species roosting in trees at Donnelley WMA after a quick fly over at Savannah NWR

Cathartidae: New World Vultures (2)

Black Vulture *Coragyps atratus-*(4) Nice views at locations in the ACE Basin; seen often during drives **Turkey Vulture** *Cathartes aura-*(8) Seen daily in good numbers at all locations

Pandionidae: Osprey (1)

Osprey Pandion haliaetus-(2) First two seen at Pitt St. Causeway; others seen on Sullivan's Island

Accipitridae: Hawks, Eagles, and Kites (6)

Northern Harrier Circus cyaneus -(1) Only sighting was one soaring over the Savannah NWR marsh Sharp-shinned Hawk Accipiter striatus-(1) One seen at close range on Savannah NWR wildlife drive Cooper's Hawk Accipiter cooperii-(5) Seen fairly often perched and flying often in residential areas Bald Eagle Haliaeetus leucocephalus-(5) Adults and juveniles seen often, soaring and perched Red-shouldered Hawk Buteo lineatus -(2) Heard at Savannah NWR; scope views of one perched on Sullivan's Island

Red-tailed Hawk Buteo jamaicensis -(4) Seen soaring and perched at various locations

Rallidae: Rails, Coots, and Allies (5)

King Rail Rallus elegans-(1-HO) Heard only at the entrance to the Savannah NWR

Clapper Rail Rallus crepitans -(2) Heard maybe 3 – 4 vocalizing at Pitt St., one spotted by Jane very close to us for great looks!

Sora Porzana carolina-(2-HO) Distinctive vocalization heard at Savannah NWR and Pitt St. causeway

Common Gallinule *Gallinula galeata-*(3) Many seen out in the open at Savannah NWR, at ACE Basin, and in the pond at Magnolia's Audubon Swamp

American Coot Fulica americana-(1) Surprisingly, only seen once at Donnelley WMA

Haematopodidae: Oystercatchers (1)

American Oystercatcher Haematopus palliatus-(1) Seen flying over the marsh and perched on a pier at Ft. Moultrie

Charadriidae: Plovers and Lapwings (2)

Black-bellied Plover *Pluvialis squatarola-*(1) Three seen with other shorebirds on Sullivan Island **Killdeer** *Charadrius vociferus-*(5) Heard and seen often at Savannah NWR & ACE Basin

Scolopacidae: Sandpipers and Allies (8)

Ruddy Turnstone Arenaria interpres-(2) Four on the pier at Folly washout and piers at Pitt St. causeway
Red Knot Calidris canutus-(2) Group of 15 on Sullivan Island's Beach; hundreds at Morris lighthouse
Sanderling Calidris alba-(4) Most common shorebird; seen on visits to the beaches running away from the waves
Dunlin Calidris alpina-(1) Three with Sanderlings for comparison on beach at Ft. Sumter
Spotted Sandpiper Actitis macularius-(2) First one spotted by Jane near pier on Folly Island; another at Ft. Sumter
Greater Yellowlegs Tringa melanoleuca-(2) Heard and seen flying at Donnelley WMA and Bear Island
Willet Tringa semipalmata-(2) Large group of 25 on a pier at Ft Moultrie; individuals on beach at Sullivan's Island
Lesser Yellowlegs Tringa flavipes-(1) Two vocalized while flying by us on the Pitt St. causeway

Laridae: Gulls, Terns, and Skimmers (8)

Laughing Gull Leucophaeus atricilla-(7) Seen often and everywhere during the week

Ring-billed Gull Larus delawarensis-(2) Seen with Laughing and Herring Gulls on Folly Beach washout pier for comparison

Herring Gull Larus argentatus-(2) Two seen perched on the pier for good views of size and pink leg color **Caspian Tern** Hydroprogne caspia-(1) Scope view of two at Morris Island lighthouse with Royal for nice comparison

Forster's Tern *Sterna forsteri-*(4) Many seen perched on Folly Beach and Pitt St. piers with other terns **Royal Tern** *Thalasseus maximus-*(3) Seen at all beach locations and perched on piers at Folly Beach and Pitt St. **Sandwich Tern** *Thalasseus sandvicensis-*(1) Nice scope views of nine of this smaller tern with yellow tip on black bill at Pitt St.

Black Skimmer *Rynchops niger-*(2) Large flocks flying and perched in Charleston Harbor from Ft. Sumter cruise in Charleston

Columbidae: Pigeons and Doves (3)

Rock Dove Columba livia-(5) Seen often while driving in populated areas

Eurasian Collared-Dove *Streptopelia decaocto-*(2) Seen on wires along the roadsides and in the town of Folly Beach

Mourning Dove Zenaida macroura-(4) Seen in trees at Savannah NWR, on wires in Folly Beach and other locations

Cuculidae: Cuckoos and Allies (1)

Yellow-billed Cuckoo *Coccyzus americanus-*(2) Scope view at Magnolia's Audubon swamp and two at Francis Marion NF

Alcedinidae: Kingfishers (1)

Belted Kingfisher *Megaceryle alcyon-*(8) Seen and heard daily including at Savannah NWR, ACE Basin, and Folly Beach

Picidae: Woodpeckers (8)

Red-headed Woodpecker *Melanerpes erythrocephalus-*(1) This attractive bird was seen in good numbers at Francis Beidler

Red-bellied Woodpecker *Melanerpes carolinus-*(6) Seen and heard at all locations; good looks at the entrance to Savannah

Yellow-bellied Sapsucker *Sphyrapicus varius-*(3) A life bird for Jean, this fall migrant was seen often including at Savannah NWR

Downy Woodpecker Picoides pubescens-(5) Seen and heard at all locations

Hairy Woodpecker Picoides villosus-(2) Seen on the Francis Beidler boardwalk

Red-Cockaded Woodpecker *Leuconotopicus borealis*-(2-RS) We tried twice for this endangered species; heard the first time and then heard and seen well after a long search on the last day at Francis Marion NF

Northern Flicker Colaptes auratus-(4) Seen and heard often at many locations

Pileated Woodpecker *Dryocopus pileatus-*(6-HO,LO) A group favorite, we heard many but only had looks as they flew in front of the van

Falconidae: Falcons and Caracaras (1)

American Kestrel Falco sparverius-(1) One was seen perched at Bear Island, although the group often tried to make other birds into this species

Tyrannidae: Tyrant Flycatchers (2)

Eastern Wood-Pewee *Contopus virens-*(1) Only seen once at Donnelley WMA **Eastern Phoebe** *Sayornis phoebe-*(8) Seen and heard daily at all locations

Laniidae: Shrikes (1)

Loggerhead Shrike Lanius Iudovicianus-(1-LO) Seen on the fence at the Charleston airport

Vireonidae: Vireos (1)

White-eyed Vireo Vireo griseus-(4) Heard and spotted often in mixed feeding flocks; close looks at Audubon Swamp

Corvidae: Crows, Jays, and Magpies (3)

Blue Jay Cyanocitta cristata-(8) Seen and heard daily at all locations

American Crow Corvus brachyrhynchos-(8) Seen and heard vocalizing at all locations

Fish Crow Corvus ossifragus-(2) Heard vocalizing and seen flying over us at Pitt St. causeway

Hirundinidae: Swallows and Martins (3)

Tree Swallow *Tachycineta bicolor-*(4) Many seen in the air over marshes including at Folly Beach, ACE Basin, and Pitt St Bridge

Barn Swallow Hirundo rustica-(1) Seen flying over the fields at Donnelley WMA

Paridae: Tits and Chickadees (2)

Carolina Chickadee Poecile carolinensis-(8) Seen daily leading mixed feeding flocks at all locations

Tufted Titmouse Baeolophus bicolor-(5) Seen almost daily in mixed flocks; good views at feeders at Savannah

Sittidae: Nuthatches (2)

White-breasted Nuthatch Sitta carolinensis-(4) Seen at entrance to the Savannah NWR, at Donnelly WMA, and at Francis Beidler

Brown-headed Nuthatch *Sitta pusilla-*(2) Small flocks found vocalizing at Donnelly WMA and Francis Marion National Forest

Troglodytidae: Wrens (4)

House Wren *Troglodytes aedon-*(4) Many found, often with mixed feeding flocks including Savannah NWR, Donnelly WMA, and Morris Lighthouse inlet

Winter Wren Troglodytes hiemalis-(1) Seen by Pat and Jean skulking around a log at Francis Beidler

Marsh Wren Cistothorus palustris-(1-LO/HO) Heard by Pat at Francis Beidler prairie but wouldn't show himself Carolina Wren Thryothorus Iudovicianus-(8) Proving true to his name, we heard and saw this species at all locations

Polioptilidae: Gnatcatchers (1)

Blue-gray Gnatcatcher Polioptila caerulea-(3) Best looks on short walk at Savannah NWR in Live Oaks

Regulidae: Kinglets (2)

Golden-crowned Kinglet *Regulus satrapa-*(1-LO) One seen well on last day at Francis Marion NF **Ruby-crowned Kinglet** *Regulus calendula-*(4) This kinglet was seen often with mixed feeding flocks

Turdidae: Thrushes (3)

Eastern Bluebird *Sialia sialis-*(4) A group favorite, we first saw this species at Donnelly WMA and later at the Audubon Swamp

Gray-cheeked Thrush *Catharus minimus-*(1) A surprise sighting of this migrant under a bush at Magnolia Gardens **American Robin** *Turdus migratorius-*(3) We found many of this species in Forsyth Park, downtown Savannah

Mimidae: Mockingbirds and Thrashers (3)

Gray Catbird *Dumetella carolinensis-*(8) This species was seen and heard daily and in large numbers at ACE Basin **Brown Thrasher** *Toxostoma rufum-*(3) First one found by Ellen hiding in a bush at Pitt St. causeway **Northern Mockingbird** *Mimus polyglottos-*(8) This species was seen daily at all locations, especially on Folly Island

Sturnidae: Starlings (1)

European Starling Sturnus vulgaris-(1) Watching for this species, we finally had a flock at Folly Beach

Parulidae: Wood-Warblers (10)

Worm-eating Warbler Helmitheros vermivorus-(1-LO) Quick look in palms on ground at Savannah NWR Black-and-White Warbler Mniotilta varia-(3) First one seen by Jean at Savannah NWR; seen again at Francis Beidler

Common Yellowthroat *Geothlypis trichas-*(3) Females seen often in mixed feeding flocks; male seen at Savannah NWR

American Redstart Setophaga ruticilla-(1) A few females seen at Savannah NWR

Northern Parula Setophaga americana-(1-LO) One found in a mixed flock at Francis Beidler

Magnolia Warbler Setophaga magnolia-(1) Close look for all on the Morris Lighthouse inlet walk

Black-throated Blue Warbler *Steophaga caerulescens-*(2) We got great close looks at two of this species, one at Savannah NWR and one from Francis Beidler boardwalk

Palm Warbler *Setophaga palmarum-*(4) This warbler, with distinctive behavioral field marks, was found in large numbers most locations including Savannah NWR, Ft. Moultrie, and Patriot's Point

Pine Warbler *Setophaga pinus-*(3) Good looks in pines at Donnelly WMA and Francis Marion National Forest **Yellow-rumped Warbler** *Setophaga coronata-*(4) Second most numerous warbler seen, present at most locations

Emberizidae: New World Sparrows (8)

Saltmarsh Sparrow *Ammodramus caudacutus-*(1-RS) We arrived at Pitt St. causeway at low tide and had perched looks at this colorful sparrow; lifer for some

Seaside Sparrow *Ammodramus maritimus*-(1-RS) This hard to see Southeast specialty was found in saltmarsh grass during low tide at the Pitt Street causeway, very close looks at adults and juveniles; "high five" life bird for Jean.

Chipping Sparrow Spizella passerina-(1) Flock of 15 found on the road at Donnelley WMA

Savannah Sparrow Passerculus sandwichensis-(1) Seen at low tide perched at Pitt St. causeway

Song Sparrow Melospiza melodia-(2) Seen and heard at Donnelley WMA

Lincoln's Sparrow Melospiza lincolnii-(1-LO) One seen at close range on road at Francis Marion NF

Swamp Sparrow Melospiza georgiana-(3) Nice numbers and good looks along Savannah NWR Laurel Hill Drive

Eastern Towhee Pipilo erythrophthalmus-(4) Heard at Savannah NWR and Donnelly WMA, finally seen at Francis

Marion NF

Cardinalidae: Cardinals and Grosbeaks (4)

Scarlet Tanager Piranga olivacea-(1) Seen by all a number of times while walking at the Savannah NWR visitor's center

Northern Cardinal Cardinalis cardinalis-(8) Large numbers seen daily at all locations

Rose-breasted Grosbeak Pheucticus Iudovicianus-(1-LO) Quick look at a female at Savannah NWR

Indigo Bunting Passerina cyanea-(1) Female or juvenile seen at Savannah NWR from car in a bush on wildlife drive

Icteridae: Blackbirds and Orioles (6)

Eastern Meadowlark *Sturnella magna-*(1-LO) A few seen flying at Donnelley WMA prairie **Red-winged Blackbird** *Agelaius phoeniceus-*(6) Large numbers seen at Savannah NWR, ACE Basin, Francis Marion NF

Brown-headed Cowbird *Molothrus ater-*(1) Hundreds, mixed male and female flock, in trees at lunch at Donnelley WMA

Rusty Blackbird Euphagus carolinus-(1) Good scope looks perched on a post at Donnelley WMA Common Grackle Quiscalus quiscula-(3) Seen flying at Donnelley WMA and Magnolia Plantation's Audubon Swamp Trail

Boat-tailed Grackle Quiscalus major-(4) Common and vocal at many locations

Fringillidae: Finches (2)

House Finch *Haemorhous mexicanus-*(1) Seen on the telephone wires on Folly Island **American Goldfinch** *Spinus tristis-*(1) Only seen once in field at Donnelley WMA prairie

Passeridae: Old World Sparrows (1)

House Sparrow Passer domesticus-(4) Seen in cities in parking lots and on Folly Island

Mammals: 4 Species

Eastern Gray Squirrel *Sciurus carolinensis-*(8) Seen daily at all locations, very numerous! **Bottlenose Dolphin** *Tursiops truncates-*(1) Exciting sighting on the cruise to Ft. Sumter **White-tailed Deer** *Odocoileus virginianus-*(1) Seen in the swamp at Francis Beidler **Eastern Fox Squirrel** *Sciurus niger-*(1) Seen on trip to Francis Beidler Audubon Center

Reptiles: 2 Species

American Alligator *Alligator mississippiensis*-(3) Numerous sightings at the Savannah NWR, at Donnelley WMA and many at Magnolia Garden and Audubon Swamp

Yellow-Bellied Slider Trachemys scripta scripta-(2) Seen at Savannah NWR and Audubon Swamp
