Birds (258 species, of which 6 were heard only):

Tinamidae: Tinamous (2)

Great Tinamou Tinamus major—(HO) Heard daily at the Tower

Little Tinamou Crypturellus soui—Seen at the entrance to Pipeline Road

Cracidae: Guans and Curassows (1)

Gray-headed Chachalaca Ortalis cinereiceps—Heard and seen often; almost daily at the Lodge feeders

Ciconiidae: Storks (1)

Wood Stork Mycteria americana—Spotted by Linda near the airport; flew over mud flats at Viejo

Fregatidae: Frigatebirds (1)

Magnificent Frigatebird Fregata magnificens—Seen soaring over the Panama Canal

Phalacrocoracidae: Cormorants (1)

Neotropic Cormorant Phalacrocorax brasilianus—Seen on the Chagres River cruise

Anhingidae: Anhingas (1)

Anhinga Anhinga anhinga—Seen during the Chagres River cruise and at Summit Pond

Pelecanidae: Pelicans (1)

Brown Pelican Pelecanus occidentalis—Seen at Viejo mud flats and flying along the canal

Ardeidae: Herons and Egrets (12)

Rufescent Tiger-Heron Tigrisoma lineatum—Seen three times, best view at the Ammo Ponds

Great Blue Heron Ardea herodias—Seen at Viejo, Chagres River and pond in Colon

Cocoi Heron Ardea cocoi—Good scope views roosting in mangroves at Viejo mud flats

Great Egret *Ardea alba*—Seen numerous times at many locations

Snowy Egret Egretta thula—Close views on Chagres River cruise and Colon pond

Little Blue Heron Egretta caerulea—Numerous individuals at Viejo mud flats

Tricolored Heron Egretta tricolor—On pond on Achiote Road and Chagres River

Cattle Egret Bubulcus ibis—Seen with cattle, horses, goats, and sheep

Green Heron Butorides virescens—Two at Summit Ponds and pond in Colon

Striated Heron Butorides striata — Seen at Ammo Pond, Chagres River, and Achoite Road town pond

Yellow-crowned Night-Heron *Nyctanassa violacea*—Roosting in Viejo mangroves and three at pond in Colon **Boat-billed Heron** *Cochlearius*—What fun to find eight at pond in Colon, one on nest turning her eggs

Threskiornithidae: Ibis and Spoonbills (2)

White Ibis Eudocimus albus—Numerous individuals on mud flats at Viejo Glossy Ibis Piegadis falcinellus—Three flew low over our boat on the Chagres River cruise

Cathartidae: New World Vultures (2)

Black Vulture *Coragyps atratus*—Seen daily in good numbers at all locations **Turkey Vulture** *Cathartes aura*—Seen daily in good numbers at all locations

Pandionidae: Osprey (1)

Osprey Pandion haliaetus—Two seen on the Chagres River cruise

Accipitridae: Hawks, Eagles, and Kites (14)

Pearl Kite Gampsonyx swainsonii—Seen along Pan American Highway on trip to Canopy Lodge
Hooked-billed Kite Chondrohierax uncinatus—Seen flying over the Pipeline Road
Gray-headed Kite Leptodon cayanensis—One seen perched and another in flight on La Mesa Road
Snail Kite Rostrhamus sociabilis—Good numbers of adults and juveniles on the Chagres River cruise
Double-toothed Kite Harpagus bidentatus—Seen twice; perched along Semaphore Road and on Achiote Road
Tiny Hawk Accipiter superciliosus—Landed 10 feet from us at Summit Pond while chasing a kingfisher
Crane Hawk Geranospiza caerulescens—(GO) Seen by Pat, flying over Old Gamboa Road
Common Black Hawk Buteogallus anthracinus—Seen soaring at Viejo flats and perched at the Marina
Roadside Hawk Rupornis magnirostris—Perched in a tree at chicken farm
White Hawk Pseudastur albicollis—Seen perched on the tree line on Chagres River
Gray-lined Hawk Buteo nitidus—One perched and one flying at Summit Ponds
Broad-winged Hawk Buteo platypterus—Two good sightings; along Old Gamboa Road and at San Lorenzo
Short-tailed Hawk Buteo brachyurus—Stopped on Pan American Highway transfer to see one soaring
Zone-tailed Hawk Buteo albonotatus—Seen by Mark and Craig over Mada Ahegado Road

Eurypigidae: Sunbittern (1)

Sunbittern Eurypyga helias—Seen from the lodge walking on the rocks in the Rio Guayabo River

Rallidae: Rails, Crakes, and Coots (4)

White-throated Crake Laterallus albigularis—After hearing numerous birds at Ammo Ponds, got looks at one Gray-cowled Wood-Rail Aramides cajaneus—Seen at the fruit feeders at the Canopy Lodge Purple Gallinule Porphyrio martinica—Seen on the Chagres River cruise Common Gallinule Gallinula galeata—Seen on the Chagres River cruise

Aramidae: Limpkin (1)

Limpkin Aramus guarauna—Seen on the Chagres River cruise

Charadriidae: Plovers and Lapwings (3)

Black-bellied Plover *Pluvialis squatarola*—Two seen on the mud flats at Viejo **Southern Lapwing** *Vanellus chilensis*—Seen often in agricultural fields **Collared Plover** *Charadrius collaris*—Good scope looks at Viejo mud flats

Jacanidae: Jacanas (1)

Wattled Jacana Jacana jacana—Many seen on Chagres River and at Ammo Ponds

Scolopacidae: Sandpipers and Allies (3)

Whimbrel <u>Numenius</u> phaeopus—Over 10 seen at the Viejo mud flats

Spotted Sandpiper Actitis macularius—Seen in good numbers at Viejo mud flats and on the Chagres River

Willet Tringa semipalmata—More than 10 seen at the Viejo mud flats

Laridae: Gulls and Terns (2)

Laughing Gull *Leucophaeus atricilla*—Hundreds on the mud flats at Viejo **Royal Tern** *Thalasseus maximus*—Seen over the Chagres River and a few over the Caribbean Sea

Columbidae: Pigeons and Doves (4)

Rock Pigeon Columba livia—Common species in the cities of Panama and Colon Pale-vented Pigeon Patagioenas cayennensis—Seen often at many locations Ruddy Ground-Dove Columbina talpacoti—Often seen along the roads and on wires White-tipped Dove Leptotila verreauxi—At the Lodge feeders daily

Cuculidae: Cuckoos and Anis (3)

Greater Ani *Crotophaga major*—Seen in groups on small islands on the Chagres River cruise **Smooth-billed Ani** *Crotophaga ani*—Close looks at the Ammo and Summit Ponds **Squirrel Cuckoo** *Piaya cayana*—A crowd favorite, seen daily at most locations

Strigidae: Owls (4)

Tropical Screech-Owl Megascops choliba—Seen roosting in a tree along La Mesa Road Spectacled Owl Pulsatrix perspicillata--Hiked to the roosting area along the Cara Iguana trail Mottled Owl Ciccaba virgata—One made a surprise visit to the Lodge one evening and heard at the Tower Black-and White Owl Ciccaba nigrolineata—(HO) Heard at the Tower by Don and Mark

Nyctibildae: Potoos (1)

Great Potoo Nyctibius grandis—Known roosting spot near Pipeline Road

Apodidae: Swifts (1)

Band-rumped Swift Chaetura spinicaudus—Identified by Eliecer on Achiote Road

Trochilidae: Hummingbirds (20)

White-necked Jacobin Florisuga mellivora—Most common hummingbird at Tower feeders
Rufous-breasted Hermit Glaucis hirstus—Seen feeding in flowers on Ville Chiquito Road
Green Hermit Phaethornis strigularis—Male and female feeding in flowers at El Nispiro and Adventure Road
Long-billed Hermit Phaethornis longirostris—Seen occasionally at the Tower feeders
Stripe-throated Hermit Phaethornis strigularis—Seen at flowers on Pipeline Road, Las Minas, and Mada Ahgado
Road

Black-throated Mango *Anthracothorax nigricollis*—Seen near Ammo and Summit Ponds

Green Thorntail *Discosura conversii*—Scope looks at three, male and females, in tree above the Lodge dining room

Rufous-crested Coquette *Lophornis delattrei*—Found in flowering shrubs at El Nispiro **Long-billed Starthroat** *Heliomaster longirostris*—Found by Tino at flowers near the Lodge

Garden Emerald Chlorostilbon assimilis—Seen at two locations: Riande and Mada Ahgado Road

Violet-headed Hummingbird Klais guimeti—Seen daily at the Lodge in flowers by the feeders

White-vented Plumeleteer Chalybura buffonii—Was coming to the feeder by the Lodge and perched at Tower

Bronze-tailed Plumeleteer Chalybura urachrysia—Feeding at flowers along Las Minas Road

Crowned Woodnymph Thalurania colombica—Perched at Adventure Camp and Cerro Gaital Road

Blue-chested Hummingbird Amazilia amabilis—Seen often at Tower feeders

Snowy-bellied Hummingbird Amazilia edward—Seen daily at Lodge feeders

Rufous-tailed Hummingbird Amazilia tzacatl—Seen at Canopy Adventure, El Nispiro, Cerro Gaital

Violet-capped Hummingbird Goldmania violiceps—Briefly seen by a few at top of the Tower

Sapphire-throated Hummingbird Lepidopyga coeruleogularis—Seen at the Ammo Ponds coming to flowers

Violet-bellied Hummingbird Damophila julie—Seen twice at Pipeline and Old Gamboa Roads

Trogonidae: Trogons (5)

Slaty-tailed Trogon Trogon Massena—Scope views at the entrance to Pipeline Road
Black-tailed Trogon Trogon melanurus—Scope views at the entrance to Pipeline Road
White-tailed Trogon Trogon chionurus—Scope looks at the entrance to Pipeline Road
Gartered Trogon Trogon caligatus—Seen three times; Summit Pond, Fort San Lorenzo, Plantation Trail
Black-throated Trogon Trogon rufus—Seen on Pipeline Road

Momotidae: Motmots (5)

Tody Motmot Hylomanes momotula—Heard seven; finally saw one clearly on Elnirador Road on the last day Lesson's Motmot Momotus lessonii—Close views at Canopy Adventure office Whooping Motmot Momotus subrufescens—Scope views on Pipeline Road and Tower feeders Rufous Motmot Baryphthengus martii—Most often seen Motmot at most locations Broad-billed Motmot Electron platyrhynchum—Seen often; Pipeline and Semaphore Roads, Cerro Gaital

Alcedinidae: Kingfishers (4)

Ringed Kingfisher Megaceryle alcyon—Seen at Summit Ponds and on Chagres River
Amazon Kingfisher Chloroceryle amazona—Seen at Summit Ponds
Green Kingfisher Chloroceryle americana—Seen perched above river at the Lodge
American Pygmy Kingfisher Chloroceryle aenea—Seen at Summit Pond and on the Chagres River cruise

Bucconidae: Puffbirds (4)

White-necked Puffbird Notharchus hypeerrhynchus—Found by Eliecer on a line near Fort San Lorenzo Black-breasted Puffbird Notharchus pectoralis—Scope looks on Semaphore Road Pied Puffbird Notharchus tectus—Perched along Achiote Road for scope looks White-whiskered Puffbird Malacoptila panamensis—(HO) Heard often on Pipeline Road and Achiote Road

Capitonidae: New World Barbets (1)

Spot-crowned Barbet Capito maculicoronatus—Seen on Achiote Rd. & at Canopy Lodge's feeders

Ramphasatidae: Toucans (4)

Northern Emerald-Toucanet Aulacorhynchus prasinu—Seen low above our heads in a tree on La Mesa Road Collared Aracari Pteroglossus torquatus—This crowd favorite came to the Canopy Lodge's feeders Yellow-throated Toucan Ramphastos ambiguus—Watched on road to Ammo Pond fighting with Keel-billed Keel-billed Toucan Ramphastos sulfuratus—Seen often from the Tower

Picidae: Woodpeckers (5)

Black-cheeked Woodpecker *Melanerpes pucherani*—Seen on Pipeline Road, Chagres River, Achiote Road **Red-crowned Woodpecker** *Melanerpes rubricapillus*—Seen and heard often, pair came to Lodge feeders **Cinnamon Woodpecker** *Celeus loricatus*—Great looks at three of this beauty at entrance to Pipeline Road **Lineated Woodpecker** *Dryocopus lineatus*—Seen on telephone pole along Las Minas Road **Crimson-crested Woodpecker** *Campephilus melanoleucos*—Heard then found by Mark on Plantation Road

Falconidae: Falcons and Caracaras (3)

Crested Caracara *Caracara cheriway*—At Viejo mud flats and in a city park near Country Suites **Yellow-headed Caracara** *Milvago chimachima*—Seen often at many locations **American Kestrel** *Falco sparverius*—Seen on wire over field at the Gatun Dam in Colon

Psittacidae: Parrots (5)

Orange-chinned Parakeet Brotogeris jugularis—Often heard before seen; close looks at Summit Pond Brown-hooded Parrot Pyrilia haematotis—Seven individuals; seen only once, along Las Minas Road Blue-headed Parrot Pionus menstruus—Seen on the Chagres River, La Mesa Road, Mada Ahgado Red-lored Parrot Amazona autumnalis—Flying and perched in trees for good scope looks from the Tower Mealy Parrot Amazona farinosa—Scope looks from top of the Tower

Thamnophilidae: Antbirds (12)

Barred Antshrike Thamnophilus doliatus—Seen and heard often, with a mixed flock at Ammo Pond Black-crowned Antshrike Thamnophilus atrinucha—Seen twice, on Pipeline Road and Summit Pond Road Russet Antshrike Thamnistes anabatinus—Close looks along Las Minas Road of a male and female Plain Antvireo Dysithamnus mentalis—Good looks at Cerro Gaital with a mixed flock after rain stopped Spot-crowned Antvireo Dysithamnus puncticeps—With mixed feeding flock at Cerro Gaital Checker-throated Antwren Epinecrophylla fulviventris—Seen twice, on Pipeline Road and Las Minas Road White-flanked Antwren Myrmotherula axillaris—Nice, close looks at male and female on Pipeline Road Dot-winged Antwren Microrhopias quixensis—Four seen twice, on Pipeline Road and Cerro Gaital White-bellied Antbird Myrmeciza longipes—Heard and seen by a few on Pipeline Road Chestnut-backed Antbird Myrmeciza exsul—Three beautiful birds seen on Pipeline Road Bicolored Antbird Gymnopithys bicolor—Seen on Pipeline Road Spotted Antbird Hylophylax naevioides—Seen close enough on Pipeline Road to see a metal leg band

Grallariidae: Antpittas (1)

Black-crowned Antpitta Pittasoma michleri—(HO) Heard vocalizing but never showed itself clearly

Formicariidae: Antthrushes (1)

Black-faced Antthrush Formicarius analis—We followed this bird and saw it clearly for a long period on Rio Indio

Furnariidae: Ovenbirds, Woodcreepers, and Allies (7)

Scaly-throated Leaftosser Sclerurus guatemalensis—Spotted first by Mark in leaves on Summit Pond Road Plain-brown Woodcreeper Dendrocincla fulginosa—Three seen on Pipeline Road Wedge-billed Woodcreeper Glyphorynchus spirurus—Seen twice, on La Mesa Road and at El Nispiro Northern Barred Woodcreeper Dendrocolaptes sanctithomae—Found on Pipeline Road Cocoa Woodcreeper Xiphorhynchus susurrans—Our best look was at the Lodge feeders Spotted Woodcreeper Dendroplex erythropygius—Twice, on Las Minas Road and at El Nispiro Plain Xenops Xenops minutus—Seen within hummingbird bushes at El Nispiro

Tyrannidae: Tyrant Flycatchers (25)

Brown-capped Tyrannulet *Ornithion brunneicapillus*—Finally got good looks from the top of the Tower

Yellow-bellied Elaenia Elaenia flavogaster—Close looks at El Nispiro

Lesser Elaenia Elaenia chiriquensis—Seen in the mixed tanager flock on La Mesa Road

Olive-Stripped Flycatcher Mionectes olivaceus—Seen twice; Canopy Adventure and Valle Chiquito

Ochre-bellied Flycatcher Mionectes oleaginous—Good looks on Fort San Lorenzo Road

Sepia-capped Flycatcher Leptopogon amaurocephalus—With mixed flock on Valle Chiquito Road

Paltry Tyranulet Zimmerius vilissimus—Seen on La Mesa Road

Black-capped Pygmy-Tyrant Myiornis atricapillus—Cute, busy little guys, two seen on Plantation Trail

Scaly-crested Pygmy-Tyrant Lophotriccus pileatus—Close looks at this little guy at Cerro Gaital

Southern Bentbill *Oncostoma olivaceum*—We heard this species often; finally good looks on Pipeline Rd

Common Tody-Flycatcher Todirostrum cinereum—Seen twice; nest building at Riande and top of the Tower

Black-headed Tody Flycatcher Todirastrum nigriceps—Good looks at a pair from top of Tower

Olivaceous Flatbill Rhynchocyclus olivaceus—Seen twice, on Pipeline Road and Semaphore Road

Golden-crowned Spadebill Platyrinchus coronatus—Surprise looks at this rare species on Plantation Trail

Black-tailed Flycatcher Myiobius atricaudus—Two seen on walk on Summit Pond Road

Bright-rumped Attila Attila spadiceus—(HO) We heard and had quick looks on Pipeline Road

Dusky-capped Flycatcher Myiarchus tuberculifer—Finally seen on Valle Chiquito Road

Great Crested Flycatcher Myiarchus crinitus—Seen on Summit Pond Road and Semaphore Road

Lesser Kiskadee Pitangus lector—Fun discovery of one on a nest on Chagres River cruise

Great Kiskadee Pitangus sulphuratus—Seen and heard almost daily at all locations

Rusty-margined Flycatcher Myiozetetes cayanensis—Seen often; Ammo Ponds, Pipeline Road, Chagres River

Social Flycatcher *Myiozetetes similis*—Seen often at many locations

Piratic Flycatcher Legatus leucophaius—Pair seen and heard vocalizing, top of a tree on Chagres River

Tropical Kingbird Tyrannus melancholicus—Birds seen daily at all locations

Fork-tailed Flycatcher Tyrannus savana—Seen twice, wires at Ammo Ponds, mobbing hawk at marina

Cotingidae: Cotingas and Allies (2)

Purple-throated Fruitcrow Querula purpurata—Seen flying on Pipeline Road

Blue Cotinga Cotinga nattererii—(HO) Unfortunately, heard but not seen on Summit Pond Road

Pipridae: Manakins (5)

Lance-tailed Manakin Chiroxiphia lanceolata—Pair seen at Summit Ponds; female at Canopy Adventure

White-ruffed Manakin Corapipo altera—With tanagers on La Mesa Road and at Cerro Gaital

Blue-crowned Manakin Lepidothrix coronata—Nice looks at pair on Pipeline Road

Golden-collared Manakin Manacus vitellinus—(HO) Heard twice, Summit Ponds and Semaphore Road

Red-capped Manakin Ceratopipra mentalis—Three males and female at eye level at top of Tower

Tityridae: Becards and Tityras (3)

Masked Tityra Tityra semifasciata—Found at top of a tree on Achiote Road

Russet-winged Schiffornis Schiffornis stenorhyncha—(HO) Heard clearly on Pipeline Road

Cinnamon Becard Pachyramphus cinnamomeus—Good pictures of one at hot spot on La Mesa Road

Vireonidae: Vireos (3)

Scrub Greenlet *Hylophilus flavipes*—One seen at Ammo Ponds

Green Shrike-Vireo Vireolanius pulchellus—Wow, heard so often, finally seen at top of Tower last day

Lesser Greenlet Pachsylvia decurtata—Seen feeding at the top of the Tower

Corvidae: Crows and Jays (1)

Black-chested Jay Cyanocorax affinis—Scope looks at Summit Pond, seen often around the Lodge

Hirundinidae: Swallows and Martins (4)

Blue-and-white Swallow Pygochelidon cyanoleuca—Seen flying over downtown El Valle
Southern Rough-winged Swallow Stelgidopteryx ruficollis—Most common swallow seen at almost all locations
Gray-breasted Martin Progne chalybea—Seen flying and perched at many locations
Mangrove Swallow Tachycineta albilinea—Seen over water, especially Chagres River

Troglodytidae: Wrens (9)

Scaly-breasted Wren Microcerculus marginatus—Quick looks at this small, furtive wren at Valle Chiquito
House Wren Troglodytes aedon—Daily visitor around the Lodge feeders, heard often elsewhere
Black-bellied Wren Pheugopedius fasciatoventris—Nice looks at this beauty on Pipeline Road
Rufous-breasted Wren Pheugopedius rutilus—Best looks along Las Minas Road
Isthmian Wren Cantorchilus modestus—Heard vocalizing, then open looks at this friendly species at Ammo Ponds
Bay Wren Cantorchilus nigricapillus—Loud song heard around Lodge, seen near compost pile
Buff-breasted Wren Cantorchilus leucotis—Nice looks at two at Ammo Ponds
White-breasted Wood-wren Henicorhina leucosticte—Hard to see species, this bird was vocal and in the open,
possibly guarding a nest on Semaphore Road
Song Wren Cyphorhinus phaeocephalus—Brief looks on the Plantation Trail

Polioptilidae: Gnatcatchers (3)

Tawny-faced Gnatwren *Microbates cinereiventris*—Surprisingly close looks at Cerro Gaital with mixed flock **Long-billed Gnatwren** *Ramphocelus melanurus*—We worked hard to see this bird on the El Nispiro Road **Tropical Gnatcatcher** *Polioptila plumbea*—Frequently heard and seen at the top of the Tower

Turdidae: Thrushes (2)

Pale-vented Thrush Turdus obsoletus—Seen at Cerro Gaital
Clay-colored Thrush Turdus grayi—Frequently seen at many locations; visitor to Lodge feeders

Mimidae: Mockingbirds and Thrashers (1)

Tropical Mockingbird Mimus gilvus—Seen each visit to Canal and on Achiote Road

Rhodinocichlidae: Thrush-tanagers (1)

Rosy Thrush-Tanager Rhodinocichia rosea — Heard often and quick glimpses at Mata Ahogado

Parulidae: New World Warblers (11)

Northern Waterthrush Parkesia noveboracensis—Seen at Colon Pond along the water
Golden-winged Warbler Vermivora chrysoptera—Good looks with mixed flock at Cerro Gaital
Black-and-white Warbler Mniotilta varia—Seen twice with mixed flocks; El Nispiro and Cerro Gaital
Tennessee Warbler Oreothlypis peregrina—Frequent sightings with mixed flocks and at Lodge feeders
Mourning Warbler Geothlypis philadelphia—(HO) Heard, hiding in bushes, three different locations
Bay-breasted Warbler Setophaga castanea—Seen often at top of Tower and with mixed flocks
Yellow Warbler Setophagapetechia—Mangrove male a surprise, seen above our heads in a tree at Viejo mud flats; usual Yellows seen occasionally with mixed flocks

Chestnut-sided Warbler Setophaga pensylvanica—Seen with mixed flocks at Las Minas and Cerro Gaital Rufous-capped Warbler Basileuterus rufifrons—Common local warbler seen with many mixed feeding flocks Buff-rumped Warbler Basileuterus rufifrons— Vocal, tropical resident seen at the Lodge's compost pile Canada Warbler Cardellina canadensis—Nice looks at a male and female with mixed flock on La Mesa Road

Thraupidae: Tanagers and Allies (24)

Gray-headed Tanager Eucometis penicillata—Good looks on Pipeline Road and at Summit Pond White-shouldered Tanager Tachyphonus luctuosus—Seen frequently in mixed tanager flocks Tawny-crested Tanager Tachyphonus delatrii—In mixed tanager flock on La Mesa Road White-lined Tanager Tachyphonus rufus—Male and female on La Mesa Road Flame-rumped Tanager Ramphocelus flammigerus—Daily visitor to Lodge feeders Crimson-backed Tanager Ramphocelus dimidiatus—Daily visitor to Lodge and with other mixed flocks Blue-gray Tanager Thraupis episcopus—Common, but beautiful tanager, seen at most locations Palm Tanager Thraupis palmarum—Very commonly seen, at most locations Golden-hooded Tanager Tangara larvata—Always a crowd favorite, thankfully seen often with mixed flocks Plain-colored Tanager Tangara inorata—One good sighting, out of the Tower dining room window at lunch Bay-headed Tanager Tangara gyrola—Another beauty, seen often with mixed tanager flocks Emerald Tanager Tangara florida — Four of these beauties seen with mixed tanager flock on La Mesa Road Silver-throated Tanager Tanagara icterocephala—Rare sighting at Lodge feeders and many in tanager flock Blue Dacnis Dacnis cayana—Good looks of male and female from the top of the Tower Shining Honeycreeper Cyanerpes lucidus—Two found with mixed flock on La Mesa Road Red-legged Honeycreeper Cyanerpes cyaneus—Found in flowering yellow tree on road to Summit Ponds Green Honeycreeper Chlorophanes spiza—Seen with other honeycreepers in flowering Summit Pond tree Variable Seedeater Sporophila corvina—Seen at Ammo Pond and Cerro Gaital Bananaquit Coereba flaveola—Seen with mixed flocks on La Mesa Road and Cerro Gaital Yellow-faced Grassquit Tiaris olivaceus—Many along La Mesa and Rio Indio Roads Buff-throated Saltator Saltator maximus—Best looks at Lodge feeders; also seen often at other locations Black-headed Saltator Saltator grossus—We stopped along La Mesa Road to see this species Streaked Saltator Saltator striatipectus—Seen three times; Las Minas Road, Summit Pond, Valle Chiquito Slate-colored Grosbeak Saltator grossus—Seen by a few on Chagres River cruise

Emberizidae: New World Sparrows (2)

Black-striped Sparrow *Arremonops conirostris*—Seen at close range on La Mesa Road at tanager tree **Orange-billed Sparrow** *Arremon aurantiirostris*—Good looks at this shy bird by the group on Plantation Trail

Mitrospingidae: Mitrospingid Tanagers (1)

Dusky-faced Tanager Mitrospingus cassinii—Many seen at Canopy Adventure and few seen at lodge feeders

Cardinalidae: Cardinals and Grosbeaks (4)

Summer Tanager Piranga rubra—Seen three times, all females, one always at Lodge feeders Red-crowned Ant-Tanager Habia rubica—Pairs on La Mesa Road and Cerro Gaital Red-throated Ant-Tanager Habia fuscicauda—Seen on Pipeline Road Blue-blacked Grosbeak Cyanoloxia cyanoides—Seen on walk at Canopy Adventure

Icteridae: New World Blackbirds (9)

Red-breasted Meadowlark *Sturnella militaris*—In field by Gatun dam in Colon **Chestnut-headed Oropendola** *Psarocolius wagleri*—Heard and seen almost daily

Scarlet-rumped Cacique Cacicus uropygialis—Found at Summit Pond, Achiote Road and Plantation Trail
Yellow-rumped Cacique Cacicus cela—Group found nest building on Chagres River near local village
Orchard Oriole Icterus spurius—Good looks along Chagres River and at Riande Hotel
Yellow-backed Oriole Icterus chrysater—Seen at the entrance to Pipeline Road and Achiote Road
Yellow-tailed Oriole Icterus mesomelas—Found by guide at Ammo Pond
Shiny Cowbird Molothrus bonariensis—Scope looks on Las Minas Road in field
Great-tailed Grackle Quiscalus mexicanus—Seen often at many locations

Fringillidae: Finches and Euphonias (4)

Yellow-crowned Euphonia Euphonia luteicapilla—Found after the rain at Cara Iguana Trail
Thick-billed Euphonia Euphonia laniirostris—Seen daily at Lodge feeders
Fulvous-vented Euphonia Euphonia fulvicrissa-- Seen at the Riande and pair on Pipeline Road
Tawny-capped Euphonia Euphonia anneae—Nice looks with mixed flocks on La Mesa Road and Cerro Gaital

Mammals (14 species):

Central American Woolly Opossum Caluromys derbianus—Came to Tower window in evening for a banana Hoffmann's Two-toed Sloth Choloepus hoffmanni—Seen on night drive on Semaphore Road Brown-throated Three-toed Sloth Bradypus variegatus—Seen often at many locations Geoffroy's Tamarin Sanguinus geoffroyi—Came to Tower windows daily at lunch time Panamanian (Western) Night Monkey Aotus zonalis—Seen twice; on night drive and roosting in tree cavity White-faced Capuchin Cebus capucinus—Seen on Pipeline Road and Chagres River cruise Mantled Howler Monkey Alouatta palliate—Seen and heard at a number of locations Variegated Squirrel Sciurus variegatoides—Seen on Pipeline Road, Cara Iguana Trail, and Mata Ahogado Red-tailed Squirrel Sciurus granatensis—Beautiful large squirrel seen at many locations and at Lodge feeders Central American Agouti Dasyprocta punctate—Seen crossing roads and under feeders White-nosed Coati Nasuaa narica—Frequently seen around the Tower, 15 in a field near Gatun Dam Allen's Olingo Bassaricyon alleni—Identified by Eliecer on the night drive on Semaphore Road Kinkajou Potos flavus—Seen on night drive on Semaphore Road White-tailed Deer Odocoileus virginianus—Spotted by the guide on Plantation Trail
