




June 2 - 13, 2019 Alaska: Birding and Wildlife

BIRDS: 144 species

DUCKS, GEESE, AND SWANS Anatidae

Greater White-fronted Goose *Anser albifrons* – A pair on our last full day in Denali at the creek into Wonder Lake **Brant** *Branta bernicla* – There were close to 200 on Safety Sound Lagoon

Canada Goose Branta Canadensis – Seen sporadically on the Seward Peninsula, more common further south

Trumpeter Swan Cygnus buccinators – The swan species we saw nesting in the back areas of Nome

Tundra Swan Cygnus columbianus – Over 150 were seen on the east of Safety Sound Lagoon

Northern Shoveler Spatula clypeata – Seen once or twice a day on the Seward Peninsula

Gadwall Mareca strepera – Potter March and Westchester Lagoon each had a few pairs swimming around

American Wigeon Mareca Americana – We saw up to ten different individuals a day on the Seward Peninsula

Mallard Anas platyrhynchos – Only one was seen on our time on the Seward Peninsula

Northern Pintail Anas acuta – The most common dabbler that we saw on the Peninsula

Green-winged Teal Anas crecca – Small groups were seen every day on the Seward Peninsula

Falcated Duck Anas falcata – The drake present on Potter Marsh gave us a great look

Ring-necked Duck Aythya collaris – A pair in a roadside pond on our drive back from Seward to Anchorage

Greater Scaup Aythya marila – The only scaup we saw while on the Seward Peninsula

Lesser Scaup Aythya affinis – The "scaup" in the Denali kettle ponds

Common Eider Somateria mollissima – Fairly "common" all along Safety Sound lagoon

Harlequin Duck Histrionicus histrionicus – Common on the Seward Peninsula Rivers, & along the shore of Seward

White-winged Scoter Melanitta deglandi – We got to observe four drakes offshore of Safety Sound

Black Scoter Melanitta Americana – Only sighting was of a pair on the east end of Safety Sound

Long-tailed Duck Clangula hyemalis – A few pair were seen on the ponds just outside of Nome **Bufflehead** Bucephala albeola – A bit more common than in years past with five seen in Denali **Barrow's Goldeneye** Bucephala islandica – A good looking drake in "Duck" Pond was very cooperative **Common Merganser** Mergus merganser – Seeen flying over the boat as we returned to the Seward HArbor **Red-breasted Merganser** Mergus serrator – Very common along the rivers of the Seward Peninsula

PARTRIDGES, PHEASANTS, AND ALLIES Phasianidae

Willow Ptarmigan Lagopus lagopus — It was a good year for this species in the Nome area, and in Denali **Rock Ptarmigan** Lagopus muta — Only three were seen along the Nome-Teller Road, and each gave us long looks

GREBES Podicipe didae

Red-necked Grebe Podiceps grisegena – Lots of nesting pairs in Anchorage, and a few up in the Nome area

PIGEONS AND DOVES Columbidae

Rock Pigeon (I) Columba livia – A small flock in Nome was an unusual location

HUMMINGBIRDS Trochilidae

Rufous Hummingbird Selasphorus rufus – Seen of all places at Cataract Cove near the waterfall

Cranes Gruidae

Sandhill Crane Antigone Canadensis – Seen every day on our Nome leg of the tour

Oystercatchers Haematopodidae

Black Oystercatcher *Haematopus bachmani* – A nesting pair were chasing an immature Bald Eagle away from its nest out near Northwestern Fjord

Plovers and Lapwings Charadriidae

Black-bellied Plover - *Pluvialis squatarola* – We found a number of these on Wooly Lagoon Road, & one on a nest **Am. Golden-Plover** - *Pluvialis dominica* – The less common of the two goldens, & did find a nest on Curlew Dome **Pacific Golden-Plover** *Pluvialis fulva* – More gold highlights on this species, and plenty of individuals **Semi-palmated Plover** *Charadrius semipalmatus* – A common nester that we found mostly on gravel roadsides

SANDPIPERS AND ALLIES Scolopacidae

Whimbrel Numenius phaeopus – We always got to see a couple a day in the Nome area

Bristle-thighed Curlew Numenius tahitiensis – We only saw one individual and it was up on the hill

Bar-tailed Godwit Limosa lapponica – Two breeding plumaged males were feeding along Safety Sound

Marbled Godwit Limosa fedoa – A surprise as it was a couple of years ago, feeding near, but not with the Bar-t's

Surfbird Calidris virgate – Seen on the strenuous hike up to Camp Ridge in Denali

Rock Sandpiper *Calidris ptilocnemis* – We told there was something interesting at the top of the slope at MP 34 on the Nome-Teller Road. And this is what we found

Least Sandpiper Calidris minutilla —Not a common species by the least, nice to have found one in the Nome area Semipalmated Sandpiper Calidris pusilla — The most common sandpiper in the greater Nome area Western Sandpiper Calidris mauri — Te second most common sandpiper, but the best colored one of all Wilson's Snipe Gallinago delicate — Lots of winnowing and display flights going on, and great ground looks Red-necked Phalarope Phalaropus lobatus — Always has some in view every 15 minutes in the Nome area Spotted Sandpiper Actitis macularius — Like in other parts of the country, found near the edge of water Wandering Tattler Tringa incana — A few were seen on nesting bars in the middle of streams

JAEGERS AND SKUAS Stercorariidae

Pomarine Jaeger *Stercorarius pomarinus* – Only saw one individual of the Cadillac of jaegers **Parasitic Jaeger** *Stercorarius parasiticus* – More common than in years past, with about fifteen sightings

Long-tailed Jaeger Stercorarius longicaudus – The most common, and it was always putting on an aerial show

AUKS. MURRES. AND PUFFINS Alcidae

Common Murre *Uria aalge* – Not nearly as common as last year in Resurrection Bay **Thick-billed Murre** *Uria lomvia* – Only saw four, but they were pretty good looks

Pigeon Guilemot *Cepphus Columba* – We saw at least fifty scattered around on our Northwestern Fjord trip **Marbled Murrelet** *Brachyramphus marmoratus* – A large raft of birds in Emerald Cove was unusual

Kittlitz's Murrelet *Brachyramphus brevirostris* – There was a total of six seen out near Northwestern Glacier **Ancient Murrelet** *Synthliboramphus antiquus* – Two small flyby groups were out near Ailiak Fjord

Cassin's Auklet Ptychoramphus aleuticus – Just one individual flying away from our boat as we watched the killer whales

Parakeet Auklet Aethia psittacula – Three different sightings of less than five birds each, all out by the Chiswell Islands

Rhinoceros Auklet Cerorhinca monocerata – We did get to view two different groups of nearly fifteen

Horned Puffin Fratercula corniculata – Certainly the more common of the two puffins out on the Chiswell Islands

Tufted PuffinFratercula cirrhata – Still one of the more stunning birds on the trip

GULLS AND TERNS Laridae

Black-legged Kittiwake Rissa tridactyla – Huge nesting colonies, with our best looks at Cape Resurrection

Mew Gull Larus canus – The most common gull of interior Alaska, nesting in marshes, on building tops & in trees

Herring Gull Larus argentatus – A few were moving around the Nome area, with one being the vega race

Slaty-backed Gull Larus schistisagus – Only one was seen at the Safety Sound Bridge during our fox watch

Glaucous-winged Gull Larus glaucescens – The common gull along the Seward shoreline

Glaucous Gull Larus hyperboreus – The common gull of the Nome area, big bruisers for sure

Aleutian Tern Onychoprion aleuticus – We had a few foraging and flying around down at the Bonanza Bridge

Arctic Tern Sterna paradisaea – Common wherever there was water

LOONS Gaviidae

Red-throated Loon *Gavia stellate* – A common pond nester in the Nome area. Absolutely striking **Pacific Loon** *Gavia pacifica* – Only saw four in Nome, and one was on a nest **Common Loon** *Gavia immer* – Best sightings were in the Nome area

PETRELS AND SHEARWATERS Procellariidae

Sooty Sherwater Ardenna grisea – A few went by during our seated, outgoing boat trip to the Chiswells

CORMORANTS Phalacrocoracidae

Red-faced Cormorant *Phalacrocorax urile* – Only one flyby was seen and that was only by three of us **Pelagic Cormorant** *Phalacrocorax pelagicus* – Nesting by the outer islands in the Chiswell area **Double-crested Cormorant** *Phalacrocorax auritus* – Scattered around the Resurrection Bay area

OSPREY Pandionidae

Osprey Pandion haliaetus – Only one seen on the trip was up by the Bonanza Bridge in Nome

HAWKS, KITES, AND EAGLES Accipitridae

Golden Eagle Aquila chrysaetos – The two on Kougorok gave us great looks at copulation, nest building & flying **Northern Harrier** Circus cyaneus – Adult males seemed to be the most prevalent indicating incubation was on **Northern Goshawk** Accipiter gentilis – Only one seen and that flew over the vans on our way to Seward **Bald Eagle** Haliaeetus leucocephalus – Seen in Anchorage and Seward almost daily **Red-tailed Hawk** Buteo jamaicensis – A Harlan's Hawk was seen during the drive to Denali National Park **Rough-legged Hawk** Buteo lagopus – We had birds on two nests and a few flying individuals in Nome

OWLS Strigidae

Short-eared Owl Asio flammeus – Seen once in Nome and three times in Denali

KINGFISHERS Alcedinidae

Belted Kingfisher Megaceryle alcyon – We heard one bird calling while at the fish weir on Bear Creek

WOODPECKERS Picidae

Downy Woodpecker *Picoides pubescens* – One was eating peanut butter at Ava's feeders **Hairy Woodpecker** *Picoides villosus* – A female was taking turns with the male Downy at Ava's at the peanut butter feeder

FALCONS AND CARACARAS Falconidae

Merlin Falco columbarius – Seen along the Park Road on our second day in Denali Gyrfalcon Falco rusticverolus – Anest with three young and attendant adults feeding them was a treat Peregrine Falcon Falco peregrinus – A fly by on the Council Road was right over the willow tops

TYRANT FLYCATCHERS Tyrannidae

Alder Flycatcher *Empidonax alnorum* – Heard more than seen on the Nome-Teller Road at Penny River **Say's Phoebe** *Sayornis saya* – One was alongside the road on the Nome-Teller Road

SHRIKES Laniidae

Northern Shrike Lanius excubitor – Seen during our musk ox stop at the Nome cemetery

CROWS AND JAYS Corvidae

Gray Jay *Perisoreus Canadensis* – Two were seen on our drive from North Face Lodge to the Denali RR Depot **Black-billed Magpie** *Pica hudsonia* – In the yard of the Copper Whale in Anchorage **Northwestern Crow** *Corvus caurinus* – Seen on some of the outer islands of Resurrection Bay **Common Raven** *Corvus corax* – Seen every day of the trip

LARKS Alaudidae

Horned Lark Eremophila alpestris – Seen on both the foray and the strenuous hike from North Face Lodge

SWALLOWS AND MARTINS Hundinidae

Tree Swallow *Tachycineta bicolor* – Very common near any forested area in Alaska **Violet-green Swallow** *Tachycineta thalassina* – Seen all around the town of Seward **Bank Swallow** *Riparia riparia* – Seen up in the Nome area near gravel quarries with piles of sand **Cliff Swallow** *Petrochelidon pyrrhonota* – Common under most bridges in the Nome area

TITS AND CHICKADEES Paridae

Black-capped Chickadee *Poecile atricapillus* – Seen during our train ride south and during our time in Anchorage **Chestnut-backed Chickadee** *Poecile rufescens* – We saw one of the ten that Ava said frequented her feeders **Boreal Chickadee** *Poecile hudsonicus* – We had a very cooperative pair at the Road Maintenance Station at the end of the Council Road

DIPPERS Cinclidae

American Dipper *Cinclus mexicanus* – This was the first year of seeing an individual at the Penny River Bridge since the killer freeze from a few years back

KINGLETS Regulidae

Ruby-crowned Kinglet Regulus calendula – We heard one singing overhead at the fish weir on Bear Creek

Starling Sterna vulgaris – A small flock was feeding along the walkway at Westchester Lagoon

LEAF WARBLERS Phylloscopidae

Arctic Warbler Phylloscopus borealis - Seen in Denali on the east side of Stoney Pass

OLD WORLD FLYCATCHERS AND CHATS Muscicapidae

Bluethroat Luscinia svecica – Everyone got great looks at the Salmon River campground on Kougorok

THRUSHES Turdidae

Varied Thrush Ixoreus naevius — Seen foraging on the as we made a turn to go back to the Bald Eagle at Ava's Gray-cheeked Thrush Catharus minimus — Ubiquitous in Nome

Swainson's Thrush Catharus ustulatus - Seen and heard in riparian areas of Denali NP

Hermit Thrush *Catharus guttatus* – Heard singing a couple of times, once at Westchester, and once in Seward **American Robin** *Turdus migratorius* – Very common in the Nome area, and very bright colors on all...

PIPITS AND WAGTAILS Motacillidae

Eastern Yellow Wagtail *Motacilla tschutschensis* – Scattered about and never seeming to land for too long **American Pipit** *Anthus rubescens* – UP in the high pass meadows doing their pipit thing

FINCHES Fringillidae

Pine Grosbeak Pinicola enucleator – A male and female with one immature were nice enough to show at Ava's Common Redpoll Acanthis flammea – Yes, the more common of the two, but plenty colorful Hoary Redpoll Acanthis hornemanni – Always seen foraging on snow banks
Pine Siskin Spinus pinus – Best look was at a small group at Ava's feeders

LONGSPURS Calcariidae

Lapland Longspur *Calcarius Iapponicus* – Very common along the coast, less common inland **Snow Bunting** *Plectrophenax nivalis* – Only one, maybe two with both being flybys

NEW WORLD SPARROWS Passerellidae

American Tree Sparrow Spizelloides arborea — Very common and very striking looking
Fox Sparrow Passerella iliaca — Bright red and gray birds were actively singing over sparsely treed areas
Dark-eyed Junco Junco hyemalis — Seen outside of North Face Lodge gathering nesting material
White-crowned Sparrow Zonotrichia leucophrys — We would see them every day, but not in hut not in huge numbers

Golden-crowned Sparrow *Zonotrichia atricapilla* – Just so striking up here, we never quite get to see them looking this good down south

Savannah Sparrow *Passerculus sandwichensis* – Very common in grassy areas or short shrubby habitat **Song Sparrow** *Melospiza melodia* – There were at least two at Ava's feeders mixing it up with the Fox Sparrows

NEW WORLD BLACKBIRDS Icteridae

Red-winged Blackbird Agelaius phoeniceus – A female alongside of Potter Marsh was the only sighting

NEW WORLD WARBLERS Parulidae

Northern Waterthrush Parkesia noveboracensis – Skulkers back home, but belting it out on treetops up here Orange-crowned Warbler Oreothlypis celata – Common in short scrub areas along streams

Common Yellowthroat Geothlypis trichas – Heard singing during our time on the Potter Marsh boardwalk

Yellow Warbler Setophaga petechial – Not overly common, but usually seen in shrubby areas along streams

Blackpoll Warbler Setophaga striata – Heard singing at the Bear River Maintenance Station on Council Road

Yellow-rumped Warbler *Setophaga coronate* – First one was at the Bear River Maintenance Station at the end of Council Road

Wilson's Warbler Cardellina pusilla – The most common warbler out in the Seward Peninsula

OLD WORLD SPARROWS Passeridae

House Sparrow (I) Passer domesticus – A small was feeding at the Firetap parking lot

MAMMALS: 23 species

Red Fox Vulpes vulpes – A number were seen in Nome, and an all black in Denali

American Black Bear Ursus americanus – A sow and three cubs climbed a tree next to the train on our ride to ANC Brown (Grizzly) Bear Ursus arctos – We saw five on our very first day in Denali

Harbor Seal Phoca vitulina – All over the place on the ice at the base of Northwestern Glacier

Ringed Seal Pusa hispida – Only sighting was on the Council Road just past the Safety Sound Bridge

Steller's Sea Lion *Eumetopias jubatus* – Common but declining in numbers from past years out on the Chiswell Islands

Sea Otter Enhydra lutris – We was witnessed both mating and a female hauled out on a rock with its young

Moose Alces alces – Seen just about every day of the trip except in Denali **Caribou** Rangifer tarandus – We saw Grant's caribou on the Kougorok and

Mountain Goat Oreamnos americanus – Seen at Cataract Cove on our boat trip to Northwestern Glacier

Dall Sheep Ovis dallii – We had at least twenty on our ride into Denali

Muskox Ovibos moschatus – Seen all across the Seward Peninsula

Humpback Whale *Megaptera novaeangliae* – We were fortunate to see at least seven individuals on our Seward boat ride

Killer Whale (Orca) Orcinus orca – Three different pods swam past our boat in thirty minutes, wow...

Dall's Porpoise Phocoenoides dalli – Only one sighting and that was just after turning into Northwestern Fjord

Snowshoe Hare Lepus americanus – An abundant year for this species in Denali

Alaskan Hare Lepus othus – Only one was seen way out on the Kougorok Road

Hoary Marmot Marmota caligata – On the slopes above the Eilson Visitor Center

Arctic Ground Squirrel Spermophilus parryii – Nome and Denali areas had plenty of these bear burritos

American Red Squirrel *Tamiasciurus hudsonicus* – Seen at the rest area in Denali and crossing the highway to Seward

Beaver Castor Canadensis – Seen on our drive into North Face Lodge

Nearctic Brown Lemming Lemmus trimucronatus – The one we saw fell victim to a Northern Shrike

Collared Lemming Lemmus - We saw two, one a fox victim, and one a victim to a pair of Long-tailed Jaegers
