



# August 3 - 9, 2019 Arizona Monsoon Madness Birding & Nature in a Season of Wonder! Species List With Guide Pat Lueders & 6 participants: Linda, Abigail, Hilary, Marleigh, Mary & Sue

Summary: This group of great birders and nature enthusiasts enjoyed a delightful week exploring the Southeast Arizona desert during the monsoon season, marveling at the lush green appearance of the desert landscape. With the group working together, we found most of our target bird species and many mammals and reptiles seen only in this unique habitat, in addition enjoying comfortable lodges and delicious meals. Definitely this was a memorable week none of us would ever forget!

### BIRDS (123 species recorded, of which 2 were heard only):

### DUCKS, GEESE AND SWANS: Anatidae (2)

**Black-bellied Whistling-Duck** *Dendrocygna autumnalis*—What a thrill to find a pair with three chicks at our first stop at Amado Water Treatment Ponds **Mexican Duck** *Anas diazi*—Mallard subspecies; found at our first stop at Amado WTP

### NEW WORLD QUAIL: Odontophoridae (2)

Gambel's Quail Callipepla gambelii—An adult & two chicks seen our first evening at the Casa feeders Montezuma Quail Cyrtonyx montezumae—(HO) We worked hard to see this beautiful quail but only heard it at Bob Behrstock's yard & Ash Canyon B & B

### PARTRIDGES, PHEASANTS AND ALLIES: Phasianidae (10)

Wild Turkey Meleagris gallopavo—Adult with chicks seen around the Ash Canyon feeders; one individual at Ramsey Canyon

### PIGEONS AND DOVES: Columbidae (6)

Rock Pigeon (I) Columba livia—Seen often while driving near cities

<u>Eurasian Collared-Dove (I)</u> Streptopelia decaocto—Seen daily; best when perched at Rancho Santa Cruz <u>Inca Dove</u> Columbina inca—Seen near rooms at Rancho; also at Casa & at Ash Canyon feeders <u>Common Ground Dove</u> Columbina passerina—Seen on the ground at feeders & flying during visit to San Pedro House

<u>White-winged Dove</u> Zenaida asiatica—This large & vocal dove was seen daily at all locations <u>Mourning Dove</u> Zenaida macroura—Seen often on wires including Amado WTP & Casa de San Pedro

### CUCKOOS AND ALLIES: Cuculidae (2)

<u>Greater Roadrunner</u> *Geoccocyx californianus*—A target species, seen on our first stop at Amado; other sightings include near Casa & trip to Box Canyon

Yellow-billed Cuckoo Coccyzus americanus—We heard this species often; seen well by Linda

#### NIGHTJARS: Caprimulgidae (1)

<u>Lesser Nighthawk</u> Chordeiles acutipennis—We had good luck seeing this species feeding at dawn & during the evening at Casa de San Pedro

#### <u>SWIFTS: Apodidae (1)</u> <u>White-throated Swift</u> *Aeronautes saxatalis*—A few seen flying near Nogales & at Miller Canyon

#### HUMMINGBIRDS: Trochilidae (11)

<u>Rivoli's Hummingbird</u> Eugenes fulgens—Best looks at Santa Rita Lodge; also at Ash Canyon & Beatty's <u>Plain-capped Starthroat</u> Heliomaster constantia—Quick look by Sue & Abigail when we arrived at Paton's feeders in Patagonia

Blue-throated Hummingbird Lampornis clemenciae—(GO) Quick look at one hovering at Paton's Lucifer Hummingbird Calothorax lucifer—Lifer for many! Male & female seen often at Ash Canyon B & B Black-chinned Hummingbird Archilochus alexandri—Most frequently seen hummer at all locations Anna's Hummingbird Calypte anna—Seen often at most feeders; first at Santa Rita Lodge Costa's Hummingbird Calypte costae—Seen best at Bob Behrstock's feeders Broad-tailed Hummingbird Selasphorus platycercus—Seen at Ash Canyon, Bob's feeders, & Beatty's Rufous Hummingbird Selasphorus rufus—Seen best at Beatty's feeders, Miller Canyon Broad-billed Hummingbird Cynanthus latirostris—Frequent visitor to all feeders Violet-crowned Hummingbird Amazilia violiceps—This beauty was seen often at Paton's & Beatty's

### RAILS, COOTS, AND ALLIES: Rallidae (1)

Sora Porzana carolina—(HO) We heard this species vocalize while visiting Whitewater Draw WA

### SANDPIPERS AND ALLIES: Scolopacidae (1)

Spotted Sandpiper Actitis macularius—Seen on our first stop at Amado WTP

### NEW WORLD VULTURES: Cathartidae (2)

<u>Black Vulture</u> *Coragyps atratus*—Only seen once; was soaring at De Anza Trail-Tumacacori <u>Turkey Vulture</u> *Cathartes aura*—Seen daily in good numbers at all locations

### HAWKS, KITES AND EAGLES: Accipitridae (5)

<u>Cooper's Hawk</u> Accipiter cooperii—Seen often; fun finding one feeding on a lizard at De Anza Trail <u>Gray Hawk</u> Buteo plagiatus—Adult perched on a pole at Rancho Santa Cruz; heard calling at Casa <u>Swainson's Hawk</u> Buteo swainsoni—Most common hawk on trip; seen well on many occasions <u>Zone-tailed Hawk</u> Buteo albonotatus—Nesting pair with juvenile seen often at Rancho Santa Cruz <u>Red-tailed Hawk</u> Buteo jamaicensis—Many seen perched on poles on drive to Whitewater Draw

#### **BARN OWLS: Tytonidae (1)**

Barn Owl Tyto alba—At Casa de San Pedro; seen hunting at dawn around the pool area

OWLS: Strigidae (1)

<u>Great Horned Owl</u> Bubo virginianus—Heard calling and found in a tree at Rancho; 3 seen at Casa in the trees around the pool and parking area

#### TROGONS: Trogonidae (1)

Elegant Trogon Elegans—Two juveniles, a male & female, found in Huachuca Canyon; adult

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### heard close by but not seen

### WOODPECKERS: Picidae (5)

<u>Acorn Woodpecker</u> *Melanerpes formicivorus*—First seen at Santa Rita Lodge; seen & heard many often <u>Gila Woodpecker</u> *Melanerpes uropygialis*—Seen daily at most locations

<u>Ladder-backed Woodpecker</u> *Dryobates scalaris* —Close looks feeding on peanut butter at Paton's <u>Arizona Woodpecker</u> *Dryobates arizonae*—Luckily, seen at Santa Rita Lodge, only sighting for the trip <u>Northern Flicker</u> *Colaptes auratus*—Pair heard & seen on sycamores at San Pedro House

### FALCONS AND CARACARAS: Falconidae (1)

American Kestrel Falco sparverius—Pair seen at Rancho Santa Cruz; others on wires along the roads

### **BECARDS AND TITYRAS: Tityridae (1)**

<u>Rose-throated Becard</u> *Pachyramphus aglaiae*—Exciting sighting of this rare US species! Worked with other birders to find the nest & calling male on the De Anza Trail-Tumacacori

### TYRANT FLYCATCHERS: Tyrannidae (13)

<u>Western Wood-Pewee</u> *Contopus sordidulus*—First seen in Box Canyon; 3 seen in Huachuca Canyon <u>Willow Flycatcher</u> *Empidonax traillii*—Heard vocalizing, then spotted perched, in Huachuca Canyon <u>Dusky Flycatcher</u> *Empidonax oberholseri*—Seen & identified in Ramsey Canyon

**<u>Black Phoebe</u>** Sayornis nigricans—Seen almost daily in most locations

<u>Say's Phoebe</u> Sayornis saya—Near Huachuca playground, we found 3 flycatching in the grass <u>Vermilion Flycatcher</u> Pyrocephalus rubinus—Fun species! Many males & females in the field at Rancho <u>Dusky-capped Flycatcher</u> Myiarchus tuberculifer—We found this bird along the San Pedro River bed near Casa

<u>Ash-throated Flycatcher</u> *Myiarchus cinerascens*—Three birds were seen in the field above Box Canyon <u>Brown-crested Flycatcher</u> *Myiarchus tyrannulus*—Seen & vocalizing in trees at Rancho's parking area <u>Sulphur-bellied Flycatcher</u> *Myiodynastes luteiventris*—We were lucky to get great looks at this species at two locations-Huachuca Canyon & Ramsey Canyon

<u>Cassin's Kingbird</u> *Tyrannus vociferans*—Seen at many locations; often enough to easily identify from Western

<u>Thick-billed Kingbird</u> *Tyrannus crassirostris*—Scope views of the white throat & broad bill at the Huachuca playground

Western Kingbird Tyrannus verticalis—Seen daily at most locations & along the roads

### VIREOS: Vireonidae (3)

<u>Bell's Vireo</u> Vireo bellii—Heard at Rancho Santa Cruz; seen well on Proctor Rd trail at Madera <u>Plumbeous Vireo</u> Vireo plumbeus—Good looks at an individual in Huachuca Canyon <u>Warbling Vireo</u> Vireo gilvus—(HO) A few were vocalizing around the Rancho parking area

# <u>SHRIKES: Laniidae (1)</u>

Loggerhead Shrike Lanius Iudovicianus—Scope looks at one hunting in the field at Casa de San Pedro

### CROWS AND JAYS: Corvidae (3)

<u>Mexican Jay</u> Aphelocoma wollweberi—Seen first in Madera Canyon; many seen at Ash Canyon B & B <u>Chihuahuan Raven</u> Corvus cryptoleucus—Seen on trip to Whitewater Draw; one perched with white neck feathers visible in the wind Common Raven Corvus corga—Seen daily at all locations & while driving

Common Raven Corvus corax—Seen daily at all locations & while driving

### TITS AND CHICKADEES: Paridae (1)

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Bridled Titmouse Baeolophus wollweberi—Fun little bird, first seen at Madera Kubo B & B feeders

### PENDULINE TITS: Remizidae (1)

Verdin \_Auriparus flaviceps—Seen often; close looks along Proctor Road trail at Madera Canyon

### SWALLOWS AND MARTINS: Hirundinidae (5)

Northern Rough-winged Swallow Stelgidopteryx serripennis—Many seen feeding over the water on visit to Amado WTP <u>Violet-green Swallow</u> Tachycineta thalassina—Flying over the wetland at Whitewater Draw WA <u>Bank Swallow</u> Riparia riparia—A few seen feeding over the marsh at Whitewater Draw <u>Barn Swallow</u> Hirundo rustica—Seen feeding over the fields at many locations Cliff Swallow Petrochelidon pyrrhonota—Seen with other swallows at Whitewater Draw WA

LONG-TAILED TITS: Aegithalidae (1) Bushtit Psaltriparus minimus—Nice size flock flew into the feeders at Ash Canyon B & B

NUTHATCHES: Sittidae (1) White-breasted Nuthatch Sitta carolinensis—Seen well daily at all locations with feeders

### **GNATCATCHERS:** Polioptilidae (3)

<u>Blue-gray Gnatcatcher</u> *Polioptila caerulea*—Two individuals first heard, then seen, on walk on on Proctor Trail at Madera Canyon <u>Black-tailed Gnatcatcher</u> *Polioptila melanura*—Two seen during walk at De Anza Trail <u>Black-capped Gnatcatcher</u> *Polioptila nigriceps*—First we heard, then watched an individual

feeding low in a bush above Box Canyon

### WRENS: Troglodytidae (3)

<u>Canyon Wren</u> Catherpes mexicanus—Heard often in Box Canyon; long distance view of one on a rock across the valley; heard often at other locations <u>Bewick's Wren</u> Thryomanes bewickii—We saw this species daily at many locations <u>Cactus Wren</u> Campylorhynchus brunneicapillus—Often heard, good looks at two individuals at Casa and scope views of one in the valley at Box Canyon

### STARLINGS AND MYNAS: Sturnidae (1)

European Starling (I) Sturnus vulgaris—Seen at various locations while driving

### MOCKINGBIRDS AND THRASHERS: Mimidae (2)

<u>Curve-billed Thrasher</u> *Toxostoma curvirostre*—Best looks around the feeders at Casa de San Pedro <u>Northern Mockingbird</u> *Mimus polyglottos*—Nice looks in the parking area at Rancho Santa Cruz

### THRUSHES: Turdidae (2)

<u>Eastern Bluebird</u> Sialia sialis—Male & female seen at the Fort Huachuca playground <u>American Robin</u> Turdus migratorius—Two flocks flew over us at Ramsey Canyon

### SILKY-FLYCATCHERS: Ptilogobnatidae (1)

<u>Phainopepla</u> *Phainopepla nitens*—Fun to see so many of this species around the parking area of Rancho Santa Cruz & to study the variety of colors of adults & juveniles

### OLD WORLD SPARROWS: Passeridae (1)

House Sparrow (I) Passer domesticus—Seen daily at many locations

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### FINCHES: Fringillidae (3)

<u>House Finch</u> Haemorhous mexicanus—Seen daily at many locations <u>Pine Siskin</u> Spinus pinus—Seen visiting the feeders with Lesser Goldfinch at Santa Rita Lodge feeders Lesser Goldfinch Spinus psaltria—Seen daily at all locations with feeders

# NEW WORLD SPARROWS: Passerellidae (12)

Rufous-winged Sparrow Peucaea carpalis—Heard & quick looks on De Anza Trail Botteri's Sparrow Peucaea botterii—Seen perched & singing on walk at Casa de San Pedro road Cassin's Sparrow Peucaea cassinii—Seen at Rancho & Casa on morning walks Five-striped Sparrow Amphispiza quinquestriata—Target bird & lifer for many! Perched close to us while vocalizing on ocotillo on visit to Box Canyon; at least two, possibly four, individuals Lark Sparrow Chondestes grammacus—Seen on levee while visiting Whitewater Draw WA Lark Bunting Calamospiza melanocorys—Seen twice, at Rancho & flying at Whitewater Draw MA Yellow-eyed Junco Junco phaeonotus—What a surprise for Sue to see this bird at her feet on the patio at Kubo B&B; then seen on their feeder by all Song Sparrow Melospiza melodia—Seen & heard frequently, best on De Anza Trail Canyon Towhee Melozone fusca—First seen well in parking area at Rancho; seen often elsewhere Abert's Towhee Melozone aberti—Found around water; family of 3 seen at Casa Rufous-crowned Sparrow Aimophila ruficeps—Heard & seen by a few at San Pedro House; again at Ramsey Canyon

Spotted Towhee Pipilo maculatus—Many males, females & juveniles along the trail at Miller Canyon

## YELLOW-BREASTED CHAT: Icyeriidae (1)

Yellow-breasted Chat Icteria virens—Always heard daily, finally great looks on the wire at Rancho

# NEW WORLD BLACKBIRDS: Icteriidae (6)

<u>Eastern Meadowlark</u> Sturnella magna—Sadly, now a species of concern, we worked hard for one along the road to Casa

<u>Hooded Oriole</u> Icterus cucullatus—Seen by a few flying in the valley at Box Canyon <u>Scott's Oriole</u> Icterus parisorum—One female came to the oranges in Bob's yard <u>Red-winged Blackbird</u> Agelaius phoeniceus—Males & females in flocks during visit to Whitewater Draw <u>Brown-headed Cowbird</u> Molothrus ater—Seen often, first time around the feeder at Rancho <u>Great-tailed Grackle</u> Quiscalus mexicanus—Seen on our first stop at Amado WTP

# NEW WORLD WARBLERS: Parulidae (4)

Lucy's Warbler Leiothlypis luciae—Seen feeding at close range on hill above Box Canyon Common Yellowthroat Geothlypis trichas—Nice looks on morning walks at Casa de San Pedro Yellow Warbler Setophaga petechia—Seen often at all locations Painted Redstart Myioborus pictus—Three seen on walk at the Madera Amphitheatre trail; heard & seen again in Huachuca Canyon

# CARDINAL-GROSBEAKS: Cardinalidae (10)

<u>Hepatic Tanager</u> *Piranga flava*—Male & female found in tree above the Ramsey Canyon Visitor Center

Summer Tanager Piranga rubra—Heard & seen often at most locations; good looks at Casa Western Tanager Piranga ludoviciana—Male at Rancho; pairs on Proctor Trail & Miller Canyon Northern Cardinal Cardinalis cardinalis—This more colorful Western species seen often at feeders Pyrrhuloxia Cardinalis sinuatus—First spotted at Rancho; also seen by a few at Casa's feeders Black-headed Grosbeak Pheucticus melanocephalus—Another species always spotted around feeders Blue Grosbeak Passerina caerulea—Fun seeing this species often at many locations <u>Lazuli Bunting</u> Passerina amoena—Exciting seeing over 100 of this colorful species at Whitewater Draw <u>Varied Bunting</u> Passerina versicolor—Sadly, only a quick look at a beautiful male on the walk at Proctor Rd.

<u>Painted Bunting</u> Passerina ciris—What great luck to spot this rare bunting on the sand bar with other species on our walk at De Anza Trail-Tumacacori

#### Mammals (9 species)

Pronghorn Antilocapra americana—Spotted from the van on our drive to Sierra Vista
White-tailed Deer Odocoileus virginianus—Seen often in good numbers at many locations
Collared Peccary Pecari tajacu—Wow! Good spotting of five crossing the road in Tubac
White-nosed Coati Nasua narica—We watched this mammal spend a lengthy time under Santa Rita
Lodge's feeders
Desert Cottontail Sylvilagus audubonii—A couple were spotted around Casa
Black-tailed Jackrabbit Lepus californicus—Lucky sighting of one when we stopped along the road to
Casa de San Pedro
Rock Squirrel Otospermophilus variegatus—Seen around the feeders at Santa Rita Lodge
Arizona Gray Squirrel Sciurus arizonensis—Seen on walks at Madera Canyon
Round-tailed Ground Squirrel\_Spermophilus tereticaudus—Best seen stuck in traffic in Sierra Vista
on drive to Huachuca Canton

#### **Reptiles (5 species)**

Clark's Spiny Lizard Sceloporus clarkii—Seen on our walk at De Anza Trail Woodhouse's Toad Anaxyrus woodhousii—Many on concrete walks at Rancho Santa Cruz Striped Plateau Lizard Sceloporus virgatus—Most often seen lizard at most locations Sonora Desert Toad Bufo alvarius—We saw this largest toad in the US on the road in Tubac Ring-necked Snake Diadophis punctatus—Quick look; spotted by Mary on the levee at Casa
