BIRDS – 117 Species in 41 Families

DUCKS, GEESE, SWANS: Anatidae: (8)

Blue-winged Teal (Anas discors) – A small group was out near the terminus of Estero San Jose Cinnamon Teal (Anas cyanoptera) – The "common" duck in the Estero by far, more than last trip Northern Shoveler (Anas clypeata) – Five scattered hens in the Estero, no males to be seen Gadwall (Mareca Strepera) – We had three on the Estero San Jose mid-stream American Wigeon (Mareca Americana) – A few flocks were at the outlet of the Estero San Jose Green-winged Teal (Anas crecca) – We had about eleven up towards the bridge Lesser Scaup (Athhya affinis) – A group of five at Puerto Escondido was a surprise for all of us Ruddy Duck (Oxyura jamaicensis) – A few in deeper water up near the mouth of the Estero

NEW WORLD QUAIL: Odontophoridae (1)

California Quail Callipepla californica – Heard on our morning walk in Agua Verde

GREBES: Podicipedidae (3)

Pied-billed Grebe (*Podylimbus podiceps*) – We had six scattered throughout the Estero on our walk **Eared Grebe** (*Podiceps nigricolis*) – First seen in Agua Verde, and not as common as in past years **Western Grebe** (*Aechemorphus occidentalis*) – A group a seven at Magdelena Bay were the only ones

PIGEONS AND DOVES: Columbidae (5)

Rock Pigeon (Columbu livia) – All around San Jose del Cabo Eurasian Collared Dove (Streptopella decaocto) – A few around the central part of San Jose del Cabo Common Ground-Dove (Columbina passerina) – Somewhat common, certainly around stables White-winged Dove (Enaida asiatica) – Everywhere around habitation in San Jose del Cabo Mourning Dove (Enaida macroura) – As in the States, they were more visible in the rural settings

CUCKOOS: Cuculidae (1)

Greater Roadrunner (*Geococcyx californianus*) – Seen on a hillside at Puerto Escondido when heading to the grays

SWIFTS: Apodidae (1)

White-throated Swift (Auronautis saxatalis) - Seen in the Puerto Escondido area

HUMMINGBIRDS: Trochilidae (2)

Costa's Hummingbird (*Calypte costae*) – Two seen with the best looks in Agua Verde (E) Xantus Hummingbird (*Hylocharis xantusii*) – Seen feeding on agave flowers in Agua Verde

SWAMPHEN, COOTS: Rallidae (2)

Common Gallinule (*Gallinula chloropus*) – Fairly common all along the edge of the Estero **American Coot** (*Fulica americana*) – Not as common as the gallinule, but definitely present

<u>STILTS, AVOCETS: Recurvirostridae (1)</u> Black-necked Stilt (*Himantopus mexicanus*) – Two at the upper end of the Estero

OYSTERCATCHERS: Haematopodidae (1)

American Oystercatcher (Haematopus palliates) – Very uncommon this year, only two sightings

PLOVERS AND LAPWINGS: Charadriidae (3)

Black-bellied Plover (*Pluvialis squatarola*) – Seen at Rio estuary on the Loreto coast **Semi-palmated Plover** (*Charadrius semipalmatus*) – Seen a few times with best looks on the Estero **Killdeer** (*Charadrius vociferous*) – First two were seen on the beach between the ocean and the Estero

SANDPIPERS AND ALLIES: Scolopacidae (11)

Whimbrel (Numenius pharopus) – Seen twice with great views on Magdelena Bay
Long-billed Curlew (Numenius americanus) – One presented itself nicely along the Mag Bay wharf
Marbled Godwit (Limosa fidoa) – Seen best in the small coastal estuary on the Loreto Coast
Least Sandpiper (Calidris minutilla) – The common peep foraging in the Estero
Western Sandpiper Western sandpiper) – Only a half dozen at Estero San Jose on our first day
Short-billed Dowitcher (Limnodromus griseus) – We had a few calling among the LB Dowitchers
Long-billed Dowitcher (Limnodromus scolopaceus) – Part of a mixed flock along the Estero
Spotted Sandpiper (Actitis macularia) – Quite a few at various locations along the Estero water's edge
Greater Yellowlegs (Tringa melanoleuca) – Seen foraging with Willets on Estero San Jose
Weillet (Tringa semipalmata) – A couple were foraging with some yellowlegs at Estero San Jose

AUKS & ALLIES: Alcidae (1)

Craveri's Murrelet: (Synthilboramphus craveri) – Three were seen on our move north to Loreto area

GULLS AND TERNS: Laridae (11)

Black-legged Kittiwake (Risa tridactyla) -

Laughing Gull (Leucophaeus atricilla) – Only one seen was at the rivermouth in Loreto Heermann's Gull (Larus heermanni) – Common further north up in the Loreto area & Magdelena Bay Ring-billed Gull (Larus delawarensis) – One seen in Magdelena Bay flying by our panga Yellow-footed Gull (Larus livens) – Once we were north of La Paz, they were seen every day California Gull (Larus californicus) – Lots over in Magdelena Bay on our gray whale day Herring Gull (Larus argentatus) – Seen on two different days with best views in Loreto Caspian Tern (Hydroprogne caspia) – Seen twice, Loreto and Magdelena Bay Forster's Tern (Sterna forsteri) – A small flock on the Loreto coastal mudflats Royal Tern (Sterna maxima) – First one seen was flying along the Espiritu Santo coast Elegant Tern (Sterna) – Small numbers on the mudflats of the Loreto coast

NORTHERN STORM-PETRELS: Hydrobatidae (1)

Black Storm-Petrel (Oceanodroma melania) – A group of about 100 were sitting on the water, windless

FRIGATBIRDS: Fregatidae (1)

Magnificent Frigatebird (Fregata magnificens) – We both sexes fishing over the Estero San Jose

GANNETS, BOOBIES: Sulidae (2)

Blue-footed Booby (*Sula nebouxii*) – By far the ore common of the two boobies, lots around Loreto **Brown Booby** (*Sula leucogaster*) – More common down around Los Islotes than further north

CORMORANTS: Phalacrocoracidae (2)

Brandt's Cormorant (*Phalacrocorax penicillatus*) – Seen first on the south end of Isla Espiritu Santo **Double-crested Cormorant** (*Phalacrocorax auritus*) – A few were seen almost every day on the trip

PELICANS: Pelecanidae (2)

American White Pelican (*Pelecanus erythrorhynchos*) – A small group were in the Estero San Jose Brown Pelican (*Pelecanus occidentalis*) -Scattered along the coastline, lots of juveniles in the Estero

HERONS AND EGRETS: Ardeidae (10)

Great Blue Heron (Ardea herodias) – The biggest numbers were on Estero San Jose Great Egret (Ardea alba) – Scattered along the coast with the biggest number on the Estero Snowy Egret (Egretta thula) – Not very common anywhere, our first was on the Estero Little Blue Heron (Egretta caerulea) – Only one seen was in the Puerto Escondido harbor Tricolored Heron (Egretta tricolor) – We had one foraging in amongst teal on the Estero Reddish Egret (Egretta rufescens) – We had at least three in Estero San Jose Cattle Egret (Bubulcus ibis) – We had thirty along the Estero, very were unusual Green Heron (Butorides virescens) – Seen on the shore of Magdelena Bay on our Gray Whale day Black-crowned Night-Heron (Nycticorax nycticorax) – Around the ship while in the Bay of La Paz Yellow-crowned Night-Heron (Nycticorax vilocea) – Sen well on skiff excursion around Puerto Escondido

IBISES & SPOONBILLS: Threskiornithidae (2)

White Ibis (Eudcimus albus) – Seen well along the edge of Magdelena Bay White-faced Ibis (Plegadus chihi) - At least a half dozen on the Estero early Friday morning

NEW WORLD VULTURES: Cathartidae (1)

Turkey Vulture (Cathartes aura) – Everywhere and on everyday we were here

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Hawks, Kites and Eagles: Accipitridae (3)

Harris' Hawk (Parabuteo unicinctus) – Seen on our drive to La Paz perched on cardons Zone-tailed Hawk (Buteo albonotatus) – Seen soaring over the Estero San Jose Red-tailed Hawk (Buteo jamaicensis) – One was soaring in the area of the first Xantus's

KINGFISHERS: Alcedinidae (1)

Belted Kingfisher (Megaceryle alcyon) - Seen on a few days, usually along quiet bays

WOODPECKERS: PICIDAE (2)

Gila Woodpecker (*Melanerpes uropygialis*) – Definitely the common woodpecker in San Jose del Cabo **Gilded Flicker** (*Colaptes chrysoides*) – We had one along the Estero San Jose

FALCONS: Falconidae (3)

Crested Caracara (Caracara plancus) – At least three birds around our breakfast stop American Kestrel (Falco sparverius) – Seen sporadically, but regular through the voyage Peregrine Falcon (Falco peregrinus) – We had a sub-adult feeding on a CA Gull on Magdelena Bay Merlin (Falco merlini) – Seen blasting by at eye level on the Isla San Francisco ridge hike

TYRANT FLYCATCHERS: Tyrannidae (5)

Black Phoebe (Phoebe nigricans) – Seen only along the Estero San Jose
Say's Phoebe (Phoebe saya) – Seen along the wharf at Puerto Escondido
Vermillion Flycatcher (Pyrocephalus rubinus) – A pair seen on our morning bird walk in Agua Verde
Ash-throated Flycatcher (Myiarchus cinerascens) – Seen on a skiff ride along the edge of Puerto Escondido
Cassin's Kingbird (Tyrannus vociferans) – Seen by a few on our morning bird walk in Agua Verde

SHRIKES: Laniidae (1)

Loggerhead Shrike (Lanius ludovicianus) - Seen well perched while on Espiritu Santo

CROWS & JAYS: Corvidae(2)

California Scrub Jay (*Aphelocoma californica*) – Seen in some of the driest habitat on Espiritu Santo **Common Raven** (*Corvus corax*) – Scattered throughout the trip

PENDULINE TITS: Remizidae (1)

Verdin (Auriparus flaviceps) - Seen a number of times on our Agua Verde Day

WRENS: Troglodytidae (2)

Marsh Wren (*Cistothorus palustris*) – Seen/heard around the tules along the Estero in San Jose Cactus Wren (*Campylorrhynchus brunneicapillus*) – Seen more around habitation than in the wilds

GNATCATCHERS:Polioptilidae(1)

Blue-gray Gnatcatcher (Polioptila caerulea) – First seen in Agua Verde and then in Loreto

MOCKINGBIRDS & THRASHERS:Mimidae(2)

(E) Gray Thrasher (*Toxostoma cinereum*) – Seen in Agua Verde a couple of times, both times long looks Northern Mockingbird (*Mimus polyglottus*) – A fairly common bird in San Jose del Cabo and in the wild

STARLINGS: Sturnidae (1)

European Starling (I) Sutrnus vulgaris - Seen only around cities, not in villages or the wilds

SILKY FLYCATCHERS: Ptilogonatidae (1)

Phainopepla (Phainopepla nitens) – Both genders were very common in and around Agua Verde

FINCHES: Fringillidae (1)

House Finch (Haemorhous mexicanus) - Common in San Jose del Cabo, uncommon elsewhere

NEW WORLD SPARROWS: Emberizidae (3)

Black-throated Sparrow (Amphispiza bilineata) – Seen on Isla Espiritu Santo and Isla San Francisco Lark Sparrow (Chodestes grammacus) – We had good looks in the city of Loreto Savannah Sparrow (Passerculus sandwichensis) – Seen along the beach at Estero San Jose

NEW WORLD BLACKBIRDS: Icteridae (4)

Western Meadowlark (Sturnella neglecta) – A few were seen along the road in the farming areas Hooded Oriole (Icterus cuculatus) – A few migrants had just arrived here in San Jose del Cabo Brown-headed Cowbird (Molothrus ater) – In with the horses at the stables, of course Brewer's Blackbird Euphagus cyanocephalus – A small flock was feeding at Estero San Jose

NEW WORLD WARBLERS: Parulidae (5)

(E) Belding's Yellowthroat (*Geothlypis beldingi*) – Only seen by one of our group at Estero San Jose Common Yellowthroat (*Geothlypis trichas*) - Seen by most of our group along the Estero San Jose Yellow Warbler (*Setophaga petechia*) – Agua Verde was the only place we got to this species Yellow-rumped Warbler (*Setophaga coronoda*) – Seen on three different occasions, none on islands Wilson's Warbler (*Cardellina pusilla*) – Seen well at Estero San Jose foraging in the tules

CARDINALS, GROSBEAKS & ALLIES: Cardinalidae (2)

Northern Cardinal (Cardinalis cardinalis) – Agua Verde gave us our best looks at a singing male Pyrrhuloxia (Cardinalis sinuatus) – Walking through Loreto produced a few of these in vacant lots

OLD WORLD SPARROWS: Passeridae (1) House Sparrow (I) Passer domesticus – Ubiquitous

MAMMALS (9)

Espiritu Santo Ground Squirrel (*Ammnospermophilus ...*) – Seen only on Espiritu Santo where it is an endemic

Black-tailed Jackrabbit (*Lepus Californicus*) – A pair were playing hide-n-seek in Agua Verde **California Sea Lion** (*Zalophus californianus*) – Of course the best looks were on Islas La Isolotes

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Dwarf Sperm Whale (*Kogia sima or breviceps*) – Two seen lolling on the surface off of Isla San Jose was a great find

Gray Whale (Eschrichtius robustus) – We had a great day at Magdelena Bay, lots of grays

Humpback Whale (*Megoptera novaeangiliae*) – A cow/calf pair at Puerto Escondido were welcomed at breakfast

Minke Whale (Balaenoptera acutorostrata) – A cow/calf pair off of Isla San Jose was a great find
