NOTE: QNWR = Quivira National Wildlife Refuge & CB = Cheyenne Bottoms State Game Refuge.

BIRDS (92 species recorded, of which 1 was heard only):

<u>DUCKS, GEESE, AND SWANS: Anatidae (8)</u>—Due to warm temperatures and strong prevailing south winds, very few migrating birds, especially waterfowl, had reached this far south by the time of our tour. **Canada Goose Branta** *Canadensis*—Small flocks seen at QNWR & CB, urban populations on golf courses.

Wood Duck Aix sponsa—Small numbers found in wooded pond near QNWR.

Blue-winged Teal Spatula discors—A few early migrants found at Quivira and Cheyenne Bottoms.

Northern Shoveler Spatula clypeata—Limited numbers on QNWR & CB

Gadwall Mareca strepera—Several pairs found at QNWR & CB

Mallard Anas platyrhynchos — Limited numbers on QNWR & CB, individuals and pairs on ponds.

Northern Pintail Anas acuta—A few mixed in at QNWR & CB.

Green-winged Teal Anas crecca—Several with Blue-winged teal at CB.

NEW WORLD QUAIL: Odontophoridae (1)

Northern Bobwhite Colinus virginianus—Covey call heard from Coronado Heights near Lindsborg.

PARTRIDGES, PHEASANTS, AND ALLIE: Phasianidae (2)

Ring-necked Pheasant (I) Phasianus colchicus—Flock of roosters flushed & crossed the road-QNWR. **Wild Turkey** Meleagris gallopavo—Flock feeding near Mt. Mitchell Prairie.

GREBES: Podicipedidae (1)

Pied-billed Grebe Podilymbus podiceps—ubiquitous grebe at QNWR & CB

PIGEONS AND DOVES: Columbidae (3)

Rock Pigeon (I)Columba livia—seen in all urban areas and most small towns with elevators. **Eurasian Collared-Dove (I)**Streptopelia decaocto—Increasingly common, seen most days.

Mourning Dove Zenaida macroura—Abundant and observed every day.

NIGHTJARS: Caprimulgidae (1)

Common Nighthawk Chordeiles minor—Seen flying (migrating flocks) and roosting

SWIFTS: Apodidae (1)

Chimney Swift Chaetura pelagica—Large flock migrating flock mixed with Purple Martins flew over Wichita parking lot at welcome dinner. Smaller numbers seen in Lindsborg.

RAILS, COOTS, AND ALLIES: Rallidae (1)

American Coot Fulica americana—Robust numbers at QNWR & CB

STILTS AND AVOCETS: Recurvirostridae (2)

Black-necked Stilt Himantopus mexicanus—Feeding at QNWR & CB
American Avocet Recurvirostra americana—Fair numbers at QNWR & CB

PLOVERS AND LAPWINGS: Charadriidae (1)

Killdeer Charadrius vociferus—Seen most days during the trip.

SANDPIPERS AND ALLIES: Scolopacidae (7)

Baird's Sandpiper Calidris bairdii—Small flocks at QNWR & CB—water was still too deep at both.

Least Sandpiper Calidris minutilla—Several individuals seen mixed in with Baird's at CB.

Semipalmated Sandpiper *Calidris pusilla*—Small numbers at CB.

Limnodromus scolopaceus—Feeding at both QNWR & CB.

Wilson's Snipe Gallinago delicata—Bonus bird at QNWR!

Greater Yellowlegs Tringa melanoleuca—Compared to "normal," small numbers at QNWR & CB.

Willet Tringa semipalmata—CB produce our only Willet.

GULLS AND TERNS: Laridae (4)

Franklin's Gull Leucophaeus pipixcan—Fair numbers at QNWR.

Ring-billed GullLarus delawarensis—Commonly seen in and around most larger bodies of water.

Black Tern Chlidonias niger—CB still had a few on the wing.

Forster's Tern Sterna forsteri—Nice views at CB.

CORMORANTS: Phalacrocoracidae (1)

Double-crested Cormorant Phalacrocorax auritus—Both QNWR and CB provided views of feeding DCC

PELICANS: Pelecanidae (1)

American White Pelican Pelecanus erythrorhynchos—Nice flocks feeding at QNWR & CB.

HERONS AND EGRETS: Ardeidae (7)

American Bittern Botaurus lentiqinosus—Real treat to see them flying at both QNWR & CB.

Great Blue Heron Ardea herodias—A few seen almost every day.

Great Egret Ardea alba—Several individuals in small lakes, and lots of feeding birds at QNWR & CB

Snowy Egret Egretta thula—A few in ponds and many at QNWR & CB.

Cattle Egret Bubulcus ibis—Tending to cattle at QNWR & on The Nature Conservancy CB properties.

Black-crowned Night-Heron Nycticorax nycticorax—Seen and photographed at CB.

Yellow-crowned Night-Heron *Nyctanassa violacea*—Spotted at CB.

IBIS AND SPOONBILLS: Threskiornithidae (1)

White-faced Ibis Plegadis chihi—Good sized flocks at both QNWR & CB.

NEW WORLD VULTURES: Cathartidae (1)

Turkey Vulture Cathartes aura—Seen every day with a large roost at Council Grove.

OSPREY: Pandionidae (1)

OspreyPandion haliaetus—Three different individuals on three different days.

HAWKS, KITES, AND EAGLES: Accipitridae (6)

Mississippi Kite Ictinia mississippiensis—Several birds at the Dyck Arboretum in Hesston.

Northern Harrier Circus hudsonius—Curiously low numbers this year with only a few birds seen.

Cooper's Hawk Accipiter cooperii—Individual seen at Dyck Arboretum.

Bald Eagle Haliaeetus leucocephalus—An immature at QNWR

Swainson's Hawk Buteo swainsoni—Single bird near CB.

Red-tailed HawkButeo jamaicensis—Common everyday with a Harlan's phase at Cottonwood Falls

BARN OWLS: Tytonidae (2)

Barn Owl Tyto alba—No sightings this year. Two nesting sites severely wind damaged this summer.

Great Horned Owl Bubo virginianus—Owl prowl near CB provided exciting views.

KINGFISHERS: Alcedinidae (1)

Belted Kingfisher *Megaceryle alcyon*—Seen on five different days.

WOODPECKERS: Picidae (3)

Red-headed Woodpecker *Melanerpes erythrocephalus*—Seen at Kanopolis Reservoir & Konza. **Red-bellied Woodpecker** *Melanerpes carolinus*—Fairly common around any wooded area.

Downy Woodpecker *Dryobates pubescens*—Seen at Maxwell Refuge.

FALCONS AND CARACARAS: Falconidae (2)

American Kestrel Falco sparverius—Fairly common on power lines along many country roads.

Merlin Falco columbarius—Single individual gave us a view as it "blitzed" past.

TYRANT FLYCATCHERS: Tyrannidae (3)

Eastern Phoebe
Sayornis phoebe—Spotted near the historical mill in Lindsborg & Maxwell Refuge.

Tyrannus tyrannus—A few individuals commanding fence post views of prairie.

Scissor-tailed Flycatcher
Tyrannus forficatus—A treat with several flocks being enjoyed several times.

CROWS AND JAYS: Corvidae (2)

Blue Jay Cyanocitta cristata—Seen almost every day of the trip. Some migrating.

American Crow *Corvus brachyrhynchos*—Seen from city to country in substantial numbers.

LARKS: Alaudidae (1)

Horned Lark *Eremophila alpestris*—Spotted as they flew up from the roadside and disappeared.

SWALLOWS AND MARTINS: Hirundinidae (6)

Purple Martin Progne subis – New Species for this trip. Large migrating flock over parking lot in

Wichita (a known gathering spot for Purple Martins in migration).

Northern Rough-winged Swallow Stelgidopteryx serripennis

Tree Swallow *Tachycineta bicolor*—In mixed flocks on the refuges.

Bank Swallow *Riparia riparia*—A few individuals seen near Chase Co. State Fishing Lake.

Barn Swallow Hirundo rustica—Seen most days with large numbers at QNWR and CB.

Cliff Swallow Petrochelidon pyrrhonota—Mixed in with Barn Swallows at QNWR & CB.

TITS AND CHICKADEES: Paridae (2)

Black-capped Chickadee Poecile atricapillus—Areas with trees enjoyed the company of chickadees **Tufted Titmouse** Baeolophus bicolor—Riparian woodlands at Konza & Allegawaho Heritage Park.

NUTHATCHES: Sittidae (1)

White-breasted Nuthatch Sitta carolinensis—Feeding in the riparian woodland at Konza

WRENS: Troglodytidae (2)

House Wren Troglodytes aedon—Spotted near our motel in Wichita on the first day! **Carolina Wren** Thryothorus Iudovicianus—Near the historic mill in Lindsborg.

THRUSHES: Turdidae (2)

Eastern Bluebird Sialia sialis—Small family groups at Tallgrass Prairie Preserve & Konza nature trail.

American Robin Turdus migratorius—Seen most days. Single or in loose flocks.

MOCKINGBIRDS AND THRASHERS: Mimidae (2)

Gray Catbird Dumetella carolinensis—Found a pair on the Konza Nature trail.

Brown Thrasher Toxostoma rufum—Feeding in the vegetation at Dyck Arboretum

STARLINGS AND MYNAS: Sturnidae (1)

European Starling (I) Sturnus vulgaris—An everyday occurrence in all habitats.

FINCHES AND EUPHONIAS: Fringillidae (2)

House Finch Haemorhous mexicanus—Urban setting in Wichita and Manhattan.

American Goldfinch Spinus tristis—Seen sporadically, best along the Konza nature trail.

NEW WORLD BLACKBIRDS: Icteridae (7)

Yellow-headed Blackbird Xanthocephalus xanthocephalus—CB treated us to several birds.

Western Meadowlark Sturnella neglecta—Sighted and singing at QNWR.

Eastern Meadowlark Sturnella magna—Surprisingly low numbers, but still flashy when they fly.

Red-winged BlackbirdAgelaius phoeniceus—Most bodies of water with cattails harbored flocks.

Brown-headed Cowbird *Molothrus ater*—Common at CB, QNWR, Maxwell (with Bison).

Common Grackle Quiscalus quiscula—QNWR & CB.

Great-tailed Grackle *Quiscalus mexicanus*—Parking lot patrol birds in Wichita

NEW WORLD WARBLERS: Parulidae (1)

Yellow Warbler Setophaga petechia—One each near mill in Lindsborg & at Maxwell.

CARDINALS, GROSBEAKS, AND ALLIES: Cardinalidae (2)

Northern Cardinal Cardinalis cardinalis—Only at the Dyck Arboretum and Konza nature trail.

Dickcissel Spiza americana—Single spotting at The Nature Conservancy's CB property.

OLD WORLD SPARROWS: Passeridae (1)

House Sparrow (I) Passer domesticus—Seen most every day.

MAMMALS (11 species)

Nine-banded Armadillo Dasypus novemcinctus—DOR

Eastern Cottontail Sylvilagus floridanus—Great Plains NC, & several other sightings.

Eastern Gray Squirrel Sciurus carolinensis

Fox Squirrel *Sciurus niger*—Common in parks and riparian woodlands.

Black-tailed Prairie Dog Cynomys Iudovicianus—high water flooded most dog towns. No dogs.

American Beaver Castor canadensis

White-tailed Deer Odocoileus virginianus—Common in parks, riparian woodlands.

Common Raccoon Procyon lotor

Red Fox Vulpes vulpes

Coyote Canis latrans—spotted on the owl prowl near Cheyenne Bottoms.

Bison Bison bison—Maxwell Game Preserve and Konza

REPTILES (5 species)

Ornate Box Turtle *Terrapene ornata*

Common Slider Trachemys scripta—Sunning on logs at Great Plains NC

Eastern Collared Lizard Crotaphytus collaris

Great Plains Skink Plestiodon obsoletus **Six-lined Racerunner** Aspidocelis sexlineatus
