Canada Goose – Scattered around Lake Tahoe in family groups

Mallard – Seen in mostly freshwater throughout the trip

Northern Pintail - On Mono Lake

Gadwall - Lots on Mono Lake

American Wigeon – A few scattered throughout the trip

Surf Scoter – Seen off of Half Moon Bay on the pelagic trip

Ruddy Duck – Lots on Mono Lake

California Quail – Common in fields along the coast

Wild Turkey – Seen on Panoche Valley Road

Red-throated Loon – Seen on Half Moon Bay during the pelagic trip

Common Loon - Seen on Half Moon Bay during the pelagic trip

Pied-billed Grebe - Seen on Mono Lake

Eared Grebe - Lots on Mono Lake

Clark's Grebe – A few individuals on Santa Margarita Lake

Western Grebe – Seen on the ocean and on Santa Margarita Lake

Northern Fulmar – Seen on Half Moon Bay during the pelagic trip

Buller's Shearwater – On Half Moon Bay during the pelagic trip

Pink-footed Shearwater – On Half Moon Bay during the pelagic trip

Black-vented Shearwater – Seen in the Santa Barbara Channel

Flesh-footed Shearwater – On Half Moon Bay pelagic trip

Short-tailed Shearwater – On Half Moon Bay pelagic trip

Sooty Shearwater – Seen during our crossing to the Channel Islands

Brown Booby – A lone bird on a marker at the Ventura Harbor

Blue-footed Booby – Seventeen on Anacapa Island

Double-crested Cormorant –The common cormorant for the trip

Brandt's Cormorant – Piled up on the rocks adjacent to Morro Rock

Pelagic Cormorant – A few in the channel along Morro Rock

CA Brown Pelican – Everywhere on the coast

American White Pelican – Seen on Lake Crowley

Great Blue Heron – All along the coast

Great Egret – On the coastal estuaries

Snowy Egret – A few in Moss Landing and Morro Bay

Cattle Egret – A solo bird in the fields on the Oxnard Plain

Black-crowned Night-Heron – On the docks as we left the Galley

White-faced Ibis – A flock flew along side in the Central Valley

Turkey Vulture – Everywhere along the coast

California Condor – We saw an adult and a sub-adult in Big Sur

Osprey – One in Half Moon Bay and one in Ventura

White-tailed Kite – A few hunting ranch fields on the coast

Bald Eagle – A gorgeous adult in the morning sun at Santa Margarita Lake

Northern Harrier – Seen criss-crossing fields in the Central Valley

Golden Eagle – A few were on the coastal side of the Central Valley

Sharp-shinned Hawk – Two, one in Panoche Valley and the other in Ventura

Cooper's Hawk – Only one at Morro Bay State Park

N. Goshawk – A gorgeous adult sitting in the top of a tree in Tahoe

Ferruginous Hawk – One adult seen in the Carizzo Plains

Red-shouldered Hawk – Numerous along the cost in appropriate habitat

Red-tailed Hawk – Everywhere

American Coot – If it was a man-made reservoir, it had coots

Black-necked Stilt – A few in the Great Central Valley

Black Oystercatcher – Seen on the rocks at the Ventura Harbor

Black-bellied Plover - Also seen on the rocks at the Ventura Harbor

American Golden Plover – With a group of BBPI in Ventura Harbor

Semi-palmated Plover - On the beaches along Ventura

Killdeer – On the sod fields of the Oxnard Plain

Spotted Sandpiper - Seen on the rocks at Prisoners in Santa Cruz Island

Wandering Tattler – On the rocks at the Ventura Harbor

Greater Yellowlegs – A few seen along the shore of Santa Margarita Lake

Willet – Common along the coast

Whimbrel – Seen on the beaches and rocks of Ventura Harbor

Long-billed Curlew – On most beaches along the coast

Marbled Godwit - Usually with the Willets on the coast

Ruddy Turnstone – A group of four at the Ventura Harbor

Black Turnstone – On the jetty at the Ventura Harbor

Surfbird - With the Black Turnstones

Sanderling – On the beaches by Ventura

Dunlin – Hanging out with the Sanderlings

Least Sandpiper – Different locations along the coast

Pectoral Sandpiper – One individual at Cayucos Creek mouth

Western Sandpiper – At Cayucos Creek mouth

Dowitcher sp. – Also at Cayucos Creek mouth

Red-necked Phalarope – On both pelagic trips

Red Phalarope – Only seen on the Half Moon Bay pelagic trip

South Polar Skua – On both pelagic trips

Pomeraine Jaeger – Best looks were on the Channel Island's pelagic trip

Parasitic Jaeger – Good looks on both pelagic trips

Common Murre – Very close looks on the Half Moon Bay trip

Marbled Murrelet – A number of pairs close in on the Half Moon Bay trip

Cassin's Auklet – Seen on both pelagic trips

Rhinocerus Auklet – Seen on both pelagic trips

Tufted Puffin – Great looks at winter-plumaged individuals

Sabine's Gull – Seen on the Half Moon Bay trip

Bonapartes Gull – Scattered along the coast

Heerman's Gull – If there were Brown Pelicans, there were Heermann's Gull

Mew Gull – An early individual in Morro Bay

Ring-billed Gull – Seen well at Mono Lake

Western Gull – All along the coast

California Gull – Where else but Mono Lake, their largest nesting colony

Glaucous-winged Gull – An individual on the Oxnard Plain

Caspian Tern – Seen hunting at Santa Margarita Lake

Elegant Tern – A number were roosting on the Ventura Harbor jetty

Royal Tern – A few were seen foraging on the Santa Cruz Island crossing

Rock Pigeon – Pretty common wherever there were pier or barns

Band-tailed Pigeon – Seen on the west side of the Sierra

Eurasian Collared Dove – Isolated building always seemed to have a pair

Mourning Dove – Common bird in varying habitats

Barn Owl – Two were seen in a barn on Kelly's ranch

Great Horned Owl – Seen roosting in a tree by Mono Lake

Belted Kingfisher – Half Moon Bay harbor gave us our best looks

Vaux's Swift – A single individual flying over the Tahoe area

Anna's Hummingbird – Ubiquitous along the coast

Allen's Hummingbird – Two were seen feeding in guava trees in Ventura

Acorn Woodpecker – Common in the eastern parts of coastal counties

Red-breasted Sapsucker – Three were seen at Santa Margarita Lake

Nuttall's Woodpecker – Two were seen at Santa Margarita Lake

Downy Woodpecker – One in the tamarisks on Laguna Road, Oxnard

Hairy Woodpecker – Seen in the Big Sur area looking for condors

N. Flicker – Seen sporadically on both sides of the Sierra

American Kestrel – Common in ranch areas

Peregrine Falcon – A pair was seen perched on Morro Rock

Prairie Falcon - Two different birds seen in the Carizzo Plains

Western Wood Pewee – One individual in the Laguna Road tamarisks

Willow Flycatcher - One individual in the Laguna Road tamarisks

Pacific-slope Flycatcher – Lots in the Laguna Road tamarisks

Black Phoebe – Common on the coast near water

Say's Phoebe – A few were seen in the more arid parts of the trip

Loggerhead Shrike – Plenty in the Carizzo Plains

Cassin's Vireo – Two, with the best look at Santa Margarita Lake

Hutton's Vireo – Seen in Morro Bay

Warbling Vireo – Lots in the Laguna Road tamarisks

Steller's Jay – An easy bird in the Sierra

Island Scrub Jay – On Santa Cruz Island, of course

Western Scrub Jay – Everywhere on the west side of the Sierra

Clark's Nutcracker – Seen sporadically in the Sierra

Black-billed Magpie – All over the eastern Sierra

Yellow-billed Magpie – Best looks at this CA endemic were in Santa Marg

American Crow – An easy bird on the west side of the Sierra

Common Raven – Wide-open spaces always had a group buzzing around

Horned Lark – On the Carizzo Plains in small groups

Tree Swallow – Flying along the beaches of Ventura

Violet-green Swallow – With the Tree Swallows

Barn Swallow - Two birds skimming flies at Cayucos Creek mouth

Chestnut-backed Chickadee – In coastal riparian zones

Oak Titmouse – A number were out at Santa Margarita Lake

Bushtit – Observed at various locations along the coast

Red-breasted Nuthatch – In Tahoe area trees

White-breasted Nuthatch – Good looks out at Santa Margarita Lake

Pygmy Nuthatch – In our face at Mammoth Lakes

Brown Creeper – Two individuals at Santa Margarita Lake

Rock Wren – One on Kelly's ranch and another on Panoche Valley Road

Canyon Wren – Heard but not seen on Morro Rock

House Wren – One individual in the Laguna Road tamarisks

Bewick's Wren – Various locations along the coast

Blue-Gray Gnatcatcher – Only one on Morro Rock

American Dipper – Seen on the Emerald Lake hike

Ruby-crowned Kinglet – This mountain resident was also seen on the coast

Wrentit – Very brief looks at a secretive bird In Big Sur

Western Bluebird – Seen out a Santa Margarita Lake

Mountain Bluebird - Best looks were out a Bodie SHP

Hermit Thrush – Early migrants were making their way down the Sierra

American Robin – Scattered, by the migrants were moving south

California Thrasher – Excellent views of a bird in Big Sur

N. Mockingbird – Seen sporadically in the Carizzo and in neighborhoods

European Starling – Fortunately only on the west side of the Sierra

American Pipit – Just a couple in Ventura and the Carizzo

Northern Waterthrush – One well seen individual at

Prothonotary Warbler - One individual in the Laguna Road tamarisks

Orange-crowned Warbler – Lots of individuals in the Laguna Rd tamarisks

Common Yellowthroat – Best look was at Mono Lake

Nashville Warbler – One individual in the Laguna Road tamarisks

Yellow Warbler – Lots of individuals in the Laguna Road tamarisks

Palm Warbler – One seen in Mammoth Lakes

Yellow-rumped Warbler – All over the Sierra

Townsend's Warbler – Lots individuals in the Laguna Road tamarisks

Black-throated Gray Warbler - One individual in the Laguna Rd tamarisks

Hermit Warbler – One individual in the Laguna Road tamarisks

Wilson's Warbler - Lots of individuals in the Laguna Road tamarisks

Spotted Towhee – First one was on the Hot Springs Road

California Towhee – Everywhere on the coast

Chipping Sparrow – A few mixed in with some of the Zonatrichia flocks

Brewer's Sparrow – On Hot Springs Road south of Mono Lake

Vesper Sparrow – One individual in the Carizzo Plains

Lark Sparrow – A number of these stunning sparrows in the Carizzo

Bell's Sparrow – Three individuals seen at Wallace Creek in the Caizzo

Savannah Sparrow – Scattered in grassy fields throughout the trip

Fox Sparrow – Scattered in the Sierra foothills

Song Sparrow – Common in wet, weedy fields

Lincoln's Sparrow – Seen at a couple of stops on the east side

White-crowned Sparrow – The winter residents had returned in force

Golden-crowned Sparrow – A few mixed in with the White-crowneds

Dark-eyed Junco – Flocks in the Sierra and Tahoe

Western Tanager – A gorgeous male and female in a tree in Panoche Valley

Black-headed Grosbeak – One at Santa Margarita & one at Point Lobos

Bobolink – A bright immature bird at Cayucos Creek mouth

Red-winged Blackbird – Scattered throughout the trip

Western Meadowlark – Fields west of the Sierra had lots of these birds

Brewer's Blackbird – All over Mono Lake and a few other areas too

Common Grackle – A young male mixed in with the Brewer's at Mono Lake

Great-tailed Grackle – Around San Luis Obispo County

Brown-headed Cowbird – Small flocks on Hot Springs Road

House Finch – Pretty much all over the west
Purple Finch – A few on the Big Sur coast were all we saw
Cassin's Finch – Pretty common in Tahoe and the Sierra
Red Crossbill – Not as common as Cassin's Finch, but in the same locations
Pine Siskin – Three were seen in Yosemite Valley
Lesser Goldfinch – More common in the Panoche Valley than other areas
American Goldfinch – A few individuals at Point Lobos and Big Sur
House Sparrow – Ubiquitous wherever cars were parked
