Birding and Wildlife Tour Species List

Anhinga, Anhinga anhinga – Two were seen roosting along the Rio Sarapiqui Bare-throated Tiger-Heron. Tigrisome mexicanum – A single individual along the Rio Sarapigui Sunbittern, Eurypyga helias – We got to see two birds on rivers in the Rancho Naturalista area Russet-naped Wood-Rail, Aramides albiventris - Seen at the feeders at La Union, Casa de Cope Fasciated Tiger-Heron, Tigrisoma fasciatum - Got to see two in the trees on our walk along the river Neotropic Cormorant, Phalacrocorax brasilianus – We had a number of these birds roosting above the Rio Sarapiqui Great Blue Heron, Ardea Herodias – Seen sporadically throughout the trip Great Egret, Ardea alba - Seen on our drive to Gayabo National Park Snowy Egret, Egretta thula – Seen along the Rio Sarapiqui Little Blue Heron, Egretta caerulea - Seen along the Rio Sarapiqui Cattle Egret, Bubulcus ibis - First one was at the Hotel Bougainvillea Green Heron, Butorides virescens – First one seen was at Ujarras in Cartago Yellow-crowned Night-Heron Nyctanassa violacea – Numerous solo birds seen along the Rio Tarcoles Boat-billed Heron, Cochleari cochlearius - One individual along the Rio Sarapiqui

Black Vulture, Coragyps atratus - Everywhere and every day...

Turkey Vulture, Cathartes aura – Again, everywhere and every day...

King Vulture, Sarcoramphus papa – Seen flying over the river at La Selva

Osprey, Pandion haliatus – One was seen along the Rio Sarapiqui

Swallow-tailed Kite, Elanoides forficatus - One was seen soaring over the Valle de Tuis

Bicolored Hawk, Accitpiter bicolor - Seen along the entrance road to Rancho Naturalista

Gray Hawk, Buteo plagiadus - Seen flying over La Selva

Roadside Hawk, Buteo magnirostris - At a number of locations and usually confiding

Broad-winged Hawk, Buteo platypterus - Two flew fairly close to us at La Selva

Short-tailed Hawk, Buteo branchyurus - One was seen overhead at Rancho Naturalista

Red-tailed Hawk, Buteo jamaicensis - Soaring over the communication towers on Cerro Buena Vista

Collared Forest-Falcon, Micrastur semitorquatus – Good looks through the scope at La Selva

Yellow-headed Caracara, Milvago chimachima - The more common of the two caracaras

Gray-headed Chachalaca, Ortalis cinereiceps - Seen everyday at the banana feeders at Rancho Naturalista

Crested Guan, Penelope purpurascens - Seen in a tree on our afternoon walk along La Mina River

Black Guan, Chamaepetes unicolor - Common at both Mirador de Quetzales and Savegre

Marbled Wood-Quail, Odontophorus gujanensis - Heard and almost seen at Esquinas

Spotted Wood-Quail, Odontophorus guttetus - A pair was seen on the grounds of the Savegre Lodge

Southern Lapwing, Vanellus chilensis - A recent arrival in Costa Rica, but you couldn't tell by the numbers

Northern Jacana, Jacana spinosa - More sporadic than it should've been, but we saw a few

Spotted Sandpiper, Actitis macularia – Very common along the Rio Sarapiqui

Rock Pigeon, Columba livia – Pretty common around San Jose

Red-billed Pigeon, Patagioenus flavorostris - Seen on the grounds of the Hotel Bougainvillea

Band-tailed Pigeon, Columba fasciata – Seen both days at the Rio Savegre Lodge

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Ruddy Pigeon, Patagioenas subvinacea – Heard and then seen above the lodge at Mariano's
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Short-billed Pigeon, Columba nigrirostris - More often heard than seen at La Selva

*Inca Dove, Columbina inca - Very easy to see at the Hotel Bougainvilea

Ruddy Ground-Dove, Columbina talpacoti – We saw a total of seven up at Ujarras in Cartago

White-tipped Dove, Leptotila verreauxi – Usually seen everyday, and some with good looks solo individuals

*White-winged Dove, Zenaida asiatica - Mostly on the grounds of the Hotel Bougainvilea

Mourning Dove, Zenaida macriura - Only two seen were on the grounds of the Hotel Bougainvillea

Great Green Macaw. Ara ambigus – Best looks were at Heleconia Island

Crimson-fronted Parakeet, Aratinga finschi - Common around the Hotel Bougainvillea

Sulphur-winged Parakeet, Pyrrhura hoffmanni - Very common along the Rio Savegre valley

Olive-throated Parakeet, Eupsittula nana – A single flyover during our final morning at Rancho Naturalista

Crimson-fronted Parakeet, Psittacara finschi – Definitely the most common of the parrot family on the trip

Barred Parakeet, Bolborhynchus lineola – A small flock was seen up on the hill opposite the lodge at Savegre

Brown-hooded Parrot, Pyrilia haemetotis – Seen along the Rio Sarapiqui

Blue-headed Parrot, Pionus menstruus - Great looks at a perched individual in La Amistad NP

White-crowned Parrot, Pionus senilis - Perched low and in the morning light at Rancho Naturalista

Squirrel Cuckoo, *Piaya cayana* – Seen at Mirador de Quetzales

Smooth-billed Ani, Crotophaga ani – Seen working through the trees at Rancho Naturalista

Groove-billed Ani, Crotophaga sulcirostris – Seen along the road down to La Mina River

White-collared Swift, Streptoprocne zonaris – Seen randomly throughout the trip, definitely serendipitous

Vaux's Swift, Chaetura vauxi – Five were seen flying over La Selva

Gray-rumped Swift, Chatura cinereiventus - Three were seen flying over La Selva

Green Hermit, *Phaethornis guy* – Two were regularly using the upstairs feeders at Rancho Naturalista

Long-billed (Long-tailed) Hermit, *Phaethornis longirostris* – Seen feeding at the La Union, casa de Cope feeders

Stripe-throated (Little) Hermit, *Phaethornis striigularis* – Feeding alongside the Long-billed Hermit

White-necked Puffbird, Notharcuis hyperrhynchus - Good, long looks at a bird sitting on the bridge at La Selva

Garden Emerald, Chlorostilbon assimilis - Seen both days at Rancho Naturalista

White-necked Jacobin, Florisuga mellivora - Common at Rancho Naturalista

Lesser Violetear, Colibri thalassinus- Numerous and feisty around the Mirador de Quetzales feeders

Fiery-throated Hummingbird, *Panterpe insignis* – The most numerous hummingbird around Mirador de Quetzales

Violet-crowned Woodnymph, *Thalurania colombica* – One of the more common hummingbirds at Rancho Naturalista

Rufous-tailed Hummingbird, Amazilia tzacatl - Very common around Hotel Bougainvillea, great looks

Violet Headed Hummingbird, Klais guimeti – At the La Union, Casa de Cope site

Crowned Woodnymph, *Thalurina colombica* – One of the more common hummingbirds at Rancho Naturalista feeders Steely-vented Hummingbird, *Amazilia saucerrottei* – Two were seen at Hotel Bougainvillea, with one giving great looks

Green-crowned Brilliant, Heliodoxa jacula - One was seen briefly at Mariano's feeders

White-throated Mountain-gem, Lampornis castaneoventris - Seen feeding at Mariano's feeders at Savegre

Ruby-throated Hummingbird, Archilochus colubris – We saw three up at Ujarras in Cartago

Magnificent Hummingbird, Eugene fulgens – Seen at most stops in the central valley/highlands, but not common

Purple-crowned Fairy, Heliothryx barroti – One wopuld make sporadic appearances at Rancho Naturalista

Green-breasted Mango, Anthracothorax veraguensis – Sporadicay common at Rancho Naturalista

Magenta-throated Woodstar, Calliphlox bryanti – Seen at the feedrs at Mirador de Quetzales

Scintillant Hummingbird, Selasphorus scintilla - Seen at Rio Savegre Lodge and Mirador de Quetzales

Volcano Hummingbird, Selasphorus flammula – Seen daily in the highlands and cloud forests

Stripe-tailed Hummingbird, Eupherusa eximia – Seen feeding above Savegre Lodge at Mariano's feeders

White-tailed Emerald, Elvira chionura - Seen on our walk in La Amistad NP

Snowcap, Microchera albocoronata - Seen feeding on the shrubs sporadically at Rancho Naturalista

Gartered Trogon, Trogon violaceus - Had up to five of these birds feeding & calling along the Rancho Naturalista road

Collared Trogon, *Trogon collaris* – Both sexes on our walk around Savegre Lodge

Slaty-tailed Trogon, Trogon massena – Seen on our final morning at La Selva

Resplendent Quetzal, Pharomachrus mocinno – Great looks at a males & females at Mirador de Quetzales

Rufous Motmot, Baryphthengus martii – Two were seen near their nesting burrow on the Rio Sarapigui

Broad-billed Motmot, Electron platyrhyncum - Two were seen foraging together at La Selva

Lesson's Motmot, Momotus mlessoni – Seen a number of times throughout the trip

Amazon Kingfisher, Chloroceryle amazona – Seen along the La Mina River continually moving ahead of us

Green Kingfisher, Chloroceryle americana – Perched on a log in the middle of the river in the Valle Tuis

Emerald Toucanet, Aulacorhynchus prasianus – We had two coming into the feeding station in Ujarras Collared Aracari, Pteroglossus torguatus - Always a few visiting the feeders at Rancho Naturalista Keel-billed Toucan, Ramphastos sulfuratus - One was seen along the road to Rancho Naturalista Yellow-throated Toucan, Ramphastos swainsonii – Pairs calling repeatedly in different parts of the cloud forest Acorn Woodpecker, Melanerpes formicivorus - An easy bird along the Rio Savegre Valley Black-cheeked Woodpecker, Melanerpes pucherani – Two were regularly coming into the feeders at Rancho Naturalista Red-crowned Woodpecker, Melanerpes rubricapillus - At various locations in the cloud forest Hoffmann's Woodpecker, Melanerpes hoffmannii - Common around the Hotel Bougainvillea Hairy Woodpecker, Picoides villosus - One was seen in the forest along the road at Savegre Lodge Pale-billed Woodpecker, Campephilus quatamalensis – Great looks at two males and a female at La Selva Ruddy Treerunner, Margarornis rubiginosus – Seen in the forests around Savegre Plain Xenops, Xenops minutus – Seen on the grounds of Esquinas Rainforest Lodge Streaked Xenops, Xenops rutilans - Again, seen in the forest around Mirador de Quetzales in a large mixed flock Buff-fronted Foliage-gleaner, Philydor rufum - Feeding on moths at Rancho Naturalista Ruddy Foliage-gleaner, Clibanornis rubiginosus - Seen on our final morning walk at Wilson Botanical Garden Tawny-throated Leaftosser, Sclerurus mexicanus – Seen at the moth attractant at Rancho Naturalista Wedge-billed Woodcreeper, Glyphorynchus spirurus - A couple were seen during our walk at La Selva Ruddy Woodcreeeper, Dendrocincia homochroa – Seen along the Rio Savegre Valley down towards the waterfalls Plain-brown Woodcreeper, Dendrocincia fuliginosa – Seen at the moth attractant at Rancho Naturalista N. Barred Woodcreeper, Dendrocolaptes sanctithoeme - Seen at the morning moth attractant watch Black-striped Woodcreeper, Xiphorhynchus lachrymosus – Seen along the road into Esquinas Cocoa Woodcreeper, Xiphorhynchus susurrans – Foraging along the road at Rancho Naturalista Spotted Woodcreeper, Xiphorhynchu serythropyguis - Seen during the morning moth frenzy at Rancho Naturalista Streak-headed Woodcreeper, Lepidocolaptes souleyetii – Seen at the morning moth stakeout at Rancho Naturalista Spot-crowned Woodcreeper, Lepidocolaptes affinis - Seen working the trees in our walk around the Savegre Lodge Spotted Woodcreeper, Xiphorhynchus erythropygius – Seen during the morning raid by the moth feeders Brown-billed Scythebill Campylorhamphus pusillus - Seen along the road into La Amistad National Park Plain Antvireo, Dysithamnus mentalis – Seen during one of our morning outings to the moth attractant at Rancho N Slaty Antwren, Myrmotherula schisticolor - Seen at the Rancho Naturalista moth attractant Yellow-bellied Elaenia. Elaenia flavogaster – First one seen was foraging over the La Mina River Mountain Elaenia, Elaenia frantzii - In the forest around Savegre in a large mixed flock Torrent Tyrannulet, Serpophaga cinerea – Got to see two foraging along the La Mina River Olive-striped Flycatcher, Mionectes olivaceus – Seen down the road by the pond at Savegre (H) Royal Flycatcher, Onychorynchus coronatus – Heard only at La Selva Ochre-bellied Flycatcher, Mionectes oleaginous - Along the road at Rancho Naturalista Paltry Tyrannulet, Zimmerius vilissimus – Seen a few times on the trip, and yes, it is small and non-descript Scale-crested Pygmy-Tyrant, Myiornis atricapillus - Close looks at two individuals along the trail at Guayabo NP Eye-ringed Flatbill, Rhynchocyclus brevirostris - Seen on our morning walk at La Selva Common Tody-Flycatcher, Todirostrum cinereum - Seen very close foraging over the La Mina River Tawny-chested Flycatcher, Aphanotriccus capitalis – Rancho Naturalista is a consistent place for this rarity Tufted Flycatcher, Mitrephanes phaeocercus – Seen a number of times, but the best look was at Savegre Olive-sided Flycatcher, Contopus cooperi – One seen flycatching from the top of a tree around Savegre Lodge Eastern Wood-Pewee, Contopus virens - Seen and heard during our stay at Wilson Botanical Garden Yellow-bellied Flycatcher *Empidonax flaviventris* - A pair were seen foraging around the moth attractant Dark Pewee, Contopus lugubris - Two were seen around the trout pond below the Savegre Lodge Yellowish Flycatcher, Empidonax flavescens - Certainly one the most common Empidonax flycatchers on the trip Black-capped Flycatcher, Empidonax atriceps – First seen down near the guetzals at Mirador de... Black Phoebe, Sayornis nigricans – Seen at the pond along the Rio Savegre Long-tailed Tyrant, Colonia colonus - Seen down near the river at La Selva Dusky-capped Flycatcher, Myarchus tuberculifer - First one was during the morning moth frenzy Great Kiskadee, Pitangus sulphuratus - A pretty common bird in most of Costa Rica with appropriate habitat Boat-billed Flycatcher, Megarynchus pitangua – Hotel Bougainvillea had a couple of confiding pairs Social Flycatcher, Myiozetetes similis – First ones seen were on our morning walk at Rancho Naturalista Tropical Kingbird, Tyrannus melancholicus – Certainly the most widespread and most common flycatcher in Costa Rica Barred Becard, Pachyramphus versicolor - Both sexes were seen in the big mixed flock at Savegre Lodge Purple-throated Fruitcrow, Querala purpurata - Good, long looks at a male a male and three females overhead

Snowy Cotinga, Carpodectus antoniae - Seen perched and then flying overhead on the entrance road to La Selve Masked Tityra, Tityra semifasciata – A pair were seen foraging on our walk along the road to La Selva White-ruffed Manakin, Corapipo altera - Seen along the road at Rancho Naturalista Red-capped Manakin, Pipra mentalis - Seen during our morning walk at La Selva White-collared Manakin, Manacus candei - Seen foraging off to the side of the La Union, Casa de Cope feeders Yellow-throated Vireo, Vireo flavifrons - First two were seen very close at Hotel Bougainvillea Yellow-winged Vireo, Vireo carmioli - Easily seen at along the Savegre Valley Road Brown-capped Vireo, Vireo leucophrys - Common in the lower Rio Savegre Valley Philadelphia Vireo, Vireo philadelphicus – Best looks were at the Hotel Bougainvillea Brown Jay, Cyanocorax morio – Seen only on the grounds of Hotel Bougainvillea Gray-breasted Martin, Progne chalybea - Seen about every other day in small numbers Mangrove Swallow, Tachycineta albilinea – Definitely the common swallow on the Rio Sarapiqui Blue-and-white Swallow, Pygochelidon cyanoleuca -The most common swallow for the trip No. Rough-winged Swallow, Stelgidopteryx serripennis - Certainly the more common of the Rough-wingeds up north Southern Rough-winged Swallow, Stelgidopteryx ruficollis – Seen along the Rio Sarapiqui Rufous-breasted Wren, Thryothorus rutilus - The more common of the wrens at Hotel Bougainvillea Stripe-breasted Wren, Cantorchilus thoracicus - One put in an appearance at the moth feeder Bay Wren, Cantorchilus nigricappallus - Seen along the river in dense vegetation near Rancho Naturalista Band-backed Wren, Campylorhynchus zonatus - Seen during our last breakfast at Rancho Naturalista Rufous-naped Wren, Campylorrynchus rufinucha - Seen well up at Mirador de Quetzales and at Hotel Bougainvillea Isthmusian Wren, Thryothorus modestus – A pair were very confiding along the Rio Cato House Wren, Troglodytes aedon - Seen on the front area of the Hotel Bougainvillea Timberline Wren, Thryorchilus browni - Seen up on Cerro Buena Vista at 11,000-feet Gray-breasted Wood-Wren, Hericorhina leucophrys - Loud, vocal and common... White-breasted Wood-Wren, Henichorina leucostichta - Always at least one at the Rancho Naturalista moth attractant Black-faced Solitaire, Myadestes melanops - Seen and heard along the trail out of Mariano's place Black-billed Nightingale-Thrush, Catharus gracilirostris - Seen in the mixed flock at at Mirador de Quetzales Ruddy-capped Nightingale-Thrush, Catharus frantzii - Seen at the Rio Savgre lodge forested area Wood Thrush, Hyocichla mustelina - Seen during the morning outing to La Selva Sooty Thrush, Turdus nigrescens - Sporadically common along the Rio Savegre valley highlands Mountain Thrush, Turdus plebejus - Less common than the Sooty Thrush, first seen at Mirador de Quetzales Pale-vented Thrush, Turdus obsoletus - A total of four were seen at La Selva Clay-colored Thrush, Turdus grayi - The national bird of Costa Rica, probably because it is found country-wide White-throated Thrush, Turdus assimilis - Came into the feeders at La Union, casa de Cope Gray Catbird, Dumetella carolinensis - Seen in the gardens of Hotel Bougainvillea Black-and-Yellow Silky Flycatcher, Phainoptila melanoxantha – Two were seen in a mixed flock at Mirador de Quetzales Long-tailed Silky-flycatcher, Ptilogonys caudatus - Common and so very photogenic around the Rio Savegre Lodge Northern Waterthrush, Parkesia noveboracensis - Seen very well along the La Mina River Tennessee Warbler, Vermivora peregrine - Easily the most common warbler we encountered Golden-winged Warbler, Vermivora chrysoptera - Seen the best at Rancho Naturalista bird bath Flame-throated Warbler, Parula gutturalis – Seen well in the Rio Savgre Valley, especially at Miriam's Kentucky Warbler, Geothylpis Formosa – One would show up every morning for a moth breakfast at Rancho Naturalista Tropical Parula, Parula pitiayumi – One was seen at eye-level from the second floor deck at Rancho Naturalista American Redstart, Setophaga ruticilla – An adult female and male were both seen at Savegre

Yellow Warbler, Dendroica petechial - Not the least bit uncommon, found in most all habitats

Chestnut-sided Warbler, Dendroica pensylvanica - Not uncommon in most any habitat along the trip route

Black-throated Green Warbler, Dendroica virens – Good looks at a bird as we walked down the Rio Savegre Valley Road Black-and-White Warbler Mniotilta varia - First was seen as we were birding around the Rio Savegre Lodge

Golden-crowned Warbler, Basileuterus culicivorus - Seen on our morning walk along entrance road to Rancho Naturalista

Townsends Warbler, Setophaga townsendi – Seen with the small mixed flock at Mirador de Quetzales

Wilson's Warbler, Wilsonia pusilla - Seen most every day in cloud forest habitat

Collared Redstart, Myioborus torquatus - First of many sightings was at Mirador de Quetzales

Wrenthrush, Zeledonia coronate - Seen during our hilke to the quetzals at Mirador de Quetzales

Rufous-capped Warbler, Basileutenus rufifrons - Seen along the riparian at Rio Savegre

Buff-rumped Warbler, Basileuterus fulvicauda – At least five along the Rio Sarapigui

Bananaguit, Coereba flaveola - Sporadic, but seen at most all of our lodging locations

Common Bush-Tanager, Chlorospingus ophthalmicus – Not as common as the Sooty, but seen at almost every lodge Sooty-capped Chlorospringus, Chlorospingus pileatus - One or two were always showing up at banana feeders Red-throated Ant Tanager, Habia fuscicauda - Always one or two at the moth extravaganza Carmiol's Tanager, Chlorothraupis carmioli - Seen during breakfast at Rancho Naturalista Summer Tanager, Pirangia rubra – Seen or heard every day along the Rio Sayegre Flame-colored Tanager, Piranga bidentata – Common in the mid-elevations of the mountain ranges of our tour White-shouldered Tanager, Tachyphonus rufus - Three were seen at La Selva White-lined Tanager, Tachyphonus rufus – Seen at the morning moth feed at Rancho Naturalista Crimson-collared Tanager, Ramphocelus sanguinolentus - Seen in the gardens at Rancho Naturalista Passerini's Tanager, Ramphocelus passerinii - One of the more common tanagers at Rancho Naturalista Blue-gray Tanager, Thraupis episcopus – Seemed to be in most all of the habitats Palm Tanager, *Thraupis palmarum* – One of the very abundant tanagers on the trip Silver-throated Tanager, Tangara icterocephala – One of the more common tanagers in the highlands Bay-headed Tanager, Tangara gyrola - The first seen was at the Rancho Naturalista feeders Plain-colored Tanager, *Tangara inornata* – Seen at the morning moth buffet Golden-hooded Tanager, Tangara larvata - Seen daily at Rancho Naturalista Spangle-cheeked Tanager, Tangara dowii - Seen at Rio Savege Lodge feeding on berries Scarlet-thighed Dacnis, Dacnis venusta – We saw four on our morning walk at Rancho Naturalista Green Honeycreeper, Chlorophanes spiza – There always seemed to be at least one pair at most banana feeders Red-legged Honeycreeper, Cyanerpes cyaneus - Seen well at the La Union, casa de Cope feeders White-collared Seedeater, Sporophila torqueola - The more common seedeater on the trip Yellow-faced Grassquit, Tiaris olivacea – Seen well at a number of locations, usually in roadside grasses Slaty Flowerpiercer, Diglossa plumbea - Came into the Mirador de Qiuetzales hummingbird feeders Yellow-thighed Finch, Pselliophorus tibialis - Also a regular visitor to the Mirador de Quetzales feeders Large-footed Finch, Pezopetes capitalis - Seen feeding 15-feet below us at Miriam's Restaurant's feeders Orange-billed Sparrow, Arremon aurantiirostris - One or two were always present at the Rancho Natural moth attractant Chestnut-capped Brush-Finch, Arremon aurabtiirostris - Seen on the forest floor at Savegre Lodge Rufous-collared Sparrow, Zonotrichia capensis - Almost everywhere, great looking bird Volcano Junco, Junco vulcani – Seen up on Cerro Buena Vista road Grayish Saltator, Saltator coerulescens - Seen at our Ujarras lunch stop Buff-throated Saltator, Saltator maximus - Very good looks along the Rancho Naturalista road Black-headed Saltator, Saltator atriceps - Came in for a brief appearance at the Rancho Naturalista feeders Black-faced Grosbeak, Caryothroustes poliogaster - We had three of these at La Selva Rose-breasted Grosbeak, Pheucticus Iudovicianus - Saw two along the road about the Savegre Lodge Red-breasted Blackbird, Sturnella militaris - Great looks at a few individuals in the Valle de Tuis Melodious Blackbird. Dives dives – Seen and heard at the very back of the Hotel Bougainvillea grounds Great-tailed Grackle, Quiscalus mexicanus - Everywhere, everywhere, everywhere, everywhere... Giant Cowbird, Molothrus oryzivorous - Seen flying overhead at Hotel Bougainvillea Orchard Oriole, Icterus spurious - Only one seen was in the corridor along the Rio Cota Baltimore Oriole, Icterus galbula - We saw three at the Hotel Bougainvillea, most for the trip Crested Oropendola, Psarocolius decumanus - A few were seen every day in areas of cloud forest Chestnut-headed Oropendula, Psarocolius wagleri - Best looks were at the solo bird at the Ujarras feeders Montezuma Oropendula, Psarocolius montezuma - There were six in the trees behind the feeders at Ujarras Yellow-crowned Euphonia, Euphonia luteicappilla – Seen at the Rancho Naturalista feeders during breakfast Olive-backeded Euphonia, Euphonia gouldi - Seen at the La Union, Casa de Cope feeders White-vented Euponia, Euphonia minuta- We saw two on our Rancho Naturalista walk Golden-browed Chlorophonia. Chlorophonia callophrys -A few were seen feeding on the apple trees at Mariano's Yellow-bellied Siskin, Carduelis xanthogastra – Saw a few of these throughout the trip, but not common
