

Veracruz, Mexico: River of Raptors October 15 - October 26, 2022 Compiled by Dave Mehlman

(HO) = Distinctive enough to be counted as heard only

(I) = Introduced

(GO) = seen by guides only

(E) = Mexican Endemic

Summary: 286 species of birds, 7 species of mammals, 9 species of herps, and 100 species of invertebrates

This was the third Naturalist Journeys Veracruz tour and recorded by far the most bird species of any so far! This was clearly due to the impeccable credentials of the participants and guides. This tour also started the latest in the year of any of the previous ones (which both started in late September), which may have helped. A huge thanks on this trip go to Alan Monroy, our uber-guide, who fearlessly led us around to many places, found birds, provided translation when needed, and gave us a lot of social and historical context to all the places visited. Many, many thanks to Victor Baez, who drove us everywhere at all hours of day and night. And, last but not least, Pete Siminski dedicated huge amounts of his time and expertise in identifying invertebrates (and other non-birds) for the group, which helped expand our own personal knowledge and the size of the trip list considerably.

BIRDS (286 species recorded, of which were 14 heard only, 8 were seen by guides only, and 3 were heard and seen by guides only):

DUCKS, GEESE, AND SWANS: Anatidae (4)

Black-bellied Whistling-Duck *Dendrocygna autumnalis*—Large numbers seen at Las Barrancas, particularly in the ponds of the ranch, where many adults and young were sitting, half-hidden in the vegetation

Blue-winged Teal *Spatula discors*—Found on three days of the trip during the Rio La Antigua boat trip, at Playa Juan Angel, and at Las Barrancas

Northern Shoveler *Spatula clypeata*—Two birds found along the small river at Playa Juan Angel and a flock of 6 in Laguna Alchichica

Ruddy Duck Oxyura jamaicensis—One individual seen in Laguna Alchichica

GUANS AND CURASSOWS: Cracidae (1)

Plain Chachalaca Ortalis vetula—Seen or heard on six days of the tour, sometimes at very close ranch as at the Hotel Playa Azul

NEW WORLD QUAILS: Odontophoridae (1)

Northern Bobwhite Colinus virginianus—A flock flushed from alongside the road at Las Barrancas

GREBES: Podicipedidae (2)

Pied-billed Grebe *Podilymbus podiceps*—Found on 4 days of the tour in a variety of appropriate wetland sites **Eared Grebe** *Podiceps nigricollis*—Many seen swimming in Laguna Alchichica

PIGEONS AND DOVES: Columbidae (10)

Rock Pigeon (I) Columba livia—Found on all 10 days of the trip whenever in or driving through towns

Red-billed Pigeon Patagioenas flavirostris—Found on all days of the trip except when at the highest elevations of the mountains on the last 2 days; seen on 8 days total—a very, very poorly named species!

Eurasian Collared-Dove (I) Streptopelia decaocto—Found on 8 days of the trip, pretty much in or near any inhabited area

Inca Dove Columbina inca—Seen on 7 days of the trip in a wide variety of places and habitats

Ruddy Ground Dove *Columbina talpacoti*—Oddly, this normally common bird was only seen on 3 days, perhaps best at Paso Mariano

White-tipped Dove Leptotila verreauxi—(HO) At Nanciyaga

Gray-headed Dove Leptotila plumbeiceps—(HO) Heard by Alan in the forests at Ruiz Cortines

Tuxtla Quail-Dove Zentrygon carrikeri (E)—(HO, GO) Heard by Alan in the far distance at Ruiz Cortines

White-winged Dove Zenaida asiatica—Generally a common dove and found on 5 days, sometimes in large flocks migrating overhead

Mourning Dover *Zenaida macroura*—Found on three days, mostly in the mountains at Camino de Conejo and at Las Barrancas

CUCKOOS AND ALLIES: Cuculidae (2)

Groove-billed Ani Crotophaga sulcirostris—Found on 3 days of the tour at several sites

Squirrel Cuckoo *Piaya cayana*—Seen or heard on 8 days at a variety of sites, occasionally perching quite cooperatively in the open

SWIFTS: Apodidae (2)

White-collared Swift *Streptoprocne zonaris*—Seen flying overhead on 4 days of the tour, the closest over the water and mangroves during the Alvarado boat trip

Vaux's Swift Chaetura vauxi—Seen flying overhead at Miramar

HUMMINGBIRDS: Trochilidae (10)

Mexican Sheartail Doricha eliza—(GO) Seen (briefly) and heard by Alan at Playa Juan Angel

Lucifer Hummingbird Calothorax lucifer—One seen briefly at Laguna Alchichica

Ruby-throated Hummingbird Archilochus colubris—Found on 2 days at Chichicaxtle and Playa Juan Angel

Canivet's Emerald Chlorostilbon canivetii—Found in the scrub at Playa Juan Angel

Wedge-tailed Sabrewing Campylopterus curvipennis—Found at Rancho El Mirador and again at Macuiltépetl

Long-tailed Sabrewing (E) *C. c. excellens*—Several seen in the town of Ruiz Cortines, mostly feeding on *Erythrina*; until 2022, considered a full species by the American Ornithological Society

Violet Sabrewing Campylopterus hemileucurus—(HO, GO) Located by Alan at Hotel Playa Azul

White-bellied Emerald Amazilia candida—Seen at Nanciyaga and Ruiz Cortines

Azure-crowned Hummingbird *Amazilia cyanocephala*—Found on 3 days, sometimes with very excellent views, in Ruiz Cortines, Rancho El Mirador, and at Macuiltépetl

Rufous-tailed Hummingbird *Amazilia tzacatl*—This species was only found on the last morning at the Hotel Playa Azul

Buff-bellied Hummingbird *Amazilia yucatanensis*—Found on the first 3 days of the trip at several lowland, coastal sites and again at the Hotel Playa Azul

RAILS, CRAKES, AND ALLIES: Rallidae (2)

American Coot *Fulica americana*—Seen on four days in a variety of appropriate wetland types **Ruddy Crake** *Laterallus ruber*—(HO) Heard in the wetlands at Nanciyaga

SUNGREBES: Heliornithidae (1)

Sungrebe Heliornis fulica—Seen very briefly on the Alvarado Wetlands boat trip

THICK-KNEES: Burhinidae (1)

Double-striped Thick-knee Burhinus bistriatus—Many (at least 36) found at Las Barrancas in cattle pastures

STILTS AND AVOCETS: Recurvirostridae (2)

Black-necked Stilt *Himantopus mexicanus*—This conspicuous shorebird was found during the Rio La Antigua boat trip, at Playa Juan Angel, and at Barra de Sontecomapan

American Avocet Recurvirostra americana—Found during the Rio La Antigua boat trip and at Playa Juan Angel

PLOVERS AND LAPWINGS: Charadriidae (6)

Black-bellied Plover *Pluvialis squatarola*—Found on two days, first at the beach in front of the Hotel Mocambo and again during the boat trip to the mouth of the Rio La Antigua

Killdeer Charadrius vociferus—One seen at Las Barrancas at the ranch

Collared Plover Charadrius collaris—A few on the flats at Playa Juan Angel

Snowy Plover Charadrius nivosus—Several on the flats at Playa Juan Angel

Piping Plover Charadrius melodus—One bird in with other small plovers and shorebirds on the flats at Playa Juan Angel

Semipalmated Plover *Charadrius semipalmatus*—Easily the most numerous plover encountered during the tour, these were found during the Rio La Antigua boat trip and at Playa Juan Angel

JACANAS: Jacanidae (1)

Northern Jacana *Jacana spinosa*—Only found on 2 days at Las Barrancas, where quite noticeable, and from the bus on the last full day

SANDPIPERS AND ALLIES: Scolopacidae (12)

Long-billed Curlew Numenius americanus—A single bird seen on the flats at Playa Juan Angel

Marbled Godwit Limosa fedoa—Three birds very well seen during the Rio La Antigua boat trip

Ruddy Turnstone *Arenaria interpres*—Seen on the first 2 days of the tour at the Hotel Mocambo beach and on the Rio La Antigua boat trip

Sanderling *Calidris alba*—Found on the first 3 days of the tour at the Hotel Mocambo beach, on the Rio La Antigua boat trip, and at Playa Juan Angel

Least Sandpiper *Calidris minutilla*—Found on the Rio La Antigua boat trip, at Playa Juan Angel, and a single individual on the tufa at Laguna Alchichica

Semipalmated Sandpiper *Calidris pusilla*—Found on the Rio La Antigua boat trip

Short-billed Dowitcher *Limnodromus griseus*—Found on the Rio La Antigua boat trip, at Playa Juan Angel, and at Las Barrancas

Wilson's Snipe Gallinago delicata—One seen flying away after it flushed at Las Barrancas

Spotted Sandpiper *Actitis macularius*—The most commonly encountered shorebird, these "teeter-totters" were seen on 6 days at many sites near salt and fresh water

Greater Yellowlegs Tringa melanoleuca—Found on the Rio La Antigua boat trip and at Playa Juan Angel

Willet *Tringa semipalmata*—Found on the beach at the Hotel Mocambo, on the Rio La Antigua boat trip, at Playa Juan Angel, and at Barra de Sontecomapan

Lesser Yellowlegs Tringa flavipes—Only positively identified during the Rio La Antigua boat trip

GULLS AND TERNS: Laridae (5)

Laughing Gull Leucophaeus atricilla—Regularly found on every day when near salt water or the coast

Common Tern Sterna hirundo—One flying by the boat during the Laguna Alvarado boat trip

Royal Tern *Thalasseus maximus*—Seen on many days near the coast, including at Hotel Mocambo, Playa Juan Angel, during the Alvarado boat trip, and at Barra de Sontecomapan

Sandwich Tern *Thalasseus sandvicensis*— Found on the Rio La Antigua boat trip and at Playa Juan Angel **Black Skimmer** *Rynchops niger*—Two seen from the boat on the Rio La Antigua

STORKS: Ciconiidae (1)

Wood Stork *Mycteria americana*—Seen on three days of the tour, always in flight; this species is a routinely observed migrant through coastal Veracruz and many are counted from the hawkwatch sites

FRIGATEBIRDS: Fregatidae (1)

Magnificent Frigatebird *Fregata magnificens*—Seen on 7 days, sometimes from the van, when near the coast; always soaring high in the air

ANHINGAS: Anhingidae (1)

Anhinga Anhinga anhinga—One seen during the Rio La Antigua boat trip

CORMORANTS: Phalacrocoracidae (2)

Neotropic Cormorant *Phalacrocorax brasilianus*—A routinely observed waterbird, found on 6 days of the trip at many places with appropriate aquatic habitat

Double-crested Cormorant *Phalacrocorax auritus*—One definitely seen during the Rio La Antigua boat trip

PELICANS: Pelecanidae (1)

Brown Pelican Pelecanus occidentalis — Found on six days of the tour when on or very near the coast

HERONS AND EGRETS: Ardeidae (12)

Bare-throated Tiger-Heron *Tigrisoma mexicanum*—One seen on the Laguna Alvarado boat trip in the mangroves **Great Blue Heron** *Ardea herodias*—Found on 5 days at most of the appropriate coastal and inland wetland sites visited, though usually as single individuals

Great Egret *Ardea alba*—Seen on six days of the tour at pretty much every site with water; probably the most abundant heron/egret of all those seen

Snowy Egret *Egretta thula*—Seen on six days of the tour, though usually in slightly smaller numbers than the preceding

Little Blue Heron *Egretta caerulea*—Found on 4 days of the tour, probably most easily on the two boat trips; both white and dark plumages were seen

Tricolored Heron *Egretta tricolor*—Less common and frequently seen than other herons, these were found on the La Antigua boat trip, Playa Juan Angel, Las Barrancas, and during the Alvarado boat trip

Reddish Egret Egretta rufescens—Two individuals, a dark and light morph, seen at Playa Juan Angel

Cattle Egret *Bubulcus ibis*—As throughout most of its range, these were regularly seen, especially in fields in association with cows; an easy "car bird"!

Green Heron *Butorides virescens*—Found on 6 days at many wetland sites, another species best seen from a boat **Black-crowned Night-Heron** *Nycticorax nycticorax*—Found on 4 days at several wetland sites, though usually not very numerous

Yellow-crowned Night-Heron *Nyctanassa violacea*—Found on 3 days of the tour, including 1 on the beach at the Hotel Mocambo, on both boat trips, and an extremely large number of adults and young in the ponds on the ranch at Las Barrancas

Boat-billed Heron *Cochlearius*—Probably the most distinctive heron in the Americas, several of these were roosting over the crocodile pen at Nanciyaga

IBIS AND SPOONBILLS: Threskiornithidae (3)

White Ibis Eudocimus albus—Small numbers seen at various wetland sites near the coast with the largest numbers at Las Barrancas

White-faced Ibis Plegadis chihi—Seen on two days at Playa Juan Angel and Las Barrancas; always flocks flying overhead

Roseate Spoonbill Platalea ajaja—Two individuals observed flying overhead at Las Barrancas

NEW WORLD VULTURES: Cathartidae (3)

Black Vulture Coragyps atratus—A common and ubiquitous species, found on 9 days of the tour

Turkey Vulture *Cathartes aura*—Found throughout the tour almost everywhere; probably the most numerous bird seen given that we were present at the peak of its southbound migration

Lesser Yellow-headed Vulture *Cathartes burrovianus*—Found on one day at two locations: Las Barrancas and from the boat on Laguna Alvarado

OSPREY: Pandionidae (1)

Osprey *Pandion haliaetus*—Seen on five days at many sites visited, either foraging birds out over wetlands or migrating birds moving south high in the sky overhead

HAWKS, KITES, AND EAGLES: Accipitridae (15)

Hook-billed Kite *Chondrohierax uncinatus*—Seen by some in the group from the roof of the Hotel Bienvenido, where pointed out by the hawk counters

Ornate Hawk-Eagle *Spizaetus ornatus*—This spectacular raptor flew into some calls that were played and perched right over our heads at Ruiz Cortines; another individual seen later the same day soaring in the far distance

Mississippi Kite *Ictinia mississippiensis*—Only seen on one day, when 2 flew over Quiahuixtlan; at the very end of its migration season by mid-October

Northern Harrier *Circus hudsonius*—Seen on 3 days; a mixture of migrating birds overhead and foraging birds at places like Las Barrancas

Sharp-shinned Hawk *Accipiter striatus*—Encountered on 3 days at Miramar, Quiahuixtlan, Laguna Alchichica, and the Playa Azul

Cooper's Hawk *Accipiter cooperii*—Seen on 4 days at Chichicaxtle, Miramar, Quiahuixtlan, Playa Juan Angel, and Laguna Alchichica

Common Black Hawk *Buteogallus anthracinus*—Found on 4 days at various wetland sites, though by far the most were seen during the boat trip at Alvarado, where they seemed to be perched everywhere in tall mangroves

Great Black Hawk Buteogallus urubitinga—One flew overhead while we were visiting Quiahuixtlan

Roadside Hawk *Rupornis magnirostris*—Seen or heard on 6 days of the tour at many sites throughout the trip **White Hawk** *Pseudastur albicollis*—A pair of this elegant species were seen circling together high in the sky at Ruiz

Cortines

Gray Hawk Buteo plagiatus—Found on 2 days at Miramar, Quiahuixtlan, and Nanciyaga

Broad-winged Hawk *Buteo platypterus*—Relatively small numbers of these migratory hawks were mixed in with the raptor streams on various days; we were approaching the tail end of their migratory period in Veracruz

Short-tailed Hawk *Buteo brachyurus*—This resident *Buteo* was seen on three days, best at Quiahuixtlan and Ruiz Cortines

Swainson's Hawk *Buteo swainsoni*—Moderate numbers of this long distance migrant were mixed in with Turkey Vultures on almost every chance we saw migrating raptors

Red-tailed Hawk Buteo jamaicensis—Seen twice on the tour, first at Miramar and again at Laguna Alchichica

OWLS: Strigidae (2)

Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl *Glaucidium brasilianum*—Seen or heard on 4 days at several sites, sometimes perching in the open

Mottled Owl Ciccaba virgata—One seen and another heard during the owling trip to Nanciyaga

TROGONS: Trogonidae (2)

Gartered Trogon Trogon caligatus—(HO) One heard calling in the forests at Nanciyaga

Collared Trogon *Trogon collaris*—Male and female seen on the road at the UNAM Biological Station, Los Tuxtlas, and another pair seen at Ruiz Cortines

MOTMOTS: Momotidae (2)

Blue-capped Motmot (E) *Momotus coeruliceps*—One perched very nicely for the group near the top of Macuiltepetl

Lesson's Motmot Momotus lessonii—Seen or heard three days at various places in the Los Tuxtlas region

KINGFISHERS: Alcedinidae (4)

Ringed Kingfisher Megaceryle torquata—Seen on 4 days of the trip, when on or near rivers and lakes

Belted Kingfisher *Megaceryle alcyon*—Seen on 4 days of the trip when in or near appropriate habitat, most abundant at the Alvarado Wetlands

Amazon Kingfisher *Chloroceryle amazona*—Found on 3 days of the trip in appropriate habitat, including many well seen during the Rio La Antigua boat trip

Green Kingfisher *Chloroceryle americana*—Seen on 2 days, first during the Rio La Antigua boat trip and again at the Hotel Playa Azul

TOUCANS: Ramphastidae (2)

Collared Aracari *Pteroglossus torquatus*—Found on 4 days at several sites in southern Veracruz, most notably using a nest in a knothole on the grounds of the Hotel Playa Azul

Keel-billed Toucan *Ramphastos sulfuratus*—Seen or heard on 3 days at Nanciyaga, at Ruiz Cortines, and at Rancho El Mirador

WOODPECKERS: Picidae (8)

Acorn Woodpecker Melanerpes formicivorus—Seen briefly at Rancho El Mirador from the parking area

Golden-fronted Woodpecker Melanerpes aurifrons—By far the most commonly encountered woodpecker, found on 8 days at a wide variety of sites

Yellow-bellied Sapsucker Sphyrapicus varius—One seen at Macuiltepetl

Ladder-backed Woodpecker *Dryobates scalaris*—Seen or heard on 3 days at several coastal, wooded sites

Pale-billed Woodpecker Campephilus guatemalensis—One seen briefly on the Alvarado boat trip

Lineated Woodpecker *Dryocopus lineatus*—Found on 4 days at Miramar, Rancho El Mirador, Nanciyaga, and the Playa Azul

Golden-olive Woodpecker Colaptes rubiginosus—(HO, GO) Heard by Alan at Ruiz Cortines

Northern Flicker *Colaptes auratus*—A couple individuals of the Red-shafted form were seen along the Cruz Blanca-Las Minas road

FALCONS AND CARACARAS: Falconidae (8)

Collared Forest-Falcon Micrastur semitorquatus—(HO) Heard calling on 2 mornings at Hotel Playa Azul Crested Caracara Caracara cheriway—Only found once at Las Barrancas, where it perched nicely for scope views Laughing Falcon Herpetotheres cachinnans—A pair seen at a distance from the boat on the Rio La Antigua American Kestrel Falco sparverius—Found on 5 days at a variety of sites in the lowlands and in the mountains Merlin Falco columbarius—Seen on 4 days, mostly when birding near the coast

Aplomado Falcon Falco femoralis—This elegant falcon species was found on 4 days, on the Rio La Antigua, at Cansaburro, and on both visits to Las Barrancas

Bat Falcon Falco rufigularis—Found only once, swooping overhead at Rancho El Mirador

Peregrine Falcon *Falco peregrinus*—Found on 5 days; a not uncommon migrant, but mostly seen rapidly gliding overhead at various sites

PARROTS: Psittacidae (8)

Monk Parakeet (I) *Myiopsitta monachus*—A large flock well seen by the Hotel Mocambo, where they have established a nesting colony

Brown-hooded Parrot *Pyrilia haematotis*—A small flock flying over the Hotel Playa Azul one morning

White-crowned Parrot Pionus senilis—A small group flying over at Rancho El Mirador

Red-lored Parrot *Amazona autumnalis*—Several seen well, though at a distance, perched in a tree at Rancho El Mirador and then several sightings when in the Los Tuxtlas region

Yellow-headed Parrot *Amazona oratrix*—This endangered parrot species was found at Miramar, where several flew by and at least one perched visibly in a far-off tree

White-fronted Parrot *Amazona albifrons*—Several flying over at Nanciyaga and one see very nicely through the scope while perched at the Playa Azul

Olive-throated Parakeet *Eupsittula nana*—Glimpsed, at least flying by, at Miramar, Playa Juan Angel, and Paso Mariano

Scarlet Macaw *Ara macao*—Several birds seen perched and flying at Nanciyaga Reserve, where they have been successfully reintroduced

ANTBIRDS: Thamnophilidae (1)

Barred Antshrike Thamnophilus doliatus—Found in the mangroves during the Alvarado lagoon boat trip

OVENBIRDS AND WOODCREEPERS: Furnariidae (6)

Olivaceous Woodcreeper *Sittasomus griseicapillus*—Heard at Nanciyaga and seen very well exploring a tree trunk at Ruiz Cortines

Ivory-billed Woodcreeper *Xiphorhynchus flavigaster*—Quite good views of this large woodcreeper were had at Nanciyaga and Ruiz Cortines

Spot-crowned Woodcreeper *Lepidocolaptes affinis*—Seen twice, first in the pine forests near Las Minas and again in the tropical forests at Ruiz Cortines

Plain Xenops Xenops minutus—One seen along the road at the Los Tuxtlas Biological Station

Scaly-throated Foliage-gleaner *Anabacerthia variegaticeps*—Found along the road through the cloud forest past Ruiz Cortinez

Rufous-breasted Spinetail Synallaxis erythrothorax—Very well seen from the boat in the mangroves on the Alvarado boat trip

BECARDS AND TITYRAS: Tityridae (2)

Masked Tityra Tityra semifasciata—This very elegant cotinga was found at Miramar, Rancho El Mirador, Nanciyaga, and the Hotel Playa Azul, with pairs often perching quite nicely in the open Rose-throated Becard Pachyramphus aglaiae—A female seen near Playa Juan Angel in the scrub

TYRANT FLYCATCHERS: Tyrannidae (23)

Ochre-bellied Flycatcher *Mionectes oleagineus*—One seen by a few of the group at the Biological Station, Los Tuxtlas

Common Tody-Flycatcher Todirostrum cinereum—(HO) Heard from the boat in Alvarado Lagoon

Eye-ringed Flatbill Rhynchocyclus brevirostris—(HO) Heard in the forests at Ruiz Cortines

Yellow-olive Flycatcher *Tolmomyias sulphurescens*—Heard or seen by some in the group at Rancho El Mirador, Nanciyaga, and the Los Tuxtlas Biological Station

Northern Beardless-Tyrannulet *Camptostoma imberbe*—Very well seen in the scrub forest at Playa Juan Angel **Yellow-bellied Elaenia** *Elaenia flavogaster*—Only seen well in Ruiz Cortines, where one perched in a dead tree

Tropical Pewee Contopus cinereus—One perching and sallying at the Los Tuxtlas Biological Station

Yellow-bellied Flycatcher Empidonax flaviventris—One seen at Rancho El Mirador in the cafetales

Least Flycatcher Empidonax minimus—Seen twice in one day at Playa Juan Angel and Paso Mariano

Cordilleran Flycatcher Empidonax occidentalis—(HO) Heard on the walk up Macuiltepetl

Yellowish Flycatcher Empidonax flavescens—One seen at the Hotel Playa Azul on our last morning walk

Black Phoebe Sayornis nigricans—Seen in the Rio La Antigua at Paso Mariano

Say's Phoebe Sayornis saya—Seen once in the highlands near Laguna Alchichica

Vermilion Flycatcher *Pyrocephalus rubinus*—Found on 3 days at Cansaburro, Las Barrancas, and Laguna Alchichica **Dusky-capped Flycatcher** *Myiarchus tuberculifer*—Found on 4 days at several sites, including Rancho El Mirador, Alvarado Lagoon, and various places in the Los Tuxtlas region

Great Crested Flycatcher Myiarchus crinitus—One found near the road at Playa Juan Angel

Great Kiskadee *Pitangus sulphuratus*—Found on 9 days of the tour, this species was very loud and conspicuous!

Boat-billed Flycatcher *Megarynchus pitangua*—Seen or heard on 7 days, mostly at lower- to mid-elevation sites **Social Flycatcher** *Myiozetetes similis*—A ubiquitous species, seen on 9 days of the tour at many sites

Tropical Kingbird *Tyrannus melancholicus*—A common, widespread, and somewhat ubiquitous species, though hard to correctly separate from the next; recorded on 6 days of the tour

Couch's Kingbird Tyrannus couchii—Only confirmed on 2 days, first at Playa Juan Angel and again at Ruiz Cortines Scissor-tailed Flycatcher Tyrannus forficatus—This attractive flycatcher (and state bird of Oklahoma!) is a common migrant through coastal Veracruz and we saw many, particularly at Las Barrancas, but also elsewhere, including sometimes from the bus

Fork-tailed Flycatcher *Tyrannus savana*—Much less abundant than the proceeding, but these were also found at Las Barrancas and seen from the bus

VIREOS: Vireonidae (8)

Lesser Greenlet *Pachysylvia decurtata*—This tropical vireo was seen at Nanciyaga and the Los Tuxtlas Biological Station on the same day

White-eyed Vireo *Vireo griseus*—This common migrant was seen or heard on 6 days of the tour at many sites **Hutton's Vireo** *Vireo huttoni*—Seen in the pine-oak forests at Las Minas

Yellow-throated Vireo Vireo flavifrons—Found twice at Nanciyaga and at the Playa Azul

Blue-headed Vireo Vireo solitarius—One spotted in the forests at Ruiz Cortines

Philadelphia Vireo Vireo philadelphia — Found twice at Rancho El Mirador and Playa Azul

Warbling Vireo *Vireo gilvus*—Seen on 2 days at 3 sites: Rancho El Mirador, Nanciyaga, and the Los Tuxtlas Biological Station

Red-eyed Vireo *Vireo olivaceus*—One seen from the boat in the mangroves at Alvarado, and others found at Nanciyaga and the Los Tuxtlas Biological Station

SHRIKES: Laniidae (1)

Loggerhead Shrike Lanius Iudovicianus—Found at Laguna Alchichica and at Las Barrancas

CROWS AND JAYS: Corvidae (3)

Brown Jay Psilorhinus morio—Seen or heard on six days at many of the sites visited

Green Jay Cyanocorax yncas—Several seen at Macuiltepetl and some heard at Ruiz Cortines

Transvolcanic Jay (E) Aphelocoma ultramarine—Several seen in the pines in the old sand mines along the Camino de Conejo; as its name implies, this species is restricted to the transvolcanic belt in central Mexico

TITS AND CHICKADEES: Paridae (1)

Mexican Chickadee Poecile sclateri—Several seen at Las Minas foraging in the pines

LARKS: Alaudidae (1)

Horned Lark Eremophila alpestris—A flock seen in a field at the Pemex in Perote

SWALLOWS AND MARTINS: Hirundinidae (5)

Northern Rough-winged Swallow *Stelgidopteryx serripennis*—By far the most common and regularly encountered swallow of the tour, these were seen on 7 days at many sites, usually flying overhead at various heights

Purple Martin Progne subis—Seen by some on the first morning at the Hotel Mocambo

Mangrove Swallow Tachycineta albilinea—(GO) Seen by Alan during the Alvarado boat trip

Barn Swallow *Hirundo rustica*—Seen on five days in the lowlands, though not in particularly large numbers **Cliff Swallow** *Petrochelidon pyrrhonota*—Only found on the first morning when birding at the Hotel Mocambo

BUSHTITS: Aegithalidae (1)

Bushtit *Psaltriparus minimus*—Several of the black-eared subspecies were seen along the road from Cruz Blanca to Las Minas

KINGLETS: Regulidae (1)

Ruby-crowned Kinglet *Regulus calendula*—Several were part of a large mixed-species feeding flock along the road from Cruz Blanca to Las Minas

NUTHATCHES: Sittidae (1)

White-breasted Nuthatch Sitta carolinensis—(HO)

TREECREEPERS: Certhiidae (1)

Brown Creeper Certhia americana—One found in the pine forests along the road from Cruz Blanca to Las Minas

GNATCATCHERS: Polioptilidae (1)

Blue-gray Gnatcatcher Polioptila caerulea—Found on 6 days at many low elevation sites

WRENS: Troglodytidae (7)

House Wren Troglodytes aedon—Found on five days at many sites visited

Bewick's Wren Thryomanes bewickii—One seen at the Pemex in Perote

Band-backed Wren *Campylorhynchus zonatus*—Encountered on 8 days of the tour at many sites visited, though much easier to see than see well; they were quite noisy!

Rufous-naped Wren *Campylorhynchus rufinucha*—Seen on three days at Miramar, Playa Juan Angel, Paso Mariano (where a pair were dust-bathing in a path), and Las Barrancas. All individuals were of the *rufinucha* subspecies, which has been proposed to be split and to be come a full species, tentatively called Veracruz Wren

Spot-breasted Wren *Pheugopedius maculipectus*—This wren was way more often heard than seen (and when seen was not well seen at all) at El Mirador, the Alvarado mangroves, Nanciyaga, Los Tuxtlas Biological Station, and Playa Azul

White-breasted Wood-Wren Henicorhina leucosticta—Although never seen particularly well, these were found on 2 days at Nanciyaga, Los Tuxtlas Biological Station, and Ruiz Cortines

Gray-breasted Wood-Wren Henicorhina leucosticta—(HO) Heard at Las Minas

MOCKINGBIRDS AND THRASHERS: Mimidae (4)

Blue Mockingbird (E) *Melanotis caerulescens*—Found at Macuiltepetl toward the end of the walk there **Gray Catbird** *Dumetella carolinensis*—Seen on days of the tour at various lowland sites

Tropical Mockingbird *Mimus gilvus*—Seen several times at Las Barrancas, where both this and the following species can be found

Northern Mockingbird Mimus polyglottos—Found on two days at Playa Juan Angel and at Las Barrancas

STARLINGS: Sturnidae (1)

European Starling Sturnus vulgaris—A small flock seen flying by in Perote in the highlands

THRUSHES: Turdidae (6)

Eastern Bluebird *Sialia sialis*—Seen on the walk through the old sand mines along the Camino de Conejo **Slate-colored Solitaire** *Myadestes unicolor*—(HO) Heard along road near Ruiz Cortines

Ruddy-capped Nightingale-Thrush *Catharus frantzii*—A well-hidden individual spotted by Alan and observed through the scope at Las Minas

Wood Thrush *Hylocichla mustelina*—Seen or heard at several places in the Los Tuxtlas region, where it is a wintering bird, such as at Nanciyaga, Los Tuxtlas Biological Station, and Playa Azul

Clay-colored Thrush Turdus grayi—A regularly encountered species, seen on 8 days at many sites visited American Robin Turdus migratorius—Restricted in Veracruz to the high elevation pine forests, we found this at the Camino de Conejo site

OLIVE WARBLER: Peucedramidae (1)

Olive Warbler Peucedramus taeniatus—(GO) Seen by Dave and Alan at Las Minas

OLD WORLD SPARROWS: Passeridae (1)

House Sparrow (I) Passer domesticus—Found on all four days in the highlands, where roosting across the street from the Casabella

FINCHES AND EUPHONIAS: Fringillidae (6)

Blue-crowned Chlorophonia *Chlorophonia occipitalis*—(HO) Heard by some in the group in the forest at Ruiz Cortines

Scrub Euphonia *Euphonia affinis*—Found on the first 4 days of the trip at Chichicaxtle, Quiahuixtlan, on the Rio La Antigua boat trip, Playa Juan Angel, and El Mirador

Yellow-throated Euphonia *Euphonia hirundinacea*—Found on 4 days of the tour at several places, mostly higher elevations, including El Mirador, Nanciyaga, Ruiz Cortines, and the Playa Azul

House Finch Haemorhous mexicanus—Found among the cactus at Laguna Alchichica

Pine Siskin Spinus pinus — Found in the highlands at Camino de Conejo

Lesser Goldfinch *Spinus psaltria*—Seen right at the start of the trip at Chichicaxtle and then again in the highlands at various places, including the Pemex in Perote

NEW WORLD SPARROWS: Passerellidae (8)

Common Chlorospingus *Chlorospingus flavopectus*—Seen by some in the group foraging in coffee plants at Rancho El Mirador

Grasshopper Sparrow *Ammodramus savannarum*—One individual perched beautifully for the group on a fence wire at Las Barrancas

Black-chinned Sparrow Spizella atrogularis—One seen on the hillside above Laguna Alchichica

Yellow-eyed Junco Junco phaeonotus—Seen at several locations on our day birding the highlands

Savannah Sparrow *Passerculus sandwichensis*—Several along the road, sometimes perched on fence wires, at Las Barrancas

Lincoln's Sparrow Melospiza lincolnii—One popped up in a shrub at Las Barrancas

Canyon Towhee Melozone fusca—Found at a couple of sites in the highlands

Rusty Sparrow Aimophila rufescens—(GO) One seen by Alan in a downed tree at Ruiz Cortines

YELLOW-BREASTED CHAT: Icteriidae (1)

Yellow-breasted Chat *Icteria virens*—This pretty common migrant in Veracruz was seen or heard on 5 days of the tour at sites ranging from Miramar and Playa Juan Angel on the coast to El Mirador and Nanciyaga in the mountains

NEW WORLD BLACKBIRDS: Icteridae (12)

Eastern Meadowlark Sturnella magna—Seen and heard in the grasslands at Las Barrancas

Chestnut-headed Oropendola Psaracolius wagleri—A small group seen at El Mirador

Montezuma Oropendola *Psarocolius montezuma*—This dramatic, large, and intriguing-sounding blackbird was found on five days at several sites in the southern mountains, though apparently none were nesting at this time

Black-cowled Oriole Icterus prosthemelas—Seen at Ruiz Cortines feeding on Erythrina

Orchard Oriole Icterus spurius—(GO) Seen by Alan at Miramar and Las Barrancas, but none of the group could get on it

Hooded Oriole *Icterus cucullatus*—This attractive oriole was seen at Las Barrancas and at Barra de Sontecomapan **Altamira Oriole** *Icterus gularis*—This large and colorful oriole was the most frequently encountered oriole and was found at virtually all sites along the coast and again El Mirador and the Playa Azul

Baltimore Oriole *Icterus galbula*—Maryland's state bird was seen on 4 days at El Mirador, Nanciyaga, Ruiz Cortines, and the Playa Azul

Bronzed Cowbird *Molothrus aeneus*—Found on the first 7 days of the tour, most noticeably when they roosted on the phone lines right outside the Hotel Bienvenido at night!

Giant Cowbird Molothrus orizyvorus—(GO) One seen by Alan and Dave flying overhead at Las Barrancas

- **Melodious Blackbird** *Dives dives*—Found on 8 days of the tour at most sites, their songs were a memorable component of most mornings in the field
- **Great-tailed Grackle** *Quiscalus mexicanus*—One of the few species seen every day of the tour, these were conspicuous and abundant throughout the trip

NEW WORLD WARBLERS: Parulidae (26)

Ovenbird Seiurus aurocapilla—Found only once on the trip, at Nanciyaga

Worm-eating Warbler *Helmitheros vermivorum*—Two sightings of this often hard to see species, first at Nanciyaga and again at Playa Azul

Louisiana Waterthrush *Parkesia motacilla*—Found on three days during the Rio La Antigua boat trip, at Nanciyaga, and at the Hotel Playa Azul; more associated with inland sites than the following

Northern Waterthrush *Parkesia noveboracensis*—Found in the mangroves on the Alvarado boat trip and at Nanciyaga

Blue-winged Warbler Vermivora cyanoptera—(GO) One bird seen by Alan and Dave at Nanciyaga

Black-and-white Warbler *Mniotilta varia*—Found on five days of the tour at most higher elevation sites in the latter part of the trip

Gray-crowned Yellowthroat *Geothlypis poliocephala*—One observed with a bit of effort in a shrub at Ruiz Cortines

MacGillivray's Warbler Geothlypis tolmiei—One found as part of a small flock at Macuiltepetl

Kentucky Warbler Geothlypis formosa—One bird very nicely seen by the group at Nanciyaga

Common Yellowthroat *Geothlypis trichas*—These were found, though many times hard to see well, on five days of the tour at sites throughout the tour

Hooded Warbler *Setophaga citrina*—An attractive and cooperative bird on this tour, these were seen on 5 days at many sites, perhaps best was a full male who perched on a downed tree right on the grounds of the Playa Azul

American Redstart *Setophaga ruticilla*—A regularly encountered migrant, these were seen on 6 days throughout the trip

Northern Parula *Setophaga americana*—Only found on 2 days, first in the mangroves on the Alvarado boat trip and again at the Playa Azul on the last morning

Magnolia Warbler *Setophaga magnolia*—This relatively common migrant was found at El Mirador, on the Alvarado boat trip, Nanciyaga, the Los Tuxtlas Biological Station, and the Playa Azul

Yellow Warbler Setophaga petechia—This species was regularly found throughout the trip at many sites

Mangrove Warbler Setophaga petechia erithachorides—A pair of this resident subspecies of Yellow Warbler (with a completely different song!) was very well seen and heard in the mangroves on the Alvarado Wetlands boat trip

Yellow-rumped Warbler *Setophaga coronata*—A familiar species to North American birders, these were found on one day in the highlands at Las Minas and in the *Eucalyptus* at Laguna Alchichica

Yellow-throated Warbler *Setophaga dominica*—This palm-loving species was found on 6 days of the tour, mostly at coastal sites, but again at the Playa Azul

Townsend's Warbler *Setophaga townsendi*—Somewhat strangely, seen very well at the Pemex station in Perote! **Hermit Warbler** *Setophaga occidentalis*—This highland pine forest species was seen at Las Minas

Black-throated Green Warbler *Setophaga virens*—Although not abundant, these were regularly encountered and were seen on 5 days at Las Minas, Macuiltepetl, Nanciyaga, Ruiz Cortines, and the Playa Azul

Rufous-capped Warbler *Basileuterus rufifrons*—Seen on two days in the south at Nanciyaga and in Ruiz Cortines **Golden-browed Warbler** *Basileuterus belli*—Found at Ruiz Cortines

Golden-crowned Warbler *Basileuterus culicivorus*—Seen on two days at Macuiltepetl, Nanciyaga, and the Los Tuxtlas Biological Station

Wilson's Warbler *Cardellina pusilla*—Easily the most commonly encountered and abundant migrant found on the tour, these were seen on 9 days at almost every site visited

Red Warbler Cardellina rubra—Probably the most fabulous warbler of them all, a bird was well seen on the road to Las Minas

Slate-throated Redstart *Myioborus miniatus*—This lovely resident redstart was found on 3 days at El Mirador, in the highlands at Las Minas and Camino de Conejo, and at Macuiltepetl

CARDINALS, GROSBEAKS, AND ALLIES: Cardinalidae (10)

Summer Tanager *Piranga rubra*—A regularly encountered migrant, this was found on 6 days at sites throughout the tour

Western Tanager *Piranga ludoviciana*—(GO) Seen by the guides at El Mirador and in the forests at Ruiz Cortines **White-winged Tanager** *Piranga leucoptera*—Definitely a highlight of the trip, a brilliant male was in the canopy at Ruiz Cortines

Red-throated Ant-Tanager Habia fuscicauda—Small groups found twice at Rancho El Mirador and Nanciyaga Black-faced Grosbeak Caryothraustes poliogaster—(HO) Several heard in the forests at Ruiz Cortines Northern Cardinalis cardinalis—A male was found at Macuiltépetl

Rose-breasted Grosbeak *Pheucticus Iudivocianus*—Found on 5 days of the tour at Playa Juan Angel, El Mirador, Macuiltepetl, Nanciyaga, and Ruiz Cortines

Indigo Bunting Passerina cyanea—Heard or seen on 4 days of the tour at the Hotel Mocambo, Miramar,
 Quiahuixtlan, on the Rio La Antigua, in the road at the Los Tuxtlas Biological Station, and in Ruiz Cortines
 Painted Bunting Passerina ciris—A female was found during the visit to Playa Juan Angel
 Dickcissel Spiza americana—(HO) Heard when flying over Miramar

TANAGERS AND ALLIES: Thraupidae (9)

Blue-gray Tanager *Thraupis episcopus*—A frequently encountered species of "true tanager;" seen on 6 days of the tour at many sites in the lowlands

Yellow-winged Tanager *Thraupis abbas*—Another very attractive and regularly encountered tanager; found on 6 days at several sites

Red-legged Honeycreeper *Cyanerpes cyaneus*—Seen twice, mostly young/female birds, at Ruiz Cortines and Rancho El Mirador

Blue-black Grassquit *Volatinia jacarina*—Only found twice, once at Paso Mariano and again in Ruiz Cortines **Morelet's Seedeater** *Sporophila morelleti*—A few seen in Ruiz Cortines

Bananaquit Coereba flaveola—Seen on 2 days at Ruiz Cortines and Rancho El Mirador

Yellow-faced Grassquit Tiaris olivaceus—Found during the walk around Ruiz Cortines

Black-headed Saltator *Saltator atriceps*—Found on 3 days of the trip at Ranco El Mirador, Macuiltepetl, and the Playa Azul

Cinnamon-bellied Saltator *Saltator grandis*—Found on 4 days of the trip, perhaps best when a pair perched in a tree near the Chichicaxtle observatory eating leaves. This species was recently split from the Grayish Saltator complex.

Mammals (7 species)

Nine-banded Armadillo Dasypus novemcinctus—Two seen during the Nanciyaga owling trip

Common Raccoon *Procyon lotor*—Two seen during the Nanciyaga owling trip

Red-bellied Squirrel *Sciurus aureogaster*—This beautiful relative of the familiar Eastern Gray Squirrel was seen many times throughout the tour

Mantled Howler Monkey Alouatta palliata—Heard and seen at Nanciyaga

Rock Squirrel Otospermophilus variegatus—One seen at the Pemex in Perote

Eastern Cottontail Sylvilagus floridanus—Seen at Laguna Alchichica

Tent-making Bat Uroderma bilobatum—One roosting in the palapa in front of the rooms at Playa Hotel Azul

REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS (9 species)

Northeastern Spiny-tailed Iguana Ctenosaura acanthura—Recorded both at Cempoala and at the Playa Azul

Green Iguana Iguana iguana—Found twice at several sites

Rose-bellied Lizard *Sceloporus variabilis*—Found on 2 days, mostly crawling around old Totonac structures at Cempoala and Quiahuixtlan

Giant Toad *Rhinella horribilis*—Extremely large individual seen at La Finca restaurant; was formerly considered part of the Cane Toad complex

Mediterrean House Gecko Hemidactylus turcicus—Heard and seen several times during the trou

Narrow-bridged Musk Turtle Claudius angustatus—One rescued from the road at Playa Juan Angel

Morelet's Crocodile Crocodylus moreletii—A large individual swimming in Lake Catemaco just off the dock at Nanciyaga

Tuxtla Tropical Night Lizard Lepidophyma tuxtlae—One seen at Nanciyaga

Keeled Earth Snake Geophis carinosus—One found dead on the road in Ruiz Cortines
