# **TINAMOUS: Tinamidae (1)**

**Great Tinamou,** *Tinamus major*—(H) Heard on the Isla Popa boat trip

# **DUCKS, GEESE AND SWANS: Anatidae (2)**

**Black-bellied Whistling-Duck** *Dendrocygna autumnalis*—Seen in the wetlands along the Punta Róbalo road on both visits and in the Changuinola River

Blue-winged Teal Spatula discors—Changuinola River

# **GUANS AND CURASSOWS: Cracidae (1)**

Gray-headed Chachalaca Ortalis cinereiceps—Punta Róbalo road, Isla Popa boat trip

# **PIGEONS AND DOVES: Columbidae (6)**

Rock Pigeon Columba livia—(I) Seen in Bocas town on arrival

**Pale-vented Pigeon** *Patagioenas cayennensis*—A widespread and commonly seen and heard at Tranquilo Bay and elsewhere; recorded every day of the tour

White-crowned Pigeon Patagioenas leucocephala—Found on 3 days at Tranquilo Bay, usually in the same spot Short-billed Pigeon Patagioenas nigrirostris—Regularly seen and heard almost every day at Tranquilo Bay; sometimes feeding on Miconia berries

**Ruddy Ground-Dove** *Columbina talpacoti*—Found along the Punta Róbalo road on both visits **Gray-chested Dove** *Leptotila cassinii*—Snyder Canal

### **CUCKOOS AND ALLIES: Cuculidae (3)**

**Groove-billed Ani** *Crotophaga sulcirostris*—Found along the Punta Róbalo road on both visits and at Green Acres Chocolate Farm

Squirrel Cuckoo Piaya cayana—Well seen along the Punta Róbalo road

Mangrove Cuckoo Coccyzus minor—Seen by some in the group on the boardwalk at Tranquilo Bay

### NIGHTJARS: Caprimulgidae (1)

Common Pauraque Nyctidromus albicollis—One flushed from the ground after lunch on the Changuinola River

# POTOOS: Nyctibiidae (1)

Great Potoo Nyctibius grandis—Seen perched in a tree from the boat on the Snyder Canal

# SWIFTS: Apodidae (3)

**Chestnut-collared Swift** *Streptoprocne rutila*—A large group seen flying overhead and identified by Roger at Tranquilo Bay one day

White-collared Swift Streptoprocne zonaris—Seen multiple times on both visits to the Cordillera, generally flying very fast high overhead

**Chimney Swift** *Chaetura pelagica*—(G) Seen by Dave and Roger flying over the water from the boat when coming back from Bird Island

# **HUMMINGBIRDS: Trochilidae (14)**

White-necked Jacobin Florisuga mellivora—Seen on 2 days at Tranquilo Bay

Bronzy Hermit Glaucis aeneus—Once at Tranquilo Bay

Green Hermit Phaethornis quy—Continental Divide road

Long-billed Hermit Phaethornis longirostris—Green Acres Chocolate Farm

**Stripe-throated Hermit** *Phaethornis striigularis*—Seen on most days at Tranquilo Bay around the Lodge and cabins

**Green-breasted Mango** Anthracothorax prevostii—Tranquilo Bay, Snyder Canal

White-bellied Mountain-gem Lampornis hemileucus—Seen on the road along the continental divide on the first visit

**Purple-throated Mountain-gem** *Lampornis calolaemus*—Seen on the road along the continental divide on the first visit

**Garden Emerald** *Chlorostilbon assimilis*—Found on the day we traveled over on the Pacific slope in the Fortuna Forest Reserve along the highway

**Crowned Woodnymph** *Thalurania colombica*—Seen on 3 days at Tranquilo Bay, including at the hummingbird pool, and once on the road into the Cordillera

**Black-bellied Hummingbird** *Eupherusa nigriventris*—Seen on the road along the continental divide on the second visit

**Snowy-bellied Hummingbird** *Amazilia edward*—Found on the day we traveled over on the Pacific slope in the Fortuna Forest Reserve along the highway

**Rufous-tailed Hummingbird** *Amazilia tzacatl*—The most frequently encountered hummingbird, these were found on 6 days at Tranquilo Bay and a few other sites

Blue-chested Hummingbird Amazilia amabilis— Seen on 3 days at Tranquilo Bay and at Snyder Canal

### RAILS, COOTS AND ALLIES: Rallidae (4)

**Gray-cowled Wood-Rail** *Aramides cajaneus*—Seen on the Punta Róbalo road and heard at Tranquilo Bay **Common Gallinule** *Gallinula galeata*—Changuinola River

Purple Gallinule Porphyrio martinica—Changuinola River

White-throated Crake Laterallus albigularis—(H) heard at the continental divide road and Snyder Canal

LIMPKIN: Aramidae (1)

Limpkin Aramus guaruna—Changuinola River

# STILTS AND AVOCETS: Recurvirostridae (1)

Black-necked Stilt Himantopus mexicanus—Changuinola River

# LAPWINGS AND PLOVERS: Charadriidae (3)

**Southern Lapwing** *Vanellus chilensis*—Found along the Punta Róbalo road on both visits and in the Changuinola River

**Collared Plover** *Charadrius collaris*—At least 2 at the Changuinola River mouth **Semipalmated Plover** *Charadrius semipalmatus*—Changuinola River mouth

# JACANAS: Jacanidae (1)

**Northern Jacana** *Jacana spinosa*—Easily seen in shallow wetlands along the Punta Róbalo road, Snyder Canal, and Changuinola River

# SANDPIPERS AND ALLIES: Scolopacidae (7)

Ruddy Turnstone Arenaria interpres—Changuinola River mouth

Sanderling Calidris alba—Changuinola River mouth

Least Sandpiper Calidris minutilla—Changuinola River mouth

Pectoral Sandpiper Calidris melanotos—Changuinola River

Western Sandpiper Calidris mauri—Changuinola River mouth

Spotted Sandpiper Actitis macularius—Isla Popa boat trip, Changuinola River and mouth

Willet Tringa semipalmata—along the Changuinola River and at the mouth

### JAEGERS: Stecorariidae (2)

Parasitic Jaeger Stercorarius parasiticus—Seen from the boat on the Snyder Canal trip

Pomarine Jaeger Stercorarius pomarinus—Seen on the boat ride from Bocas town to Tranquilo Bay, first day

### **GULLS AND TERNS: Laridae (4)**

Laughing Gull Leucophaeus atricilla—Changuinola River and mouth

**Royal Tern** *Thalasseus maximus*—Seen on both trips to Punta Róbalo and on the Changuinola River and mouth **Sandwich Tern** *Thalasseus sandvicensis*—Seen on both trips to Punta Róbalo and on the Changuinola River and mouth

Brown Noddy Anous stolidus—One bird at Bird Island

### TROPICBIRDS: Phaethontidae (1)

Red-billed Tropicbird Phaethon aethereus—Bird Island

# FRIGATEBIRDS: Fregatidae (1)

Magnificent Frigatebird Fregata magnificens—Regularly encountered on the tour while on the water or near it

### **BOOBIES AND GANNETS: Sulidae (2)**

**Brown Booby** *Sula leucogaster*—Large numbers at Bird Island, where they nest, but also seen on several of the boat trips to various sites

Red-footed Booby Sula sula—Bird Island

### CORMORANTS Phalacrocoracidae (1)

**Neotropic Cormorant** *Phalacrocorax brasilianus*—Seen on both trips to Punta Róbalo and on the Changuinola River

# PELICANS: Pelecanidae (1)

Brown Pelican Pelecanus occidentalis—Found on 4 days of the tour when on or near water

# **HERONS AND EGRETS: Ardeidae (9)**

Bare-throated Tiger-Heron Tigrisoma mexicanum—Snyder Canal

Great Blue Heron Ardea herodias—Punta Róbalo road and Changuinola River

Great Egret Ardea alba—Punta Róbalo road and Changuinola River

Snowy Egret Egretta thula—Punta Róbalo road and Changuinola River

Little Blue Heron Egretta caerulea—Isla Popa boat trip and Changuinola River

Tricolored Heron Egretta tricolor—Punta Róbalo road and Changuinola River

Cattle Egret Bubulcus ibis—Seen on most days when off Isla Bastimentos in the lowlands with cattle pasture
Green Heron Butorides virescens—Punta Róbalo road, Isla Popa boat trip, Snyder Canal, and Changuinola River
Black-crowned Night-Heron Nyctanassa violacea—Roosting in a large tree behind the Super Centro El
Económico

### IBIS AND SPOONBILLS: Theskiornithidae (3)

Glossy Ibis Plegadis falcinellus—Small flock of 7 birds on a Changuinola River sandbar

Green Ibis Mesembrinibis cayennensis—Seen on both trips on the Punta Róbalo road and once at Tranquilo Bay

Roseate Spoonbill Platalea ajaja—Changuinola River

# **NEW WORLD VULTURES: Cathartidae (2)**

**Black Vulture** *Coragyps atratus*—Seen every day at most sites, usually soaring **Turkey Vulture** *Cathartes aura*—Seen every day at most sites, usually soaring

# **OSPREY: Pandionidae (1)**

**Osprey** *Pandion haliaetus*—Punta Róbalo road, Snyder Canal, Changuinola River, and Green Acres Chocolate Farm; it was not clear whether these were migrants or birds of the resident, Caribbean subspecies, or both

### HAWKS, KITES AND EAGLES: Accipitridae (11)

**Swallow-tailed Kite** *Elanoides forficatus*—Seen during the first trip to the Continental Divide and on the Snyder Canal trip

**Snail Kite**, Rostrhamus sociabilis—Changuinola River

**Double-toothed Kite** Harpagus bidentatus—Several seen at Green Acres Chocolate Farm

Plumbeous Kite Ictinia plumbea—Isla Popa boat trip

**Common Black-Hawk** *Buteogallus anthracinus*—Seen one day at Tranquilo Bay, on the Isla Popa boat trip, and Changuinola River

Great Black-Hawk Buteogallus urubitinga—Seen on the continental divide road on the second visit

Roadside Hawk Rupornis magnirostris—Punta Róbalo road and Changuinola River

**Broad-winged Hawk** *Buteo platypterus*—A small kettle flew over us on the first visit to the Punta Róbalo road **Short-tailed Hawk** *Buteo brachyurus*—One flew overhead on the second visit to the Continental Divide road

Swainson's Hawk Buteo swainsoni—A few were seen on the first visit to the Punta Róbalo road

Red-tailed Hawk Buteo jamaicensis—Second trip to the Cordillera Talamanca, Pacific side

OWLS: Strigidae (1)

Mottled Owl Ciccaba virgata—(H) Calling at Tranquilo Bay one early morning

# **TROGONS: Trogonidae (3)**

Slaty-tailed Trogon Trogon massena—Isla Popa boat trip

Gartered Trogon Trogon caligatus—Punta Róbalo road, first trip

**Collared Trogon** *Trogon collaris*—One, of the orange-bellied form, seen in the Fortuna Forest on the Pacific side next to the road

### KINGFISHERS: Alcedinidae (5)

**Ringed Kingfisher** *Megaceryle torquata*—Seen on the first trip to the mainland in the lowlands, on the Isla Popa boat trip, and Snyder Canal

Belted Kingfisher Megaceryle alcyon—Isla Popa boat trip and Snyder Canal

**Amazon Kingfisher** *Chloroceryle amazona*—In the pond behind the El Centro SuperEconómico on the first trip and Snyder Canal

American Pygmy Kingfisher Chloroceryle aenea—Snyder Canal

**Green Kingfisher** Chloroceryle americana—Isla Popa boat trip and Snyder Canal

# **TOUCAN-BARBETS: Semnornithidae (1)**

Prong-billed Barbet Semnornis frantzii—(H) Fortuna Reserve, Pacific side

# **TOUCANS: Ramphastidae (3)**

**Northern Emerald-Toucanet** *Aulacorhynchus prasinus*—Fortuna Reserve, Pacific side; these were of the Bluethroated subspecies

**Yellow-throated Toucan** *Ramphastos ambiguus*—Isla Popa boat trip and Snyder Canal; these were the Chestnut-mandibled subspecies

**Keel-billed Toucan** *Ramphastos sulfuratus*—Found on 4 days at Punta Róbalo road, Isla Popa boat trip, Snyder Canal, and Green Acres Chocolate Farm

### **WOODPECKERS: Picidae (5)**

Acorn Woodpecker Melanerpes formicivorus—Fortuna Reserve, Pacific side

**Black-cheeked Woodpecker** *Melanerpes pucherani*—Regularly encountered on several days at Tranquilo Bay and in the Palo Seco Reserve and on Isla Popa

Pale-billed Woodpecker Campephilus guatemalensis—Seen from the boat at Isla Popla

Lineated Woodpecker Dryocopus lineatus—Snyder Canal and once at Tranquilo Bay

Golden-olive Woodpecker Colaptes rubiginosus—Fortuna Reserve, Pacific side

# FALCONS AND CARACARAS: Falconidae (5)

Laughing Falcon Herpetotheres cachinnans—(H) Snyder Canal

**Yellow-headed Caracara** *Milvago chimachima*—Found on 4 days at Tranquilo Bay, Punta Róbalo road, and Isla Popa boat trip

Merlin Falco columbarius—(G) seen by Roger and Dave from the boat on the way back from Green Acres

Bat Falcon Falco rufigularis—Isla Popa boat trip

Peregrine Falcon Falco peregrinus—Snyder Canal

### PARROTS: Psittacidae (5)

**Blue-headed Parrot** *Pionus menstruus*—Recorded on 4 days, usually flying by, at Tranquilo Bay, Punta Róbalo road, Isla Popa, and Green Acres Chocolate Farm

**Red-lored Parrot** *Amazona autumnalis*—The most frequently seen parrot, these large Amazons were seen or heard almost every day at Tranquilo Bay and at Punta Róbalo road, Isla Popa, and Green Acres Chocolate Farm

Mealy Parrot Amazona farinosa—Green Acres Chocolate Farm

Sulphur-winged Parakeet Pyrrhura hoffmanni—(G) Seen by Roger in the Fortuna Reserve

Olive-throated Parakeet Eupsittula nana—Isla Popa boat trip

# **ANTBIRDS: Thamnophilidae (4)**

**Black-crowned Antshrike** *Thamnophilus atrinucha*—Seen by the group at Green Acres Chocolate Farm and by the guides and some of the group on 3 days at Tranquilo Bay

White-flanked Antwren Myrmotherula axillaris—One afternoon walk at Tranquilo Bay

**Dot-winged Antwren** *Microrhopias quixensis*—One afternoon walk at Tranquilo Bay

Chestnut-backed Antbird Poliocrania exsul—Green Acres Chocolate Farm

# **OVENBIRDS AND WOODCREEPERS: Furnariidae (4)**

**Wedge-billed Woodcreeper** *Glyphorynchus spirurus*—Seen on the first trip to the Continental Divide and at Green Acres Chocolate Farm

Cocoa Woodcreeper Xiphorhynchus susurrans—Punta Róbalo road

Spotted Woodcreeper Xiphorhynchus erythropygius—Seen on the first trip to the Continental Divide

Streak-headed Woodcreeper Lepidocolaptes souleyetii—Punta Róbalo road and Snyder Canal

# MANAKINS: Pipridae (2)

**Golden-collared Manakin** *Manacus vitellinus*—Seen on 5 days at Tranquilo Bay, usually feeding on *Miconia* berries; Isla Bastimentos is in a well-known hybrid zone between Golden-collared and White-collared Manakin, which normally occurs to the west of the Changuinola River

**Red-capped Manakin** *Ceratopipra mentalis*—Found on 4 days at Tranquilo Bay, where males and females often came to eat *Miconia* berries

# **COTINGAS: Cotingidae (2)**

Purple-throated Fruitcrow Querula purpurata—Green Acres Chocolate Farm

**Snowy Cotinga** Carpodectes nitidus—Isla Popa boat trip

# **BECARDS AND TITYRAS: Tityridae (2)**

Masked Tityra *Tityra semifasciata*—Seen on 3 days at Tranquilo Bay, even from the dining room porch Black-crowned Tityra *Tityra inquistitor*—Isla Popa boat trip

### TYRANT FLYCATCHERS: Tyrannidae (21)

Stub-tailed Spadebill Platyrinchus cancrominus—(H) Tranquilo Bay

White-throated Spadebill Platyrinchus mystaceus—Continental Divide road

Ochre-bellied Flycatcher Mionectes oleagineus—Once at Tranquilo Bay

Common Tody-Flycatcher Todirostrum cinereum—In the trees at the lunch spot on the Changuinola River

Yellow-bellied Elaenia Elaenia flavogaster—Punta Róbalo road on first visit and Snyder Canal

Mountain Elaenia Elaenia frantzii—Fortuna Dam

Mistletoe Tyrannulet Zimmerius parvus—Continental Divide road and in the Fortuna Reserve

**Olive-sided Flycatcher** *Contopus cooperi*—Continental Divide road and one day at Tranquilo Bay right off the dining room porch

**Northern Tropical Pewee** *Contopus bogotensis*—A pair feeding fledged young at the picnic site on the Changuinola River

**Eastern Wood-Pewee** *Contopus virens*—The most commonly encountered pewee, these were seen at Tranquilo Bay and many other sites visited

**Bright-rumped Attila** *spadiceus*—Snyder Canal, Green Acres Chocolate Farm, and once at Tranquilo Bay **Dusky-capped Flycatcher** *Myiarchus tuberculifer*—Found on the first trip to the Continental Divide and on 2 days at Tranquilo Bay

Great Crested Flycatcher Mylarchus crinitus—Found on 6 days at Tranquilo Bay

**Great Kiskadee** *Pitangus sulphuratus*—Recorded on 5 days of the tour at many low elevation sites, including Tranquilo Bay

Boat-billed Flycatcher Megarynchus pitangua—Snyder Canal and once at Tranquilo Bay

**Social Flycatcher** *Myiozetetes similis*—Snyder Canal

**Gray-capped Flycatcher** *Myiozetetes granadensis*—Seen twice in one day at Palo Seco Protected Forest and Punta Róbalo road

Golden-bellied Flycatcher Myiodynastes hemichrysus—Continental Divide road

Sulphur-bellied Flycatcher Myiodynastes luteiventris — Seen on the first trip to the Continental Divide

Tropical Kingbird Tyrannus melancholicus—Punta Róbalo road, Isla Popa boat trip, and Snyder Canal

**Eastern Kingbird** *Tyrannus tyrannus*—Found on 4 days, occasionally in large flocks, everywhere from the Continental Divide road to Tranquilo Bay

### **VIREOS: Vireonidae (3)**

**Lesser Greenlet** *Pachysylvia decurtata*—Seen or heard on 4 days at Tranquilo Bay, Snyder Canal, and Green Acres Chocolate Farm

Philadelphia Vireo, Vireo philadelphicus—Seen once from the Lodge porch at Tranquilo Bay

**Red-eyed Vireo** *Vireo olivaceus*—A very frequently seen migrant, found in the *Miconia* at Tranquilo Bay and many other sites

### CROWS AND JAYS: Corvidae (2)

**Brown Jay** *Psilorhinus morio*—(G) Seen by Dave while driving on Punta Róbalo road **Black-chested Jay** *Cyanocorax affinis*—Green Acres Chocolate Farm

# **SWALLOWS AND MARTINS: Hirundinidae (6)**

**Blue-and-white Swallow** *Pygochelidon cyanoleuca*—A species of high elevations, these were easily seen at Fortuna Dam

Gray-breasted Martin Progne chalybea—Snyder Canal and Fortuna Dam

Mangrove Swallow Tachycineta albilinea—Changuinola River

Bank Swallow Riparia riparia -(G) Changuinola River

**Barn Swallow** *Hirundo rustica*—A commonly seen migrant, often while going in the boat from one place to another

Cliff Swallow Petrochelidon pyrrhonota—Punta Róbalo road

# **GNATCATCHERS:** Polioptilidae (1)

White-browed Gnatcatcher Polioptila plumbea—Very well seen on 3 days at Tranquilo Bay

# WRENS: Troglodytidae (8)

**House Wren** *Troglodytes aedon*—Heard or seen on 5 days of the tour at several sites **Black-throated Wren** *Pheugopedius atrogularis*—(H) Snyder Canal

**Rufous-and-white Wren** *Thryophilus rufalbus*—Found on the day we traveled over on the Pacific slope in the Fortuna Forest Reserve along the highway

Canebrake Wren Cantorchilus zeledoni—Snyder Canal

**Isthmian Wren** *Cantorchilus elutus*—Found on the day we traveled over on the Pacific slope in the Fortuna Forest Reserve along the highway

Bay Wren Cantorchilus nigricapillus—Snyder Canal

White-breasted Wood-Wren Henicorhina leucosticta—(H) Palo Seco Reserve

Gray-breasted Wood-Wren Henicorhina leucophrys—(H) Continental Divide road

# **MOCKINGBIRDS AND THRASHERS: Mimidae (1)**

Gray Catbird Dumetella carolinensis—Seen once at Tranquilo Bay and again on the Snyder Canal

# **THRUSHES: Turdidae (4)**

Slaty-backed Nightingale-Thrush Catharus fuscater—(H) Continental Divide road

**Swainson's Thrush** *Catharus ustulatus* – A very common and frequently seen bird at Tranquilo Bay and elsewhere; often feasting on *Miconia* berries

White-throated Thrush Turdus assimilis—In the trees at Fortuna Dam

Clay-colored Thrush Turdus grayi—Frequently encountered, reported on 7 days of the tour at various sites

# OLD WORLD SPARROWS: Passeridae: (1)

House Sparrow Passer domesticus – (G) Bocas town

# FINCHES AND EUPHONIAS: Fringillidae (6)

Elegant Euphoina Chlorophonia elegantissima—Fortuna Forest Reserve

Yellow-crowned Euphonia Euphonia luteicapilla—At the Super Centro El Económico

White-vented Euphonia Euphonia minuta—Seen on 3 days at Tranquilo Bay, another fan of Miconia berries

Thick-billed Euphonia Euphonia Ianiirostris—Fortuna Reservoir and Forest Reserve

**Olive-backed Euphonia** *Euphonia gouldi*—Punta Róbalo road, Palo Seco Reserve, and Green Acres Chocolate Farm

Tawny-capped Euphonia Euphonia anneae—Continental Divide Road

### **NEW WORLD SPARROWS: Passerellidae (3)**

**Common Chlorospingus** *Chlorospingus flavopectus*—Found on the Continental Divide Road, Palo Seco Forest **Black-striped Sparrow** *Arremonops conirostris*—Snyder Canal

Rufous-collared Sparrow Zonotrichia capensis—Fortuna Reservoir

# **NEW WORLD BLACKBIRDS: Icteridae (7)**

Red-breasted Meadowlark Sturnella militaris—Punta Róbalo road

**Chestnut-headed Oropendola** *Psarocolius wagleri*—Found at Green Acres Chocolate Farm and on the second road trip to the Continental Divide along the highway

Montezuma Oropendola Psarocolius montezuma—Seen on most days of the tour, usually when flying overhead

Baltimore Oriole Icterus galbula—Seen on 3 days at Tranquilo Bay and on the Isla Popa boat trip

Shiny Cowbird Molothrus bonarriensis—Punta Róbalo road

Giant Cowbird Molothrus oryzivorus—Punta Róbalo road

Great-tailed Grackle Quiscalus mexicanus—Seen on several days at multiple sites on the mainland

### **NEW WORLD WARBLERS: Parulidae (11)**

**Northern Waterthrush** *Parkesia noveboracensis*—Found on several days at Tranquilo Bay, often in the mangroves beside the boardwalk

Black-and-white Warbler Mniotilta varia—Seen on 2 days at Tranquilo Bay

**Prothonotary Warbler** *Protonotaria citrea*—Isla Popa

**Tennessee Warbler** *Oreothlypis peregrina*—One of the most common North American migrants on the tour, found on every day at Tranquilo Bay and in a few other spots

Mourning Warbler Geothylypis philadelphia—Seen along the Punta Róbalo road and Snyder Canal
